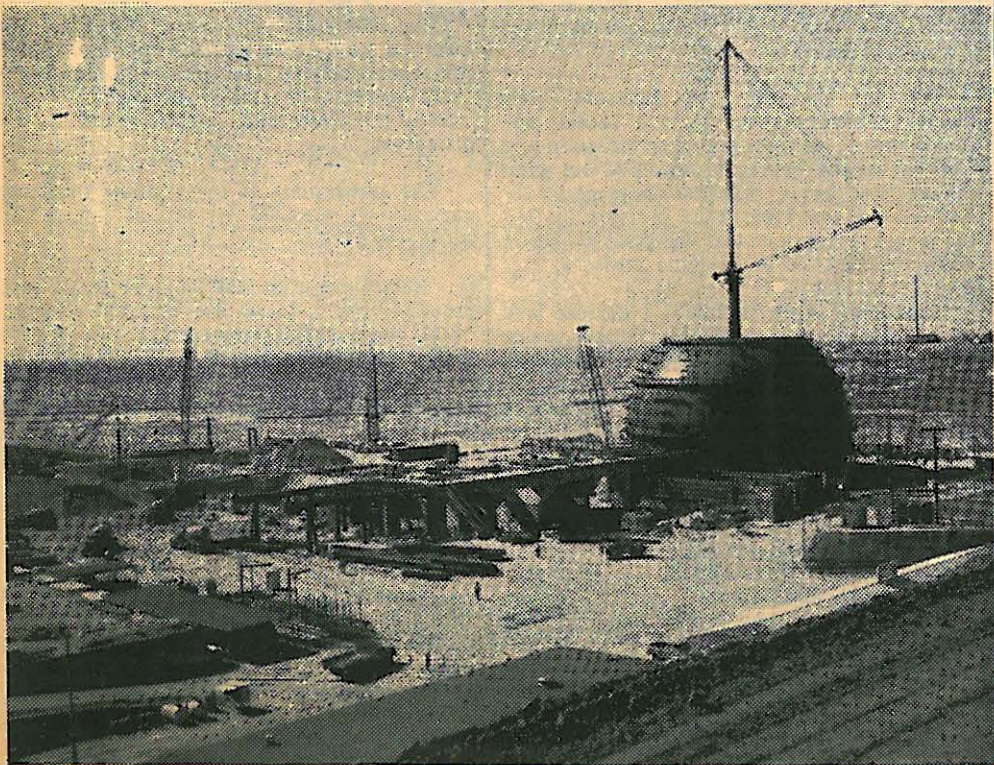

The program, beginning at 9 a.m. on the campus, is designed to stimulate interest in mathematics among high school students.

Co-sponsors of the day with Occidental are the Southern Section of the California Mathematics Council and the Los Angeles Acturial Club.

Enrollment Tops At College

GROSSMONT COLLEGE — For the first time in Grossmont College history, spring semester enrollment has topped that of the preceding fall semester.

Total spring enrollment is 3,727, Dean of Admissions Laurence E. Coons has announced. Total fall enrollment was 3,702. Coons noted that virtually all colleges experience a 10 per cent drop from fall to spring semester.

The spring figure was attributed to an unexpected increase in night student enrollment. There are 4,435 attending evening classes this spring against 1,236 last fall. The spring day enrollment is 2,292; last fall, the figure was 2,466.

Spring semester students, both day and evening have also taken on slightly higher study loads than this time last year.

Hostess for the tea hour will be Mrs. Mike Liebert.

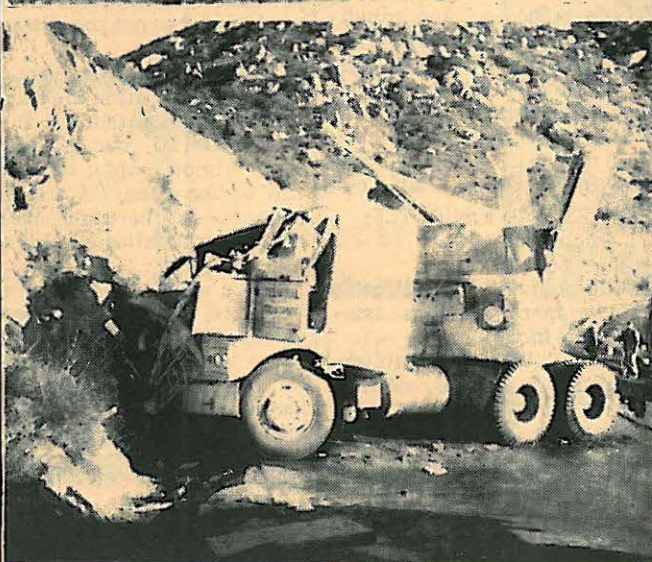

Can't we do a little bit more for this 2 1/2-year-old baby who has spent over half of her little life in hospitals?

