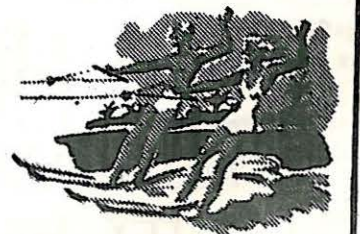

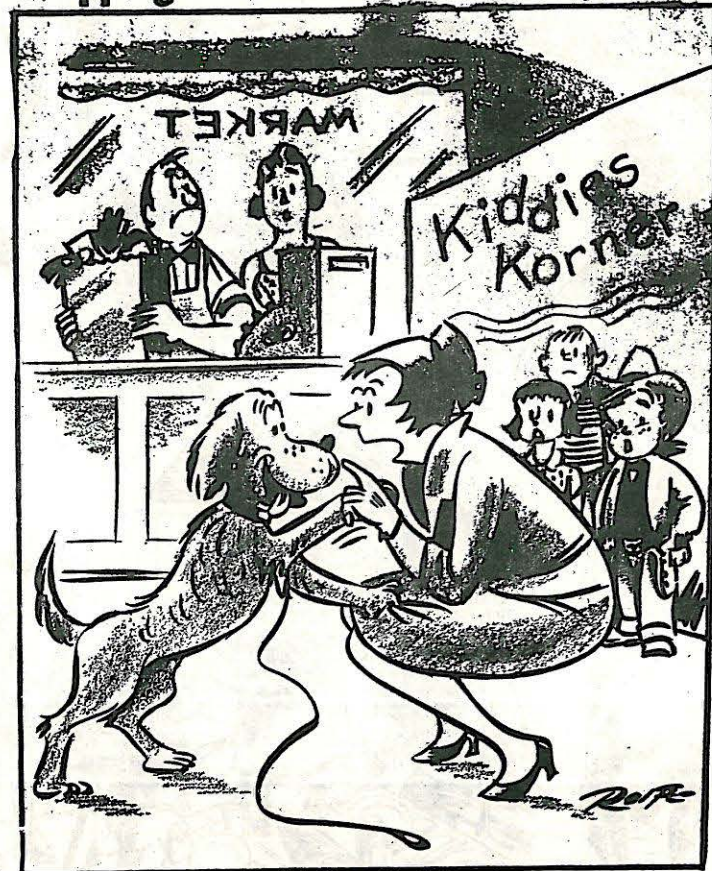

## JUVENILES

Summer has begun and many a harrassed parent is beginning to realize again that something is amiss with society's treatment of young people. During the first few weeks of vacation, many youths will be busy enough, but endless recreation soon becomes dull and as the weeks pass the days will drag and teenagers will often wonder just what to do with themselves. From such boredom comes mischief and trouble, but it is not our young people who are at fault but their elders.

Our young people need a real place in life. They need productive work that demands responsibility and perseverance that that gives them a place of dignity among their elders.

When adults plan social activities they should be planned so that young people can be included and junior and his girl should be part of the group.

(Of course, if the older people think fun is the kind of a party young people should not see, they can exclude their children, but should expect the youths to learn and emulate their example nevertheless).

Home should not be a place where teenagers feel tolerated or underfoot, but neither should they run the roost.

Our young people are good. They want to be part of the main body of society, not a separate social unit set aside. When they have such a place they will have no time or inclination toward delinquency.

## IVY, IVY, EVERYWHERE

The gardener's use for ivy is almost limitless. He can hide a barren slope with its lush cover or use it to fill a bed. It can be grown up to hide a post and cut to cover a wall. On a wire fence it will make a dense screen and in a tub it can be shaped into a mounding pyramid. You can even grow it in a pot. And even if you grew it everywhere, ivy has enough variations to ward off monotony.

When planting ivy, it is well to remember that little growth can be expected during the first year. In its second season, however, just when the gardener begins to wonder how long it will take to fill in, ivy really takes off. And on walls and trellises it's much the same. After taking a while to set its aerial roots firmly, all at once, away it goes.

Food is seldom necessary but occasional watering helps—especially early in life. And severe pruning back when plants grow out of bounds will be necessary. This can be indiscriminately done, however, so there's no need for special care. None at all.



### Get the Edge

To keep borders around shrubs and flower pots neat and to simplify lawn care, install aluminum edge strips. Sink into the turf near the border, then dig away grass on the inside.

### Gardener's Checklist

by Calif. Assn. of Nurserymen

1. A regular feeding of acid plant food will promote more plant vigor in Bird of Paradise plants.
2. Most California native plants prefer summer dryness, so don't feel sorry for them. You can kill them with kindness.
3. If you like red in the garden, plant a bed of salvia splendens (Scarlet Sage). Give it full sun.
4. Make your final cutback on ryanthemums before the middle of July.
5. Pick seed pods off fuchsias and you will prolong bloom. Better to pick the faded blooms before they form seed pods.
