Dr. Larson left Friday of last week to make arrangements for the services and he expects to be gone from his pulpit for about two weeks.

Mrs. Larson was a widow and Dr. Larson was her only son.

Woody Mitchell and his wife Pat, say that there are a few items that are not in the rooms yet, but they cordially invite all their friends and neighbors to come and see this facility of which Alpine can be proud.

In the future, the Mitchell's plan to begin the building of a rest home for the aged.

This will be a 50 to 100-bed home and will be strictly for the aged rather than a nursing home. In it, they plan to have an apartment for visitors to patients that come from long distances.

Dr. John Robuck and Mr. Kit Sickels of Capital Services are building the new facilities and the Mitchells will lease the buildings and the actual business will be theirs. The Capital Services are presently building a new convalescent hospital across from Sharp Memorial Hospital.

Mrs. Kent have purchased a new home in Newberg, Oregon, where Mr. Kent is a professor in the University there.

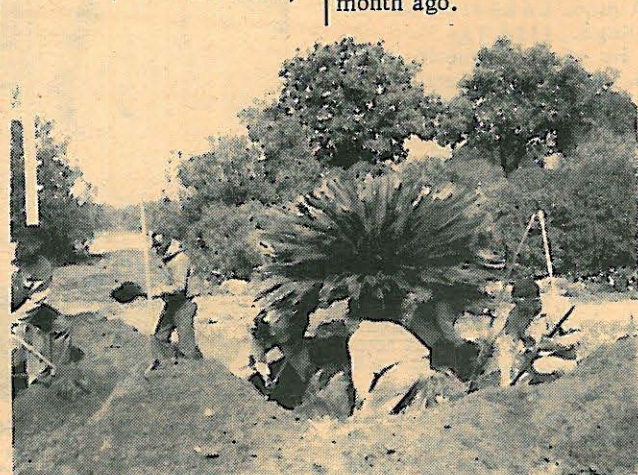

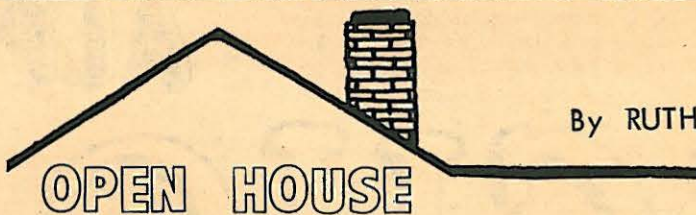
# Editorial

A little three-year-old girl died this week in our county because her father was unable to rescue her from their burning home. This isn't the whole story by a long shot, and you, yes you, are as guilty as if you had set that fire.

Get out your maps and look at the unprotected area with no one to protect all those structures but the California Division of Forestry and structures are not their business. Thank God they do respond and do the very best they can. **THIS IS NOT ENOUGH!**

Each year money, lots of money, is spent beautifying our parks, building new county buildings, etc., and this is all very fine, but each time there has even been consideration of getting this matter on a ballot, a suggestion is as far as it ever goes. Does this make sense? It certainly does not! Don't you think that it is high time that a great many of you gave a great deal of thought to this? The next time this terrible tragedy happens, it just might be to one of yours!

I have outlined, in my mind, all the things I am going to do on my vacation and I am tired. I think I shall take a little rest. Two weeks is such a long time and I have brought home an armful of books from the library. This new Hugh Pentecost mystery, "The Shape of Fear" looks inviting, and this morning's mail brought three new magazines . . . a nice nap would be lovely, and tomorrow morning I will be rested and ready to do great things!

