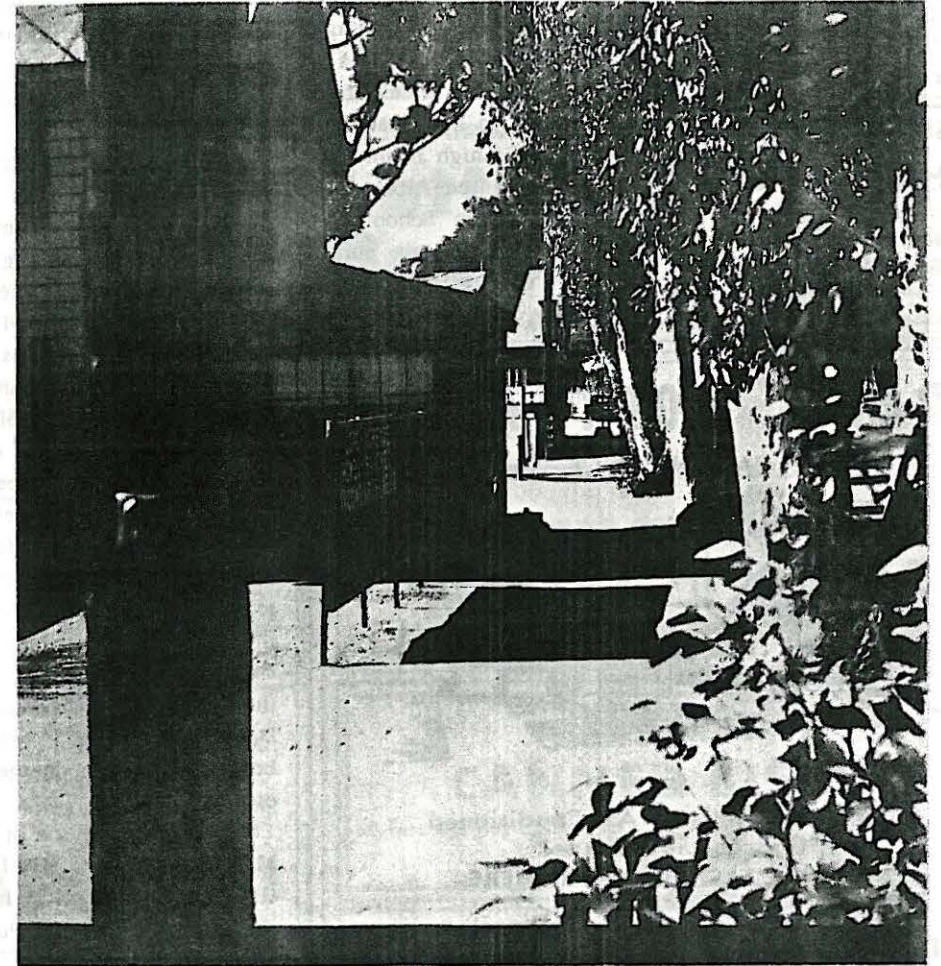

COMBINATION BLOTTER AND PAPERWEIGHT: Using the plaster mold of a Cub Scout we painted the molded statuette, glued it to a three inch square block of wood, one inch thick. Gardener's Checklist
 by the Calif. Assn. of Nurserymen
 1. There's no fruit like home-grown fruit. Check with your nurseryman to find the best for your garden.
 2. Plant wistaria this month. The new shoots should be guided with string in the direction you want them to grow.
 3. For a ground cover you can forget about once it's established, try one of the low growing native Ceanothus varieties.
 4. Light feeding this month will insure that your lawn gets off to a good start next month as weather warms up.
 5. Check ties on climbing roses when you prune them to make sure the brittle canes are secure.

FRUIT TREES

Success in growing fruit trees in the garden depends on two things: whether the variety you plant is suited to your area and whether its particular cultural needs will be met by you. Of the two, the former is probably more important.

Strange as it may seem, and despite annual warnings from the California Association of Nurserymen, gardeners persist in planting fruit varieties that are not adapted to the climate in which they live. Or perhaps it's not so strange when you consider that California has so many different climates in which to live.

Before you plant any fruit tree, whether peach, pear, or whatever, check with a local C. A. N. member nursery as to variety. If you have plenty of space and are willing to take less than the potential crop, you can plant a favorite variety even if it is marginal; but when space is limited, you want the most for your money.

As to cultural demands, there are fruit trees which have few, if any, and others which require some care in pruning or spraying. These latter are worth the extra care, however. We know of no one who stops at planting peaches simply because he has to spray them annually to get a better crop.

Easiest of our garden fruits and nuts are figs, pomegranates, and quinces, since they require almost no attention once they're established. And if you fancy pecans or chestnuts in the fall you can plant them and forget them until they start bearing. Walnuts require little more attention; but you need space aplenty to plant them.

Apricots, plums, prunes, and cherries are only mildly demanding. You can actually ignore their needs and still harvest good crops, but occasional pruning and/or

ALPINE MUSIC FESTIVAL

The second annual music festival of the Alpine Schools is scheduled for March 10, 8 p. m. in the school auditorium. The general pattern of last year's concert will be followed.