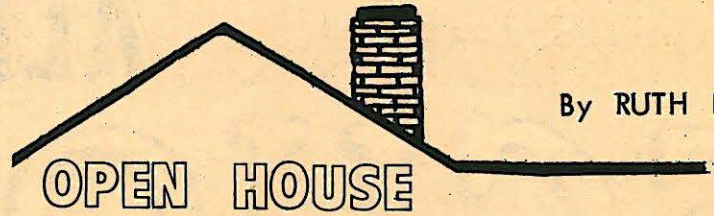
Let's open up our hearts — and our pocketbooks, for this little girl who may not grow up to know the joys of living.

Fortunately there was a nearby service station from which I purchased a tire and tube, because I didn't have my truck key and couldn't get at the spare. I asked my deliverer from the garage timidly if he had a cheap tire and he said: "Lady there ain't no such thing as a cheap tire."

At home at last, Cherry took the station wagon full of tools and lumber and departed

while I packed a suitcase of essentials for Robert during his new incarceration. I paused with pipe and tobacco in hand as I realized that today was the last day to renew my driver's license which expired on my birthday — Sunday. "I will take care of this little chore on my way back to the hospital," I said to myself.

The Division of Motor Vehicles was jammed with other procrastinators and as I stood nervously in line for two hours I knew I had failed. My state of mind was such that I could not even read, let alone answer the questions.

The gentleman at the window took my papers — he perused my test at length and said:

"Have you ever had a ticket?" I said proudly that I never had and he replied, "Well lady, either you are very good or very lucky," and as he waved my pitiful effort in my face he said, "According to this you are just lucky; you missed five questions."

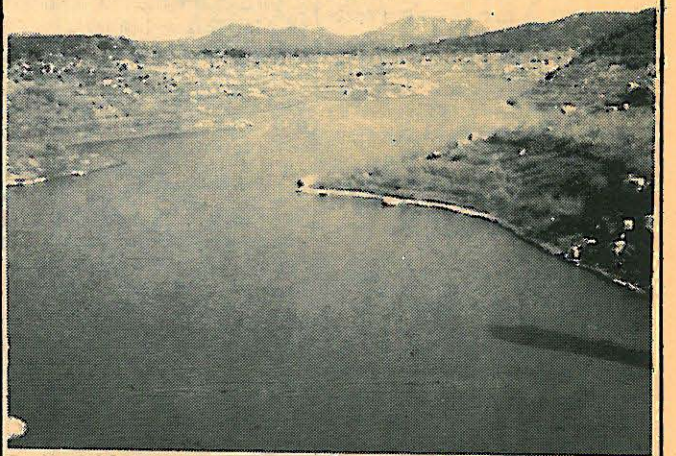
But, that's another story; one which we hope we can persuade Mrs. Martens to let us tell in the not too distant future.

