Where Does The Voter Stand?

In the recent general election held last November 6th, one of the offices voted on was that of State Senator for the 40th District of California, which includes San Diego County.

The contest for this office was between Hugo Fisher, Democratic incumbent, and Jack Schrade, Republican candidate. Mr. Schrade won the election by a rather substantial majority onsidering the fact that the majority of the registered voters in the County are registered Democrats.

A defeated incumbent is commonly called a "lame duck" while he is still holding the office after having been defeated and until his term expires. Mr. Fisher is, therefore, a "lame duck" State Senator.

While it is always the privilege of any American to be a candidate for any public office for which he is qualified, it is our opinion that it should be up to the voters to determine whether a person who had been repudiated at the polls, when seeking re-election, should be shortly thereafter elevated to high public office and that it should not be by political appointment. However, our opinion must be wrong since this quite frequently happens.

We read in the daily press that the defeated Senator is being considered for appointment to high places despite the fact that the voters refused to return him to the State

We hope this proves to be only unfounded rumor. Otherwise it would appear that not only is he a "lame duck," but that the open appointive positions are "sitting ducks," and the voters are "dead ducks."

At one point Mr. Palmer requested that all present who desired no zoning rise. A large number present started rising, but when approximately one half of those present had risen, and others were preparing to rise, Dr. Miller called for order and stated that those present who did not want any zoning should make their desires known to the County Planning Commission in writing. A number of other property owners voiced their opinion regarding proposed zoning for their property and also regarding zoning in general. Most of those who spoke were opposed to the zoning proposed for their property.

At the conclusion of the meeting, Dr. Miller stated that the planning staff would analyze the information obtained at the meeting, and would confer again with the Advisory Committee in approximately one month to determine whether any changes should be made in the zoning proposed on the preliminary zoning map before presenting a zoning recommendation for the District to the County Planning Commission. He further stated that any property owner who desired a change in the zoning of his property should write their request to the County Planning Commission.
