INTERIM ZONING PROPOSED FOR ALPINE

SCHOOL REGULATION VIOLATED BY STUDENT AND MOTHER

Mrs. Shirley Wilson and her son, who is an eighth grade student in the Alpine Junior High School, appeared at the Junior High dance held last Friday evening in the school auditorium, after the son had been informed by the school administration that he was not eligible to attend the dance on account of his citizenship grade.

The school regulations, which have been in effect for many years, provide that pupils who do not meet a minimum grade in citizenship are not permitted to attend school functions such as parties and dances. Mrs. Wilson said that when her son brought home a slip stating that he was not eligible to attend the dance that evening, she contacted two members of the School Board, whom she did not name. She stated that the first Board member that she called told her "it was strictly her own desire, that she could make up her own mind what she wanted to do. That it is strictly an administrative matter, not a School Board matter."

She further stated that she then called a second Board member and told him what the first Board member had said. The second School Board member told her that "you are entitled if you think you should go, go ahead and go. You would not be doing wrong, just do what you feel is right. I won't contradict another School Board member, and if you decide to go, we can straighten it out later and have a hearing before the Board if you wish."

Mrs. Wilson then called District Superintendent Clyde Gilley on

INTIMATE GLIMPSES

Humble people, "shepherds abiding in the fields keeping watch over their flocks by night" were the first to visit the manger at Bethlehem and to see the new born child whose influence upon humanity has been felt so profoundly for all the centuries since. The city of Bethlehem was crowded that night with all manner of people. We can imagine the Potentates of wealth and power gathered from the surrounding country with their splendid caravans; the scribes and official recorders of wonders busily taking down the facts considered pertinent to that moment of history. How importantly the agents and lackeys of the rulers must have strutted about. But none of this crowd was chosen to hear the Angel's announcement. Instead of appearing at the Inn, or a temple, or Palace, the Angel of the Lord lighted up the dark night of a sheep pasture on a silent hillside outside the city where the only observers were the humble watchers of the flock. With the faith of their kind these men led the way to the manger proving that they had been well chosen.

Many smaller wonders have also been discovered by the unsophisticated, the unjaded, those still able to follow a star, or, as in the case of Jim White, in the New Mexico of 1901, to explore a hole in the hill and discover Carlsbad Caverns. A smarter man might have passed it by as a coyote den or fox lair, not expecting or believing in miracles. But Jim White saw something different about that opening in the ground. Perhaps, he too, heard a kind of angel's announcement. A cowboy, he was riding after stray cattle when he chanced upon the entrance to the world's largest limestone caverns and stopped to investigate. Like the Shepherds on the first Christmas Eve, White told others about his discovery and led them to the places. Thus the world shares this magnificence of nature.

A lone frontiersman, John Colter, in 1806 stood amazed before the geysers and boiling springs of what we now know as Yellowstone Park. When he told what he'd seen, he was scoffed at as a teller of tales too tall even for an era of tall tales. "Colter's Hell" they called the land he described and called him crazy. Years passed before he was vindicated when the area was finally explored.

The oldest living thing on earth, the General Sherman redwood tree, in Sequoia, already 2000 years old when Christ was born, was discovered by a hunter, James Wolverton, as he wandered alone in the vast forest. Picture his awe as he gazed up at that 280 feet of antiquity towering into the blue California sky. They say the first white man to see our Yosemite valley was also a hunter, Wm. Penn Abrams, who got lost while tracking a bear and thus wandered into the area. He described the great cliffs and waterfall and towering jagged peaks in

The program of establishing interim zoning as explained by Mr. Matley consists of preparing new zoning maps revised to conform to the zoning tentatively decided upon by the staff members and the Committee, and presenting these maps to the Planning Commission with a request that they be forwarded to the Board of Supervisors for the passing of an ordinance to establish the proposed zoning as the interim zoning to govern the use of the property until public hearings can be held regarding the tentative zoning and a final zoning determination.