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


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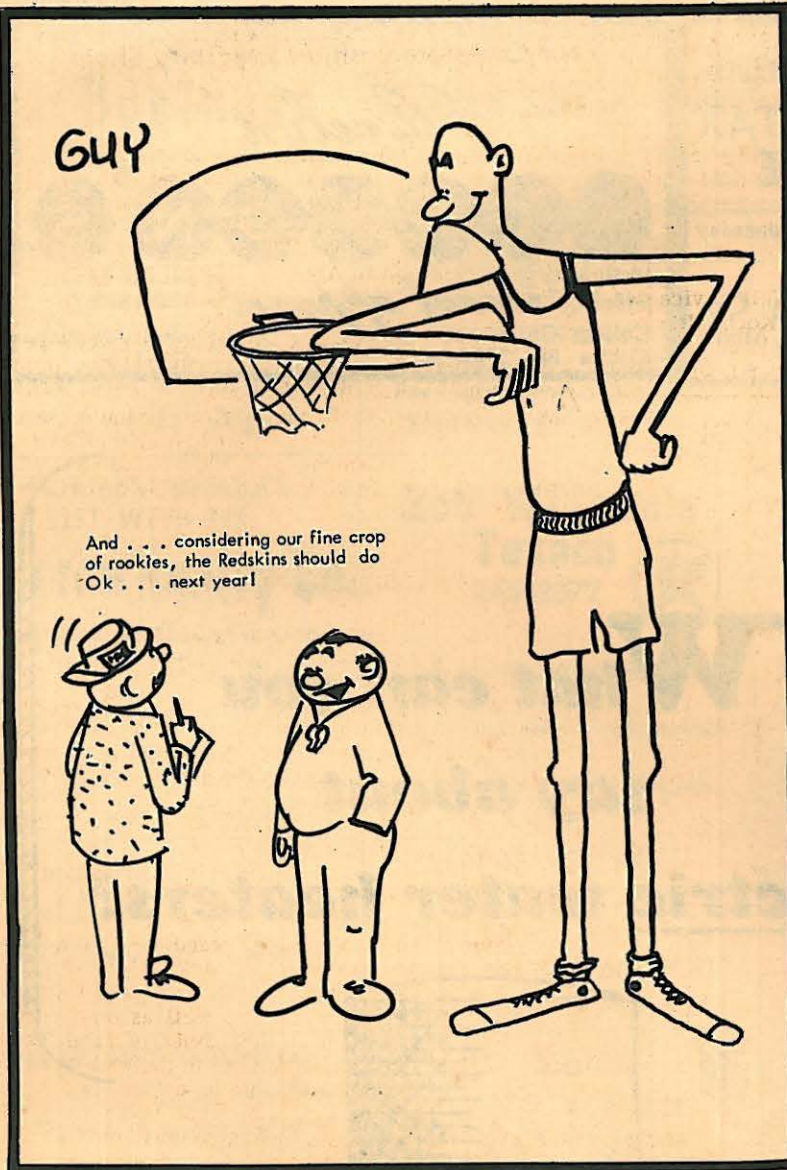


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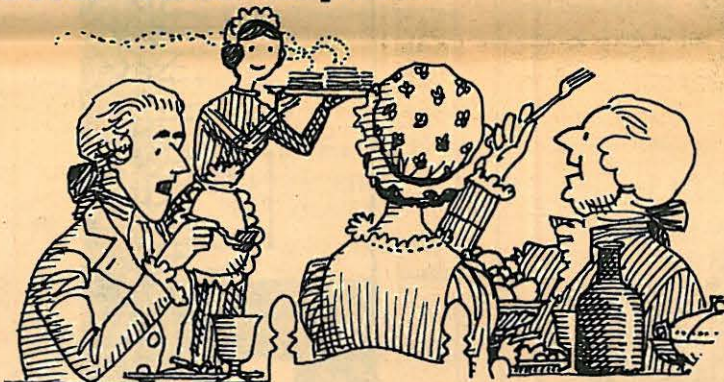


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Breakfast, 1820

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BREAKFAST IS INADEQUATE

Early American breakfasts apparently were a good deal more substantial than many modern American breakfasts. At Monticello, the home of Thomas Jefferson, breakfast was a major meal of the day. According to Daniel Webster, who was a guest at Monticello early in the 19th Century, Jefferson arose at dawn and spent the next four or five hours attending to the estate. Promptly at the hour of nine the entire family and guests assembled for breakfast. Webster's particular breakfast included hot breads and cold meats, with bacon and eggs

and fried apples. He noted that the "batter-cake express" ran at full speed between the kitchen and the dining room, keeping the diners supplied with hotcakes. At Mount Vernon, Martha Washington served potted game, country hams, oysters and hot biscuits to George and the hunters before dawn by candlelight, so they could ride out at sunup fully nourished. Too many modern Americans consider themselves lucky if they get more than juice and coffee on their way to work, according to nutri-

tion experts. They declare that nearly half the adults in the country are in too much of a morning rush to eat an adequate breakfast.

Prepare your favorite stuffing recipe, using about 4 cups crumbled enriched bread and spread over meat mixture. Cover with remaining meat and bake in pre-heated 350° oven 1 1/2 hours.