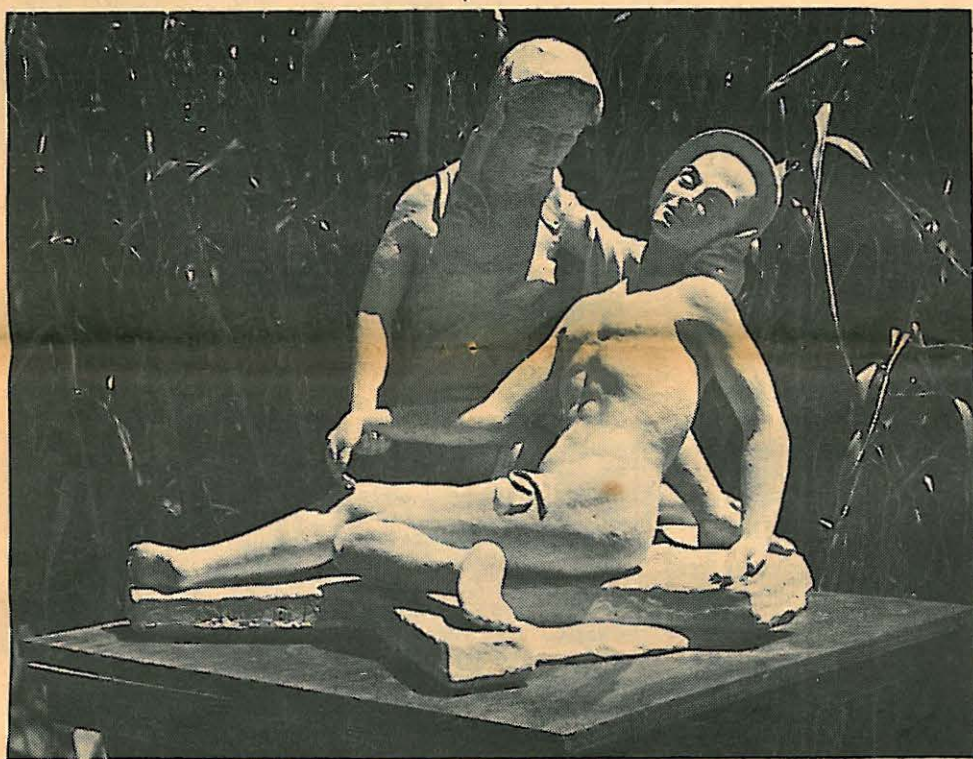
What's wrong with a simple name like "Main Street" for example. It will be the main street won't it?

Mr. Nicolaisen is known for his beautiful sculpture, having exhibited in Copenhagen as long ago as 1918.

Born in Copenhagen in the year 1889, Mr. Nicolaisen moved to Alpine just seven years ago. He studied at the University of Pennsylvania, Giraud Institute and also had formal art training at the Polytechnical School of Related Art and the Royal Academy of Fine Art.

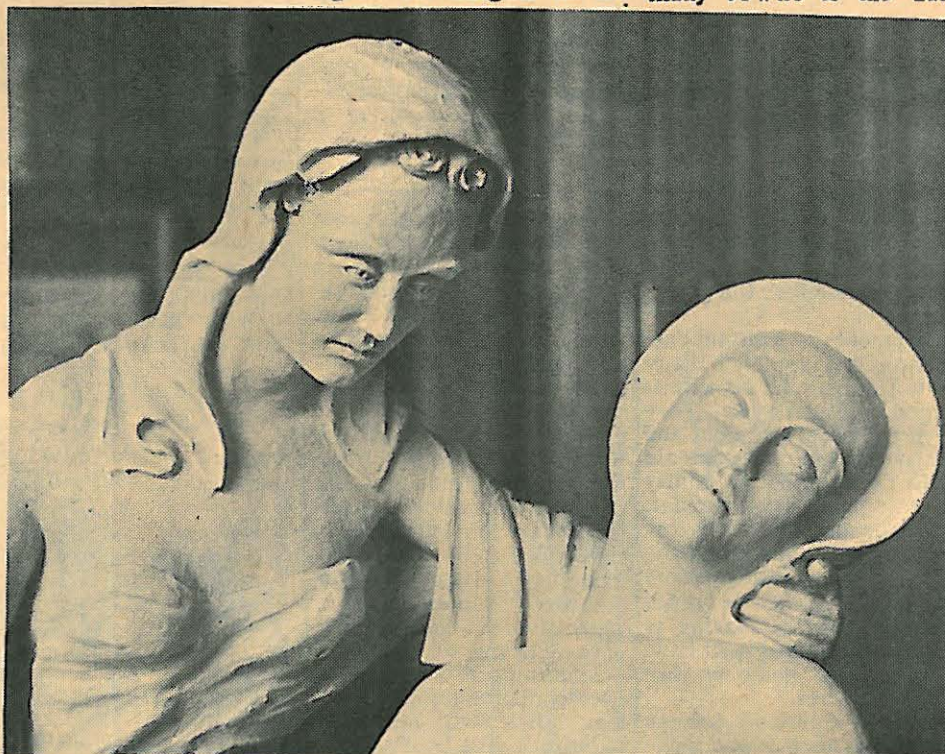
Following his formal training, he studied in Copenhagen and Paris.

