While the air was fine the one fault in the location of the house was that it was a long way from any natural water and our little girl found it necessary to make many tiring trips to a spring about a quarter mile away.

Every day she had to carry water until she came to wish with all her heart that the spring were not so far away. Then one day she thought of praying and she spent many hours praying that a spring might be found at the very doorstep of her home. To all appearances her prayer was never answered or at least if answered then the answer seemed to be NO.

Our girl grew up and married but the feeling that prayer had failed her persisted through all had life and she never had much faith until only a few years ago she visited her younger sister who now lived in the old house and she arrived in time to see the first use of a new water system that brought the spring right into the kitchen.

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Gardener's Checklist

by the Calif. Assn. of Nurserymen

1. Feed azaleas, camellias and rhododendrons if it's been a month or six weeks since their last meal.
2. Shop for container grown roses in bloom. In your garden keep faded rose blooms cut off.
3. Plant the dwarf dahlias for a quick show of color.
4. Feed potted and container grown fuchsias and begonias with liquid fish fertilizer.
5. Water lawns deeply to discourage shallow rooting. Use a soaker on sloping lawns to prevent needless runoff.

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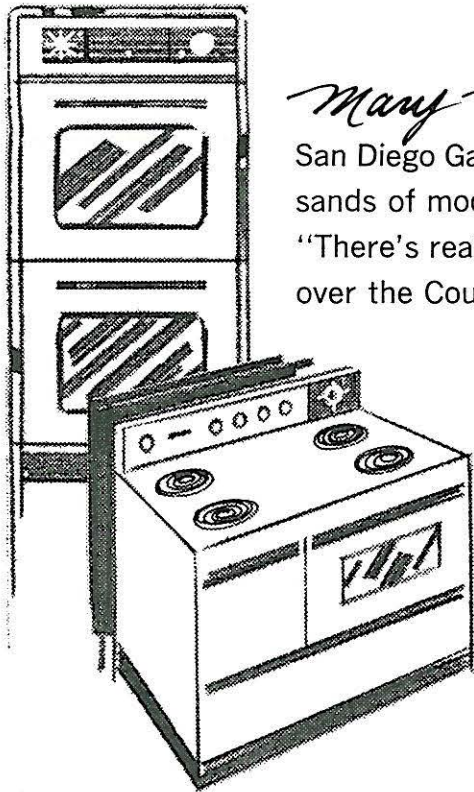
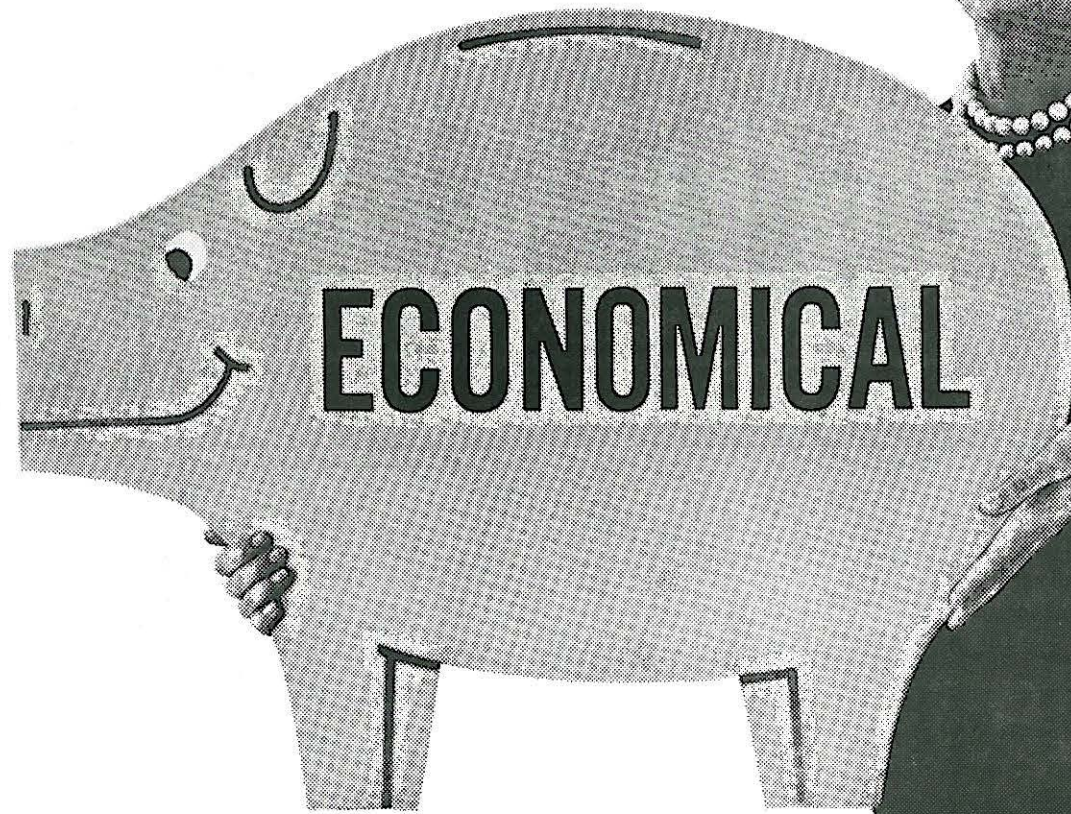

