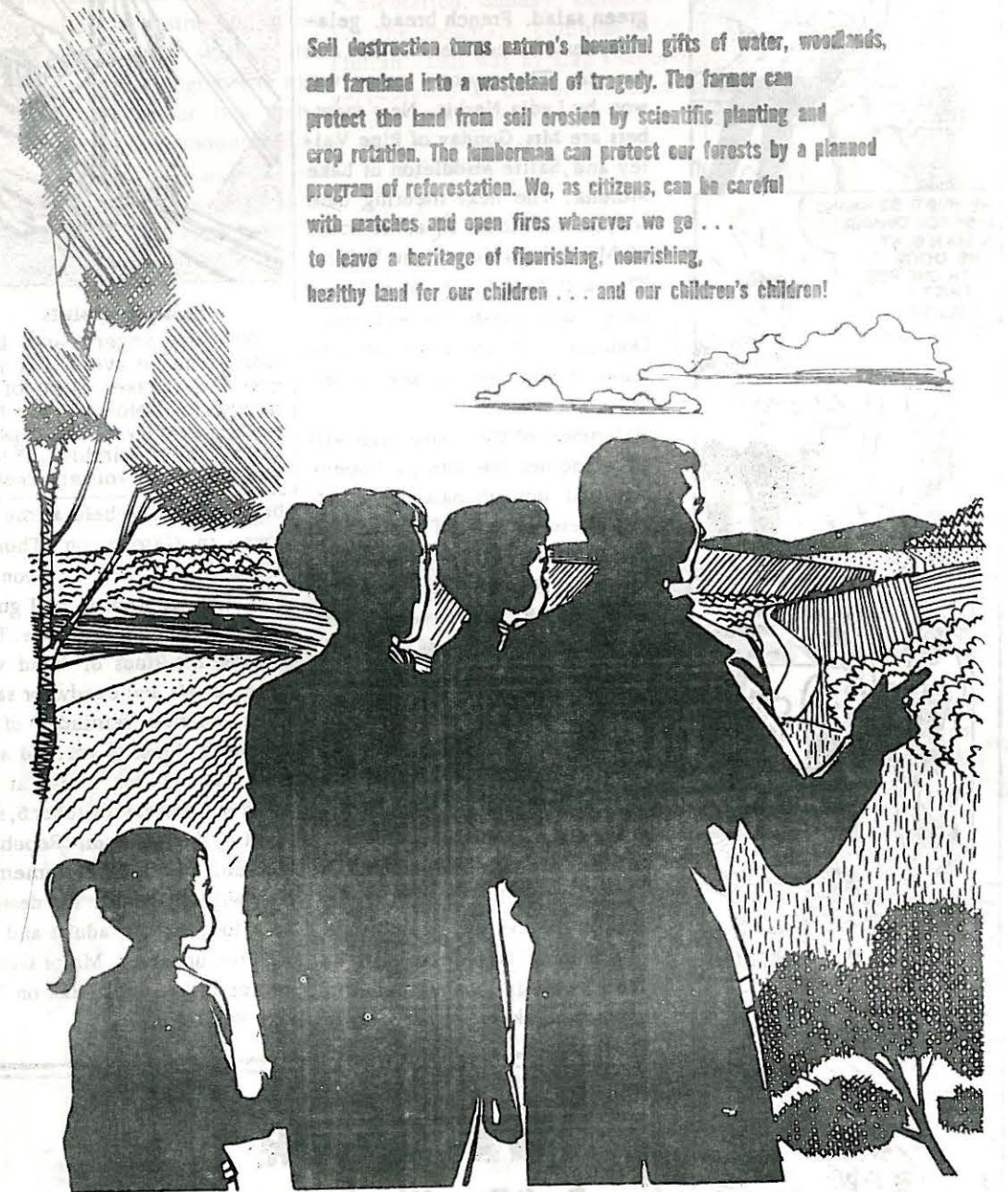

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WAR DIARY by BERT FULLER PART 10

The two Gunmechs wouldn't give up. They worked another and the following day the second shell was fired - still no explosion. They decided that the RPM of the muzzle velocity of the mortar was not enough to trip the fuse when fired. During the remainder of the afternoon we blasted the Cavite shoreline with our last fourteen inch and mortar. Our intelligence crew told us that the church at Naic had been taken over by the Nips for an ammo dump. We got three hits on it and no more church. It had been full of HE ammo.

