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PASTOR'S CORNER "WHOM SEEK YE?"

When the Roman soldiers led by Judas came to apprehend Jesus, He asked them, "Whom seek ye?" And they answered "Jesus of Nazareth."

Especially at this season of the year we should ask ourselves this same question, "Whom seek ye?" Are we seeking Jesus of Nazareth? Is our whole heart set on finding Him? These Romans searched for Him long after nightfall at inconvenience to themselves, at the risk of danger from His followers, as they thought, perhaps with the chance of involving themselves seriously with higher authority.

They were seeking Jesus through hatred. Do we ever seek Him through love? Does the love which we profess lead us to keep a special watch over ourselves for Our Lord? Do we always pray even in our own rooms before committing ourselves to the mystery of sleep? Is our love outdone by the hatred of the enemies of Christ?

Christ has told us how we must seek Him. "If any man would come after Me," He said, let him take up his cross." And again He said "Learn of Me to be meek and humble of heart." Are we

seeking Jesus of Nazareth in this way? Are we taking up our cross, whatever it be, resolutely and cheerfully? Or are we continually seeking to avoid it? That is the test by which we can answer our question accurately, "Whom seek ye?" If we are complaining and rebellious, if we kick not really seeking Jesus no matter what we profess. Anyone who will not take up his cross and carry it bravely is not following Christ.

If we examine our lives truthfully we will have to admit that we spend only a few moments each day (if that, in thinking of God, and the rest of our time has been absorbed in temporal affairs. Only a fraction of our energy has gone into prayer and God's kingdom... the rest has gone into making money, seeking social position, learning the things of time.

Actions speak louder than words, and despite the profession of Christianity, the actions of most persons proclaim that they are really seeking Mammon. At least the greatest part of their time and energy goes into the service of Mammon, and a very small part into the service of God. From all appearances they are not seeking Jesus.

Certainly they are not seeking Him as earnestly as they are seeking other things. Perhaps this means that they are seeking Him as His enemies sought Him that night of Holy Week. Christ said that he who was not with Him was against Him. Hence... one must seek Jesus in one way or the other... either to imitate Him, to follow Him, to be happy with Him forever; or else as His enemy, as one who wishes to crucify Him.. "Whom do you seek?... and how do you seek Him?"

LIBRARY

National Library Week is a good time to remember the early history of the Alpine Library. During the first year of the new century several Alpine citizens organized a public library for the community. The library still uses the same location today, but there have been many changes. At first there was no librarian on duty. To borrow books one got the key from the Alpine Store and then signed the record book at the store for the books borrowed. A branch of the San Diego County Free Library was established in December, 1914, in the same room with Alpine's Civic Library and a regular attendant was hired, according to facts given in the book, ALPINE HISTORY, A BRIEF ACCOUNT OF EARLY DAYS, written by Beatrice La Force, an Alpine resident and past librarian. Mrs. James C. Ansell who served as librarian about thirty years ago recalls the \$1,000.00 willed to the library association about 50 years ago because a man was grateful for the library that his son used. This money was deposited and the interest used to buy non-fiction books for the library. When the association disbanded a few years ago, the money on hand was given to the Alpine Women's Club to be used for major repair work on the building. Comdr. Rudy Oeser, former treasurer, recalls that money was raised for the library by teas and shows. The last of these was a play, "The Carpenter and the Siren," written and directed by Mrs. La Force and presented in the Alpine School auditorium by a local cast. Other persons still living in Alpine who worked with the library in the early years are Mrs. L. E. Carlson, Mrs. R. W. Darnell, Mrs. M. E. Bowlus,

and Comdr. F. R. McDonnell. Mrs. Lillian Oliver, present librarian, is an author herself. Mrs. Bowlus is in charge when Mrs. Oliver is away. The library is open on Tuesday and Thursday from 1 to 5 P. M. and Saturday from 10 A. M. to 2 P. M.

Myron Smith and his wife Donna have moved from their home in Alpine. They are now residents of El Centro.


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BARBECUE SUCCESS

Gardener's Checklist
by Calif. Assn. of Nurserymen

1. When first buds start forming, feedings in the rose garden bring bigger and better blooms in May. Ample water is just as important.
2. Plant dahlias and gladiolus. Begonia seedlings will show up in nurseries this month.
3. Check irrigation basins around citrus. Soil should be mounded to keep water from direct contact with the tree.
4. The list of annuals for planting this month is as long as your arm. Check nurseries for ideas.
5. Bait for snails and slugs. Spray for aphids, thrips and leaf hoppers on roses. Insect control is easy when you start before they do.
