
Editor:

They have performed their duties in good faith, and since no one has registered a protest to date against their program, and since they have made a special effort to know our wishes and to honor them whenever possible, surely they are entitled to our support at the polls.



The purpose of the PCV is to eliminate hydrocarbons or impurities from the air. The hydrocarbons and impurities are returned to the combustion chamber. When the valve becomes obstructed the gases, etc., cause rust and corrosion of the engine parts and form sludge and varnish which shortens the life of motor oil and engine. Regular attention is necessary to prevent the PCV valve from becoming clogged and it is recommended by automobile manufacturers that this valve be checked and cleaned every 5,000 miles.






