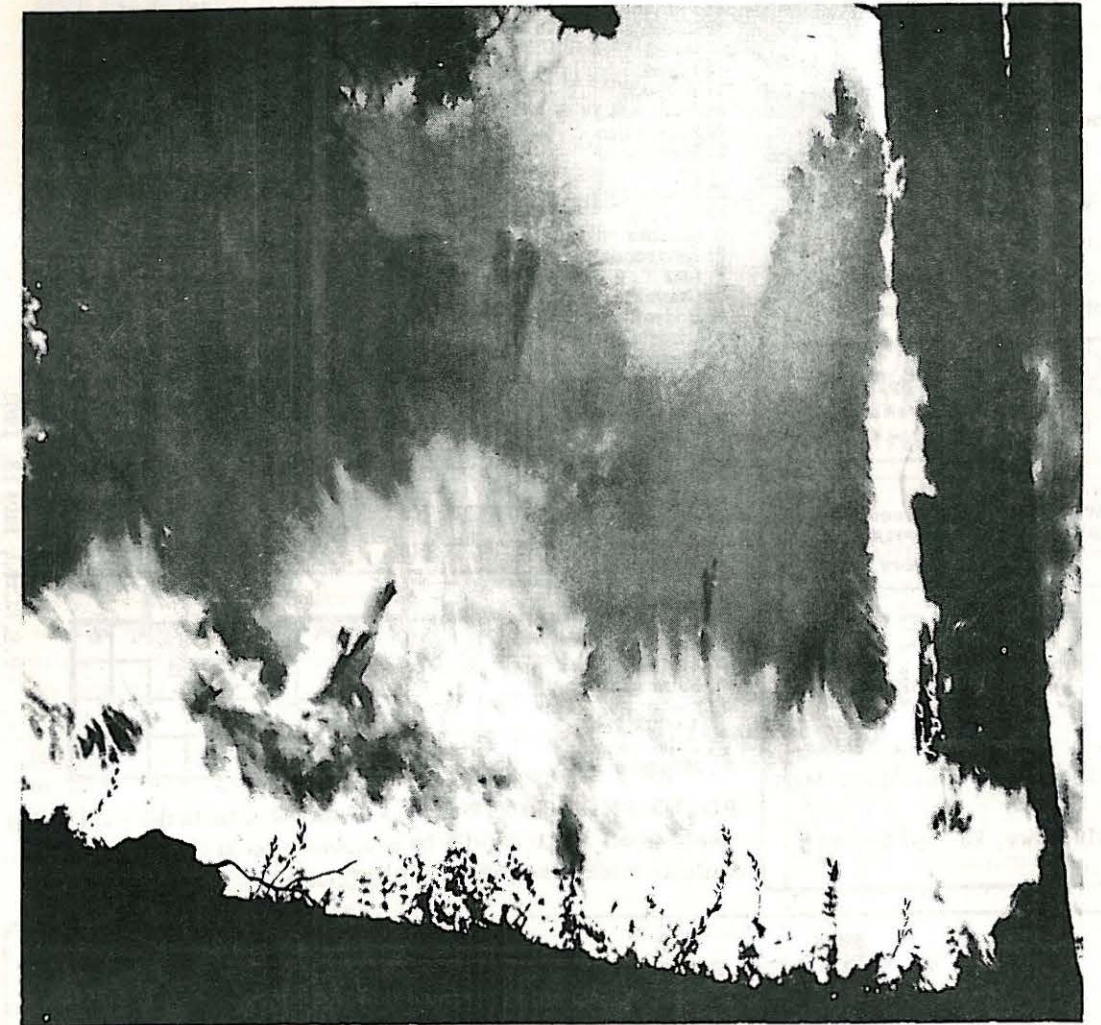

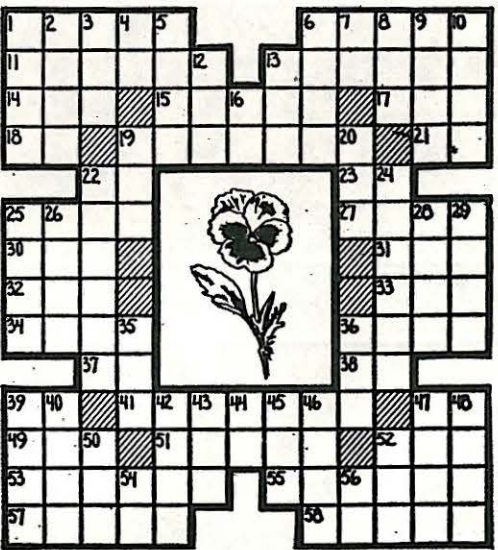

**TODAY'S PROBLEMS**

When our primitive ancestors lived in caves and wandered the forests as lone hunters they needed some explanation of the powers that influenced their lives and some kind of rules for living in harmony with the world about them and with their fellowmen.