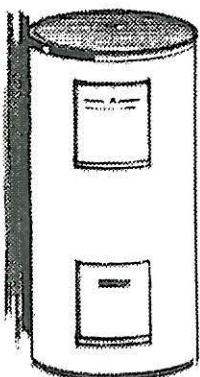

The Role of Fats

This is an era when most people are talking about diet, and a lot of them are doing something about it.

Probably the most important factor is total caloric intake—just the simple fact of how much you eat. But the role of various types of fats has been under scrutiny.

Particularly, scientists have taken a close look at the possible relationship of fats and oils and cholesterol in hardening of the arteries and heart disease.

Experiments have indicated that polyunsaturated fats in the diet actually reduce blood cholesterol levels. Unsaturated fats are the type found in abundance in such substances as cottonseed oil.



Nutrition authorities have pointed out that table margarine offers an excellent method for introducing these unsaturated fats into the diet, and the food industry has been able to adapt its processing accordingly.

GIVE YOUR GARDEN A COLOR TRANSFUSION

It's a good bet, when summer nears, that your garden needs a transfusion of color. The sudden burst of spring has faded. Bare spots are beginning to show. And unless you act now, it won't get much better.

The logical transfusion should come in the form of bedding annuals--those workhorses of the garden. Set out now, they will be ready to carry the burden of color in a few short weeks, and some, indeed, will start showing their blooms almost from the start.

June is a good month still to plant marigolds--both the dwarf and giants. Use the dwarfs to edge a walk, the taller ones to back a border.

Zinnias should be planted in a sunny bed--the sunnier the better. Here is one annual that most gardeners prefer in mixed colors and you will probably agree. The California Association of Nurserymen also suggests:

Asters in rows for cutting or in beds for display; petunias in beds of pure or mixed colors or in planter boxes where their trailing habit can be used to advantage; annual phlox in beds of mixed colors; snapdragons in mixed or single colors and stocks in beds of a single color, unless your taste dictates mixing them.

Before transferring any bedding plants from the nursery flats to your garden, take a few licks at the bed in which you are to plant them. Turn the soil to a depth of at least 12 inches and work in steer manure. If your soil is heavy or compacted, follow this by working in a commercial soil conditioner. Then water the bed thoroughly so that the young plants won't go into a dry soil.

After-planting care should include cultivating to keep weeds down, frequent watering (prefer-

ably by irrigation or with a soaker) feeding once every month or six weeks and, if plants need it, staking. Lastly, you will be bloom ahead if, when the plants are six to eight inches high, you pinch out the terminal growth and force side branching with its subsequent increase in bloom. When the flowers come, if you keep them picked before they go to seed, you will have a summer of color for sure.

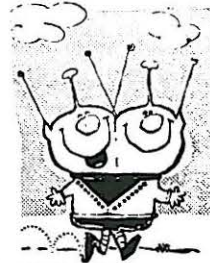

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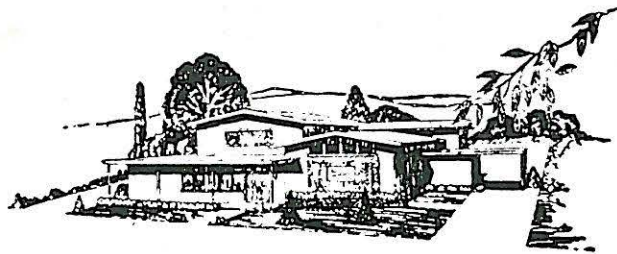
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