The Nips broadcast over the Manila radio that we were bombing and shelling the churches, killing the natives by the thousands. That started a propoganda campaign that lasted until the surrender. What the hell had they done to the churches of Manila?

Two subs loaded officers from General MacArthur's staff, Army and Navy G-2, nurses and patients on the night of April 26, 1942 and shoved off with the Nips never knowing they had been near the south dock of Corregidor. Commander Bridget received word to report to General Wainwright and shoved off at daylight the 27th. About noon he called me and said to join him not later than 7 p. m. on Corregidor. Abie Call knew I would get the dope from the Commander and he followed me around all afternoon. I knew what the Commander wanted. It was to be a going away party. I was wondering what had happened to our original plans. Why hadn't the Commander said for all hands to stand by for the planes which I knew would be in or the Commander wouldn't have called.

I told Abie to be on the dock at 6 p. m. Abie and I had been close to each other but that wasn't the reason for asking him to be there. He was the only bombsight man we had in the islands. He had been ordered out previously but had not been able to make the sub when it came in. We arrived at Corregidor and reported to the Commander in General Wainwright's headquarters. The General was telling the Commander that he knew the planes had been requested by the Commander but that the passenger list had been changed in Australia at General Mac's headquarters. The revised list read "Officers and nurses only". That left Abie and me out.

The Commander told us on the side to be on the boats when they left the dock to go out in the bay and wait for the planes to arrive. Abie boarded one motor boat and I the other along with Commander Bridget. The two planes sat down just south of Fort Hughes and we pulled alongside and when the waist hatch of RN1 opened, who should stick his head out and yell at us but Lieutenant Commander Nealle, one of the PatWingTen squadron commanders who had flown to Australia at the fall of Cavite. The first few seconds were glorious ones. It was good to see him again but better still to listen to him talk.

He had with him some medicine, fuses for our AA guns and other things. They were loaded into the whale boat and the passenger were taken aboard. Commander Nealle (Greezy) told me to take over the tail gun and make myself scarce but I was spotted by an Army General who asked Commander Bridget if I were on the passenger list. The Commander had to tell him no but tried to explain that I had volunteered to say with him when I could have gone out with the wing commander.

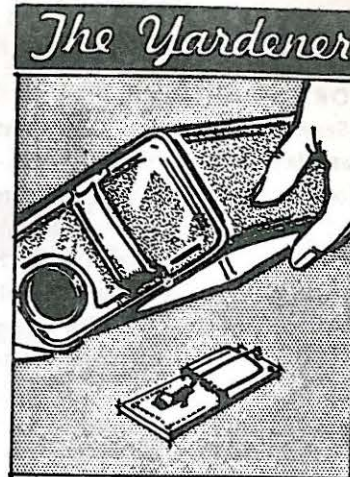

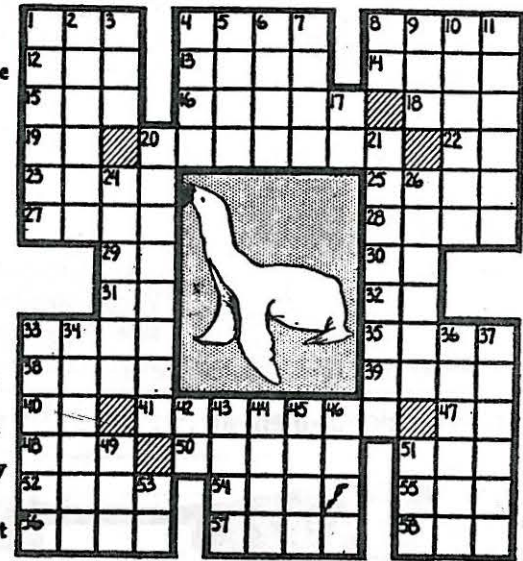

The Alpine Community Church last Sunday welcomed into membership Mr. and Mrs. Dick A. Robinson, Jackie Welty and Kathy Bates.

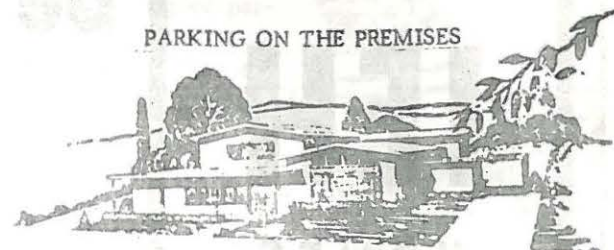
Sunday evening at the Pilgrim Fellowship meeting of the church young people Ronnie Rose and Jackie Welty joined the group.

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