As man progressed many inspired and sincere thinkers contributed to man's knowledge and wisdom of the Infinite Spirit that we call God and to our knowledge of natural and social law. The names used were many, the ideas varied and often primitive but gradually mankind came to understand more and more. It should not be thought that any religion or race or culture or philosophy was perfect. Even in our own Bible we have many evidences that the early Jewish people thought of their God in a primitive way that would seem unreasonable to us. But as each age came man has preserved the best of the ancient wisdom and found new concepts to make the truth a vital part of his daily life.

This is today's problem. If religion is to be vital it must be a part of daily living. It cannot be a mystical belief in outgrown concepts that seem fantastic or unreal, but must be a central part of life as we know it. It must make sense and it must make our lives happier, more interesting, and more secure.

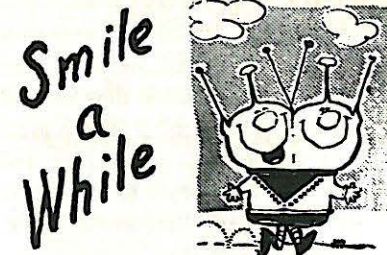

## TESTING DATE SET FOR GROSSMONT COLLEGE

An additional testing date for students interested in classes at Grossmont College has been set for administration at either 8:30 a. m. or 7:00 p. m. on July 18th at Grossmont High School in Room 174. These tests are required for completion of registration. The tests will last approximately 3 1/2 hours.

All regular day students as well as extended day students who are candidates for a degree must complete the entire testing program. Persons interested in a part-time enrollment, either day or extended day, need to take only the first half of the test battery, which will be two hours in length. All these tests are for placement purposes only and do not limit the opportunity to enroll in the college, it was announced by Laurance E. Coons, Dean of Admissions.

If a student completed the entrance examination for Grossmont College on May 20th or 27th no further testing is necessary. If the student has taken entrance examinations at any other college no further testing will be required, provided these test results are sent to Grossmont College. If a course in college level reading and composition has been successfully completed at another college, then no further entrance examinations are necessary.

The entrance tests will be offered next on August 17th. Admission to the college is not complete until the testing program has been satisfied, application has been made for entrance to the college, and transcripts of all high schools and previous college attended have been mailed to the Admissions Office, Grossmont College, 3230 Sweetwater Springs Blvd. Spring Valley, California.

Stanley R. Stevenson, Forest Supervisor of the Cleveland National Forest announces the promotion and transfer of District Ranger Edward G. Heilman to the Shasta-Trinity National Forest with headquarters in Redding, California. Ranger Heilman has served as District Ranger in charge of the Descanso District since 1958.

In his new assignment Heilman will serve on the staff of the Forest Supervisor of the Shasta-Trinity Forest with responsibilities for forest protection, fire control and related multiple use resource management activities.

Edward Heilman is a native of Montana. His Forest Service career began in 1945 as a forest fire crewman in Northern California, followed by successive assignments to fire control aid, timber management assistant, and district fire control officer.

Immediately prior to his assignment as Descanso District Ranger he served as Assistant Ranger on the same district.

Heilman received his Bachelor of Science degree in technical forestry from Montana State University in 1950. He was a member of the U. S. Air Force during the Korean campaign.

Mr. Heilman, his wife Donna and their two children, Ann 8, and Mark 6, plan to move to Redding in early July.

Mr. Stevenson states that Ranger Heilman's replacement as District Ranger of the Descanso District will be Ray Daley who is transferring from Los Padres National Forest.

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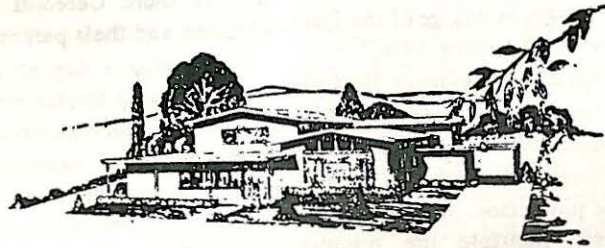
