PREVENT FOREST FIRES

Portions of the Cleveland National Forest will be closed to all types of public use or entry during the high fire hazard summer months as a fire prevention measure effective July 1, according to Forest Supervisor, Stanley R. Stevenson.

The area closed consists of the inaccessible, steeper chaparral covered slopes of the primary mountain watersheds and represents about one-fourth of the area of the Cleveland National Forest.

All campgrounds and main roads within the areas closed are open to public use.

Those areas that have been closed to public use or entry due to high fire hazard will be posted with "Closed Area" signs at all road and trail entrances and at intervals along the boundaries. Persons who are in doubt as to the location of closed areas should inquire at the nearest Ranger Station.

Gardener's Checklist

by Calif. Assn. of Nurserymen

1. All hibiscus like a mulch to keep roots cool during the hot weather, as well as filtered sun for best show of summer-to-fall color.
2. Raise the blades on your lawn mower as taller grass won't be scorched as readily by the hot summer sun. Follow a regular watering, feeding and weeding schedule to keep lawn green and vigorous throughout this season.
3. Prune shrubs that bloomed in spring, such as: weigela, spiraea, forsythia and philadelphus. Thin and cut back branches to help along new flowering wood.
4. Blooming fuchsias are ready at C. A. N. nurseries for you to set in the ground, or grow in containers for the patio, or in hanging baskets. Keep fuchsias well-watered. Occasionally, it's a good idea to submerge the entire pot in a pan of water during hottest weather to saturate the root ball.
5. With blut hydrangeas, the C. A. N. suggests generally a monthly application of aluminum sulfate (1/4 ounce dissolved in a gallon of water) to heighten blueness in blue varieties. What cooler sight on a summer's day than hydrangea with its massive blue blooms thriving in a shady site?

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"OUR NATIONAL GUARDIANS"
July 4th, as we observe the 184th anniversary of our national independence, it is altogether fitting that we pause to honor the 470,000 men of our Army and Air National Guard. It was the early Militia -- from which today's National Guard has evolved -- that formed the nucleus of Washington's Continental Army. Thus the militia played an instrumental role in winning our independence.
We are all familiar with the Guard's primary mission of providing trained and equipped combat units to the active Army and Air Force. To enable itself to meet this mission, the Guard, through years of hard work and devotion, has achieved the highest degree of combat readiness in its peacetime history.
The National Guard is by no means resting on the laurels of past glories. Plans are now underway to assign a secondary mission to the National Guard of assisting in national recovery in the event of an atomic attack.
After a nuclear holocaust, no nation will be able to commit itself completely to ground action until it has recovered from the shock at home. This includes restoring order, caring for the wounded, reestablishing communications, and opening up roads. Here is where the National Guard comes in. Being dispersed throughout the nation, it will be able to withstand the atomic shock without crippling losses. Having highly trained, well-equipped units in 2600 communities, it is the logical force to assist in such a recovery operation in every area. It has the planes, tanks, ambulances, hospital equipment and just plain manpower to do the job.
The recovery plan makes sense and the desire to carry it out is laudable. It serves to remind us that the National Guard system is just as vital on Independence Day 1960 as it was in 1776.
