THREE BUSINESS MEN SPONSORED BY PARENTS OF DISTRICT PUPILS

Three Declaration of Candidacy by Sponsors have been filed with the County Registrar of Voters by the Alpine Recall Committee naming candidates sponsored and endorsed by the Committee to replace school trustees John R. Reynolds, Charles Kildgore and Laurence Wilcox, if

they are recalled at the Special Recall Election to be held in the Alpine Union School District on January 8, 1963.

The three Declaration of Candidacies were signed by registered voters residing within the District and who are parents of pupils attending the Alpine schools.

The three candidates sponsored by the Committee are Paul Thorpe, of Harbison Canyon who owns and operates a chicken ranch and who is being nominated to succeed Trustee Reynolds if he is recalled, John Hoistad a resident of Alpine

SOS On Sunday, December 9

The first Polio Clinic for Type II Sabin oral vaccine was held in Alpine last Sunday, December 2, in the Auditorium of the Alpine Elementary School.

Nine hundred and ninety-one county residents sipped the sweet-tasting vaccine 80 persons lower than the 1,060 using the first clinic.

Mrs. Mary Alice Griggs, substitute Volunteer chairman reported the second clinic was conducted with smooth efficiency compared to the minor crisis of having 75 persons waiting for their first sip of the important vaccine and finding the vaccine completely frozen.

More than 1,100 physicians and surgeons in San Diego County recommend Sabin oral vaccine and urge you to take it. It is also recommended by every County Health Department in the State of California.

A contribution of 25c is requested but no one will be refused if he cannot contribute. Many people donated more than the requested fee because they felt the program was so worthwhile.

Alpine Hts. MWD Board Meets

The Board of Directors of the Alpine Heights MWD met last evening at the Community Church. Mrs. Chireen Adams, secretary of the District reported that there are approximately 165 signatures on the petitions now being circulated for the dissolution of the water district.

It is estimated that 250 signatures will be required to call the dissolution election, and Mrs. Adams predicts that this number will be obtained sometime next week.

The petitions will then be filled with the Registrar of Voters, and the probable time of the dissolution election is estimated to be sometime in February.

Assessor Reappraises Alpine District

The County Assessor's office of San Diego County is making a re-appraisal of all of the privately-owned property within the Alpine School District.

The new assessed valuations will be established as of the 1st of March of 1963, and will be the basis for the tax levies made for the 1963-1964 taxes.

Mr. Kenneth W. Cluff, Senior Appraiser in the County Assessor's office, with two assistants, has been re-appraising the buildings and structures within the school district for the past several weeks, and they are now engaged in making their re-appraisal of the land within the school district with their headquarters in the Youth Center at Alpine.

Mr. Cluff states that the tentative zonings which have been established by representatives of the County Planning Department will not be used directly in making their re-appraisal, but that the re-appraisals will be based primarily on the current land use and recent sale prices of parcels within the district.

It is estimated by Mr. Cluff that his work will be completed approximately March 1, and will be submitted to the Assessor's office for a review before being posted on the assessment rolls.

The assessment rolls, with the new assessed valuations will be available for inspection by the property owners in the Alpine School District in April and May, and Mr. Cluff states that the Assessor desires that property owners review these records at that time to ascertain the assessed valuation that has been placed on their property. Mr. Cluff further states that if zoning is established for the Alpine School District, that the zoning would be taken into account the next time the district is re-assessed which he estimates would be in four or five years.