Exhibits by Mr. Nicolaisen

have been numerous including Copenhagen, New York, Alpine, Lakeside and San Diego.

He came to America in order to become Gutzon Borglum's sculptural assistant for a period of two and one-half years. He worked on the Memorial of American wars, now in Soldier Park in Newark, New Jersey.

Through the years that he was doing technical illustrations for the Army and Navy, Mr. Nicolaisen has longed for the day when he might return to the productive fine art of sculpturing and painting. He now lives in the beautiful foothills of East San Diego County, where he has the time for fulfilling the dream.

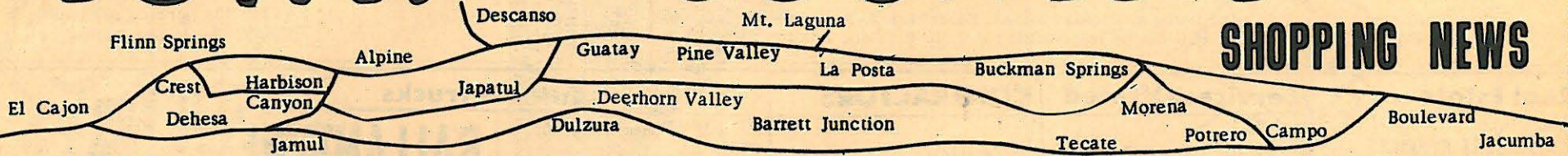

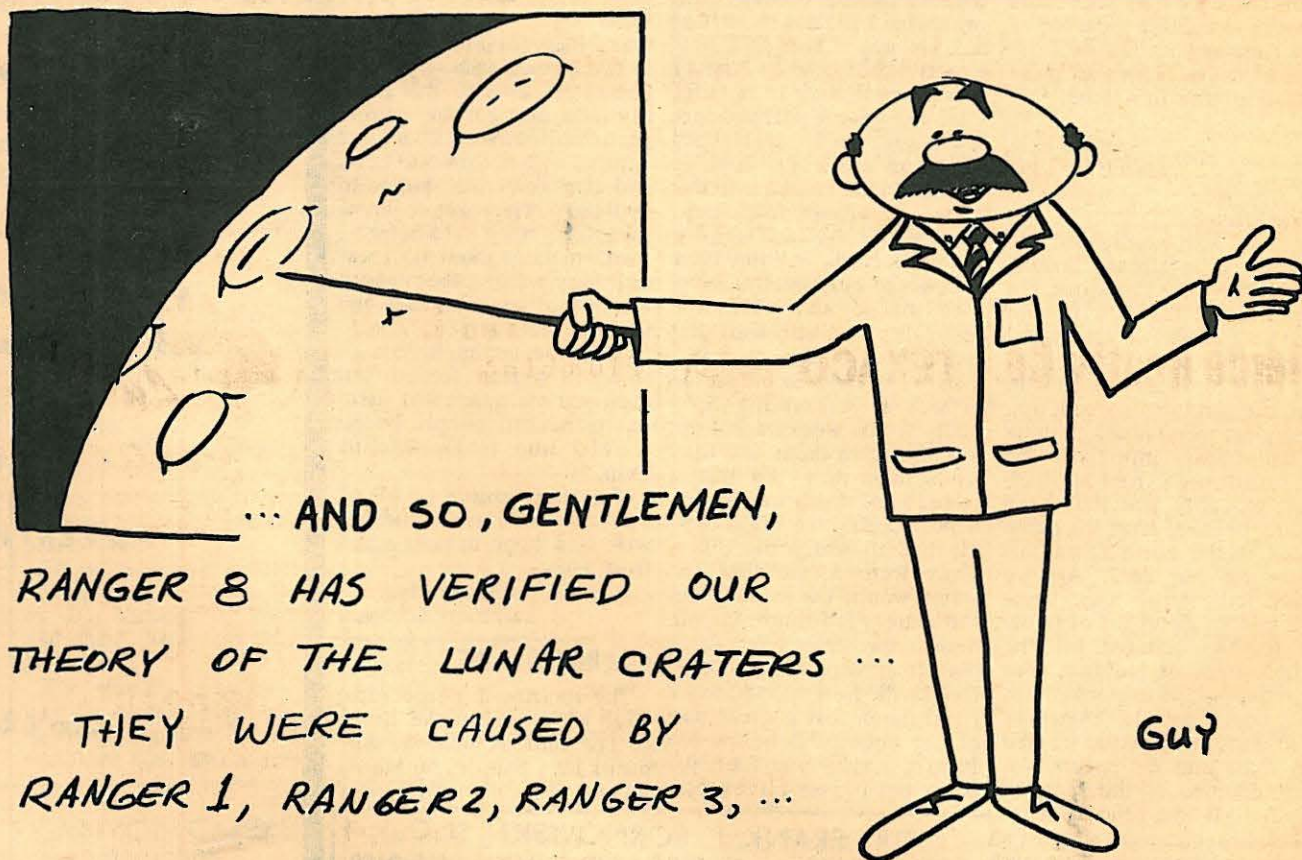

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EDITOR'S NOTE: The following is a letter received by the George Lutz family from one of the students who spent Thanksgiving in Alpine.

Spencerville  
March 5, 1965

Dear friends

Here a few words from me again. It is already a long time since my last letter, but don't think that I will ever forget all those wonderful people in Alpine, California.

I want to thank you yet for the nice pictures you sent me. They are very nice. I think I can hardly imagine the beautiful weather we had, and probably you still have there, because after we came back in the north it was all snow and very cold. And we have still snow. Last week we had an awful lot of snow. A terrible blizzard hit the whole state of Indiana. For two days we were blocked up. We could not go anywhere and during that time we had no mail and no papers, we just listened to the radio or T.V. All the schools were closed in our area and even some factories. This was Thursday and Friday. Saturday we started to make the roads open with the tractor with a big scoop in front. The county roads, the main roads were kept open all the time already. But our own county