SCHOOL BOARD PUBLIC MEETING

The Board of Trustees of the Alpine Union School District held last Monday night the first public meeting to present and discuss the various items that would be considered for the next year's budget. The Board, at their regular meeting the previous Monday, had announced that a series of meetings would be held in order to provide an opportunity for the public to be advised of the manner in which next year's budget would be considered and the manner in which funds could be made available to cover the cost of the educational program for the district.

Mr. Clyde Gilley, District Superintendent, conducted the meeting by outlining the phases of education which were required by state law and the phases of education that were optional for the district, and also, the other incidental services such as transportation that are required to be taken into consideration when establishing a budget.

Mr. Gilley further explained that the state law also presents certain limitations and restrictions on the expenditure of funds for educational purposes, one of which is the requirement that at least 60 percent of the total budget be spent for teachers' salaries, unless an exemption is granted to the district for sufficient reasons.

At the conclusion of Mr. Gilley's presentation, Chairman John R. Reynolds of the School Board asked for questions from the audience and from the other members

Leading roles of mortal Englishmen will be sung by James Orvick, Leonard Johnson and Jack Krefting. Leading ladies include Grace Carlisle, Judith Taylor, Judith Sinclair, Suzanne Pearson, Paula Chastain, and Anne Stock. Cast and chorus total thirty.

Alpine C of C Meeting

The Alpine Chamber of Commerce held its regular monthly meeting December 12th at the Alpine Youth Center. A report by a special committee on acquiring fire hydrants through the federal government's matching funds program brought forth a lengthy discussion. The committee will study the problem further, with a view to ascertaining the feelings of local taxpayers.

In preparation for the annual Membership Drive to be held in January, President Dick Harris appointed Al Hinkle as Chairman of the Membership Committee. Also appointed, as Chairman of the Public Relations Committee, was Orville Palmer.

Norman Foster, Chairman of the Horse Show Committee, announced that the official 1963 date for the Chamber's Second Annual Horse Show had been approved for August 3rd and 4th.

Christmas Recital On Carillon

Paul Peery, carillonneur for the Ona May Lowe Chimes in Balboa Park, will present his 16th Christmas recital on the carillon at 2 p.m. on Dec. 25. The program is sponsored by the San Diego Park and Recreation Department.

In addition to well-known Christmas hymns, the program will include carols of England, Poland, Sweden, and Sicily. The recital will begin with "Canterbury Bells," which has been Peery's identifying signature on the carillon for 35 years.

Alpiners were serenaded last Sunday evening by a group of Pilgrim Fellowship junior and high school students numbering twenty in all, including the drivers of the automobiles. Rev. Larson and this group toured many of the local residences, stopping at each to sing between 3 and 4 songs. They plan on caroling again Sunday, December 23.

RIDERS STOP IN ALPINE

One day about a week ago an unusual sight was seen in the center of Alpine. Two horseback riders with two pack horses rode through town on Highway 80, and stopped for lunch at the Alpine Cafe.

The riders were Frank Hill and his daughter Janaloo. They were enroute from the ghost town of Shakespeare, near Lordsburg, New Mexico, to San Diego. They left Shakespeare on October 14th, making a number of two- and three-day stops on the way. Mr. Hill estimated that their trip was close to 700 miles, and all of it was on horseback. The same four horses had come all the way from Shakespeare to Alpine, and were used alternately each day as riding horses or pack horses. The good condition of the horses spoke well for the Hill's knowledge of horsemanship.

The trip was being made for the purpose of advertising the Ghost Town, and Janaloo gave a number of performances of a one-character play which depicts the history of Shakespeare. The last performance before reaching Alpine was at Yuma, and a performance was planned for San Diego as soon as arrangements could be made.

Mr. Hill stated that their return trip would not be by horseback. He said the trip across country had been fine, and that they had missed all the rains along the way, and had perfect weather.

After their lunch, they continued to jog down the highway on their way to spend the night at one of the stables this side of El Cajon, and would then go on into San Diego the following day.

