THE FAMOUS LOG CABIN CAFE, owned and operated by Agnes and Barney Ratliffe since March 1947, is perhaps Alpine's best known landmark today as it is right on 80 opposite the Alpine store and P.O. They remodeled it in 1948. It is noted for the big live oak that grows inside, and right out the roof. They bought it from Brady and Farris, the latter now being up at Laguna Jct. The Sun is printing 10,000 picture postcards which will be given to the thousands who visit this popular place. Old timers will remember in 1903 there was a fine well and watering trough under this same oak where the stage paused on its way to Julian, probably en route to the Valley over the steep Banner grade. The oxen yoke that is standing on one corner is a memento of those early times. Then in 1918 someone started a candy stand under the tree, later an old tram became a tiny store with refreshments. 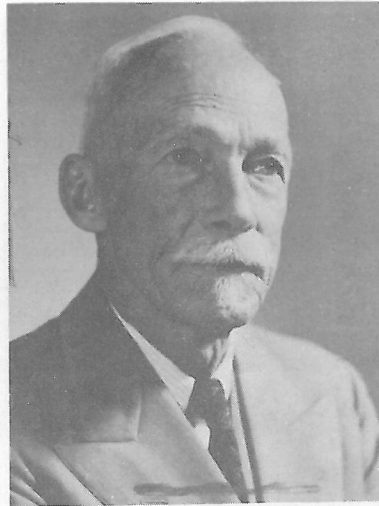

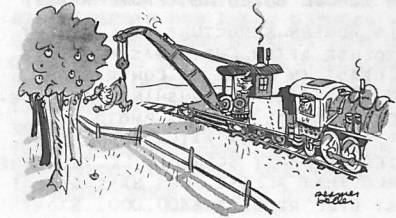