road, to get to the main road, we had to do it ourself. Because even the snowplow got stuck. Some farmers had to drain a lot of milk — like our neighbour — about 3000 pounds of milk. For us came the milk truck just in time. We had everything what we could use clear full of milk. Only these things

were to bad of course but otherwise I did not mind it at all. It was a kind of a new experience for me. I never saw so much snow in my life. Maybe you are still wondering where am I. Well I am again on a dairy farm in Spencerville Indiana, this time. A bigger farm now. We milk 30 cows and we grow a lot of corn. At the time it is not to busy but this summer we go and work like crazy, my boss said well that is alright with me.

With my folks in the Netherlands is everything okay 100. A few weeks ago I got a letter from them and they wrote that they just had a terrible storm with strong winds. During the night people had to watch the dikes. They were afraid that the water would come over but fortunately it did not. People here in the States often think that it is very dangerous to live in the Netherlands, when I tell them that a great part of our country is below sea level. Maybe you feel the same, but I myself live pretty

close to the sea, but I never think about this danger neither other people, who live in the Netherlands. I think a person get used to this idea. My folks also got the Alpine paper with the story about our car and with our picture in it. Did you send this paper to Holland? They got to know the whole story even before I wrote to them about it. I was still busy writing them about the rest of our vacation and was not that far yet.

They wrote me back, "sometimes a person forgets but then you see again that there are wonderful people in the world who really want to help."

Well my wishes to all of you also to Harold and his wife and hope to hear again from you.