Cutting Of Christmas Trees Banned

Special patrols and increased vigilance by Forest Service officers were established this week to prevent cutting of young trees on National Forest lands. Forest Supervisor Stanley R. Stevenson stated that no permits or sales of Christmas trees will be made this year from the Cleveland National Forest.

Stevenson states that the production of young conifers such as fir, pine, and cedar has not been adequate to replace heavy losses during the current drouth cycle. Losses have been caused by various insects and tree diseases that usually flare up during drouth years. Since the survival of planted stock has also been poor during the past few years the maintenance of our conifer stand depends chiefly on the growth and protection of the forest's young growing stock.

Several Christmas tree growers in San Diego County offer growing trees for selection and cutting by those who like to make such an occasion a family outing. One is located between Ramona and Santa Ysabel and one between Santa Ysabel and Julian. Both are along State Highway 78.

Sales receipts are usually considered adequate identification for a purchased tree. San Diego County Ordinance and State law require that a written permit be obtained from the landowner or his agent before trees, shrubs, greens or similar materials are cut or transported. The local State Highway Patrol Office and the County Sheriff's Office have promised full cooperation in checking for Christmas tree violations this season.

County Residents Sip Sabin Type II

Residents of San Diego County sipped Sabin Type II vaccine at the rate of 43,468 doses each hour for a total of 304,274 drinks.

The last Sunday was the largest turnout during the four SOS Sundays, exceeding the next highest total on October 28 by 15,943. The totals by regions are: Region 1, San Diego, 154,917; Region 2, Chula Vista, 43,522; Region 3, El Cajon, 58,895; Region 4, Escondido, 24,281; Region 5, Oceanside, 22,629.

Dr. John A. Bishop, Chairman of the SOS program, said that 60% of the County citizen population is now immunized against Type I and II polio. "This is somewhat short of our regional goal, but we are pleased to have such a large number of residents now protected with Sabin vaccine," said Dr. Bishop, adding that San Diego County's total is one of the highest percentages among the Southern California counties.

There are many residents who took just Type I or Type II. Dr. Bishop said these people should arrange to get the other type from their family physician.

Plans for Type III will be announced later by the Medical Society and the Department of Public Health when the third type has been approved for use.

mination be made by the Board of Supervisors..

When asked regarding the time element of accomplishing the interim zoning and whether public hearings will be held in the matter, Mr. Roger Courtney, assistant to Mr. Matley, stated that it was not possible to estimate the time that it would take to prepare the interim zoning maps nor on what date the matter would come before the Planning Commission and before the Board of Supervisors. He also stated that no public hearing would be held by the Planning Commission, and that it was optional with the Board of Supervisors as to whether they would advise the Alpine property owners and have a public hearing when the matter is presented to them.

A representative of The Echo asked whether it would be possible for the Planning Department to keep the Echo informed so that it could be publicized in the newspaper. Mr. Courtney said yes, but he was immediately contradicted by Mr. Matley who stated, "No, we couldn't do that, we couldn't be bothered to have to call you. You can call us every day or every week if you wish to find out."

The Echo will use every endeavor to keep informed on the progress of the interim zoning and advise the property owners as information is obtained.

During the meeting there were approximately 19 separate requests (some with a number of names), considered from property owners who desired a change in zoning from that previously proposed. Most of the requests were denied. Several were changed from the original zoning, but not to the zoning requested, and a few were approved for the zone petitioned for by the property owner.

With the flower shops and nurseries well stocked with all the gay flowers of the season such as poinsettias, cyclamen, African violets, Christmas cactus, heathers and countless other lovely blooms and plants, you will no doubt have made your selections and will probably have a little more time now to shop for and select some plants and vines with which to add longer lasting beauty to your indoor rooms.

A whole family of philadendrons are on hand for which to choose from. There are the heart leaf climbing vines you see trained on poles covered with sphagnum moss, or use these vines in various ways in planter dishes, etc.

Then there are the tree types which gives a dramatic effect. Large lush deeply lobed leaves. Also the fiddle leaf ones which are striking, given the right setting. Lots of space and in a good looking container, either redwood box or ceramic jar.

