FIRE REGULATIONS ARE AMENDED

By action of the Fire commissioners Board at a special meeting called by Chairman Al Hinkle at 8 p.m. Jan. 27, the Fire District burning regulations were amended to allow burning of accumulated flammable material before the fire hazard season is here. The amendment reads as follows:

"Effective at 12 midnight, Jan. 27, 1965, special permits for PILE BURNING will be issued for ten day periods only, during the winter season. (Dated by daylight saving time.) Such permits will allow burning any time of day or night."

Anyone burning at any time is urged to remember that under existing state laws, he bears responsibility for burning only under safe burning conditions.

Under existing district burning regulations, a copy of which was furnished most residents of the district during 1964, anyone burning on special permits is required to phone the fire department (445-2663) before they start the burning. By so doing, the State Forestry will be informed and as a result, will not send out fire equipment. This saves your tax dollar.

Few of us need be reminded to vote for Alpine schools on Tuesday, the 9th of February. However, I will take the liberty to remind one and all, the present successful school program was built on the basis of maintaining a \$1.89 rate. I will not dwell here on the obvious necessity of continuing this rate, but I do want to remind you of another obvious fact that many of us are apt to forget. This simple fact is, the superintendent and members of the board are charged with the responsibility of administering our school program; briefly, they determine the amount of tax needed to carry on a decent program. They conduct business, including planning the budget which is a continuous process, in regularly scheduled public meetings. This board has on several occasions invited our recommendations and opinions

concerning important matters of business where expenditure of funds was of significant size. They have performed their duties in good faith, and since no one has registered a protest to date against their program, and since they have made a special effort to know our wishes and to honor them whenever possible, surely they are entitled to our support at the polls. I know I speak for all of us who have attended the regular meeting of the board these past eighteen months in saying, by their sincere devotion to formal duties, by their ever courteous manner, and by their willingness to hear the public, the superintendent and members of the board have created spontaneous good will that has characterized every meeting. Individually and as a deliberative body, they have earned the respect of every member of this community.

Rainfall in San Diego County has been considerably below normal this season, varying from 2.60 to 5.79 inches, depending upon the area in which you live. I find it hard to believe there could have been so much water on my kitchen floor if these statistics are accurate — I would estimate that I have mopped up about ten inches, at least.

When we moved into our house, there was a long, open porch across the front which was the most hideous bit of architecture I have ever seen. A conspicuous feature was a network of pipes, arranged haphazardly, chipped and broken and painted in various bright conflicting colors. The task of converting the area into a kitchen and laundry was one of the first we undertook. With great ingenuity and much labor, my husband dispensed with the pipes (I think they are stored away somewhere — we might be able to use them someday) — enclosed the porch, added a bay window, and we viewed the result with pride. Until the first rain, that is. The house was waterproof, except for the kitchen. I may be unreasonable, but I dislike getting dinner in hip boots and a raincoat. When the weather improved we patched the roof and waited. After the next rain, I said with some heat that I refused to work in an area where the floor was continually under water. Robert said he was tied up, but would have one of his men do the job.

One day shortly thereafter, I awoke with a severe headache, decided to stay home from work,

and went back to sleep, aided by a couple of aspirins. It must have been ten o'clock when I was awakened by the sound of intermittent hammering. Someone was fixing the roof. This is the sort of thing that is always happening to me. I think I could have born it better if the work had progressed with some rapidity, but this character apparently took time out for a smoke between blows. I took to timing the intervals and they averaged out about fifteen minutes. What is more, he also sang; off-key and loudly. I managed to sleep while he ate his lunch — it must have been a huge one, because it took him two hours. At five o'clock I heard him drive away and I gulped down more aspirin and sighed, "Well, at least the job is done; we have a sound roof, no matter how much it rains. And even if I did suffer dreadfully, it is worth it. How wonderful not to have to worry about leaks.

It was a Sunday morning when we had our next rain. We woke to the sound of it — it was not a light rain, it was pouring. Snug in my bed I planned a special breakfast; waffles, perhaps an omelet — whatever Robert likes best, I thought. Humming a cheerful tune I put on my prettiest robe, my flimsiest matching slippers and headed for the kitchen.

Mercifully, the rain did not last all day and we were able to mop up most of the water by nightfall. I only caught a slight code; my kitchen rugs and curtains dried out quite well, and Robert says that if the dry weather holds, he will have someone fix the roof, probably next week...

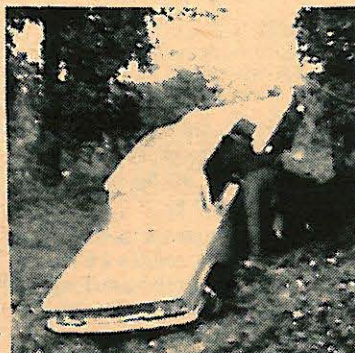
HERE and THERE
