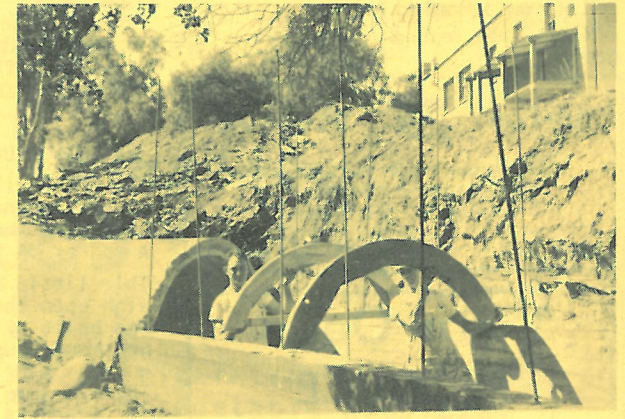
SHIRLEY NICHOLS IN SURGERY

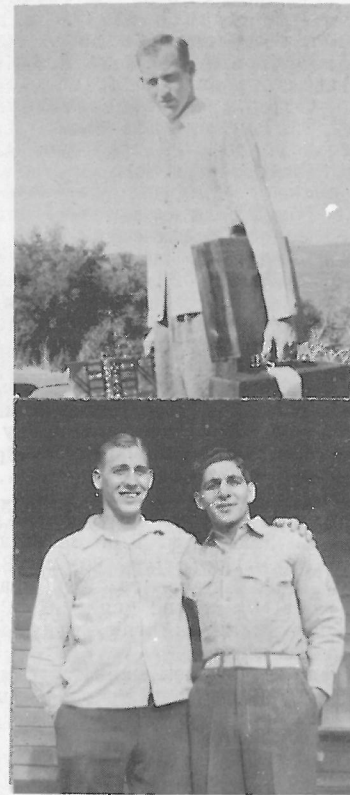

4-H GIRLS ELECTION

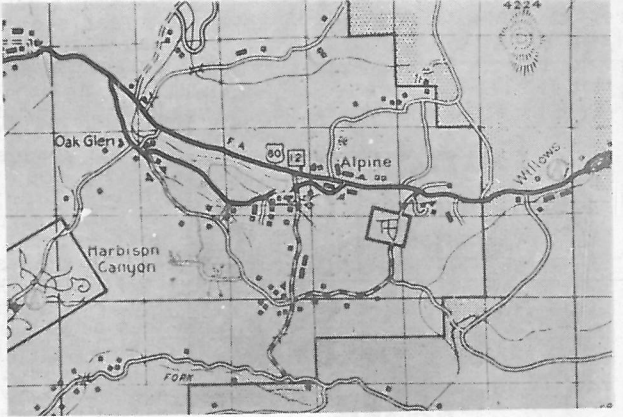

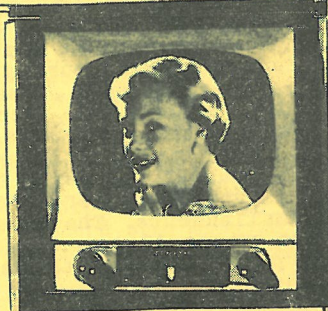