These philodendron plants when grown indoors need to be kept well watered and fed once a month with a complete food and repot them every year or so with new soil.

Give garden books to your flower-loving friends and you won't go far wrong, or perhaps a bird feeder.

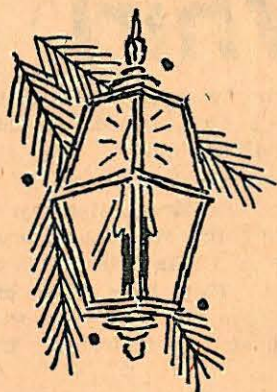
ROBERT PAUL GRIJALVA

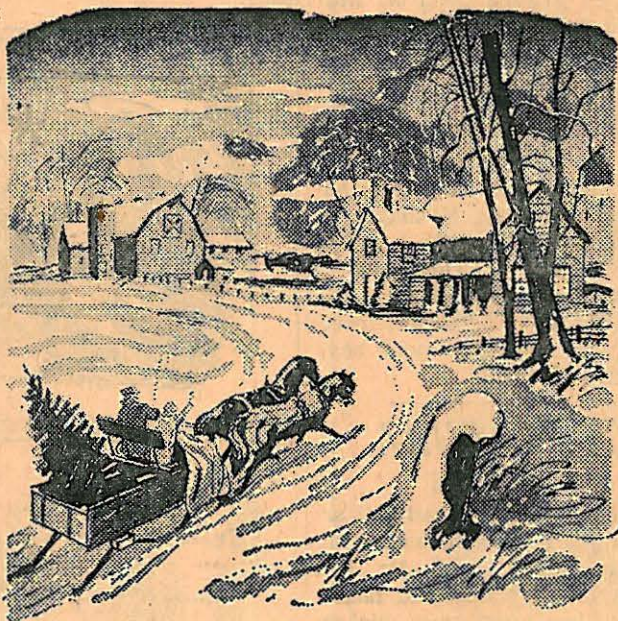

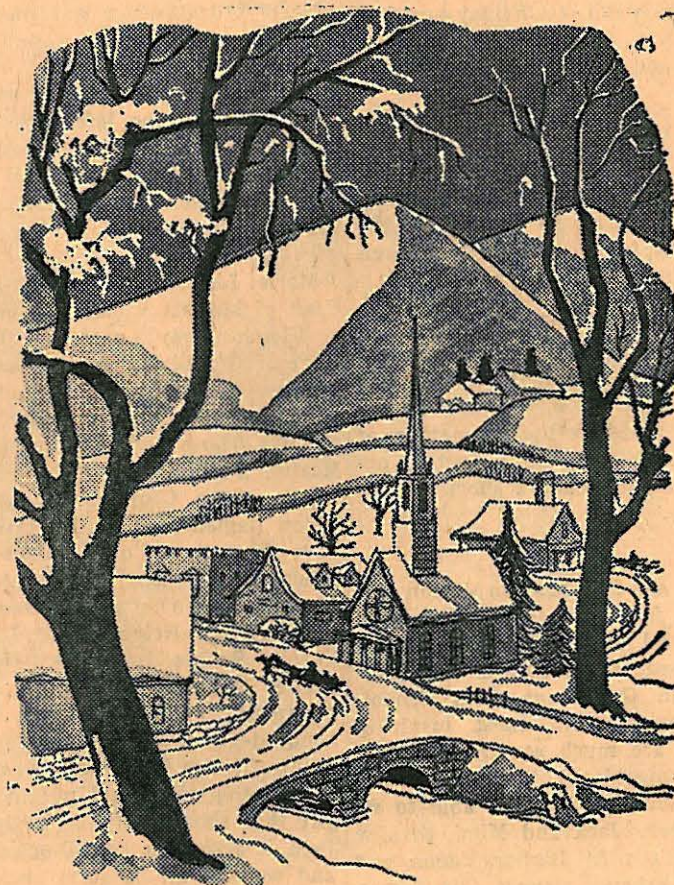


