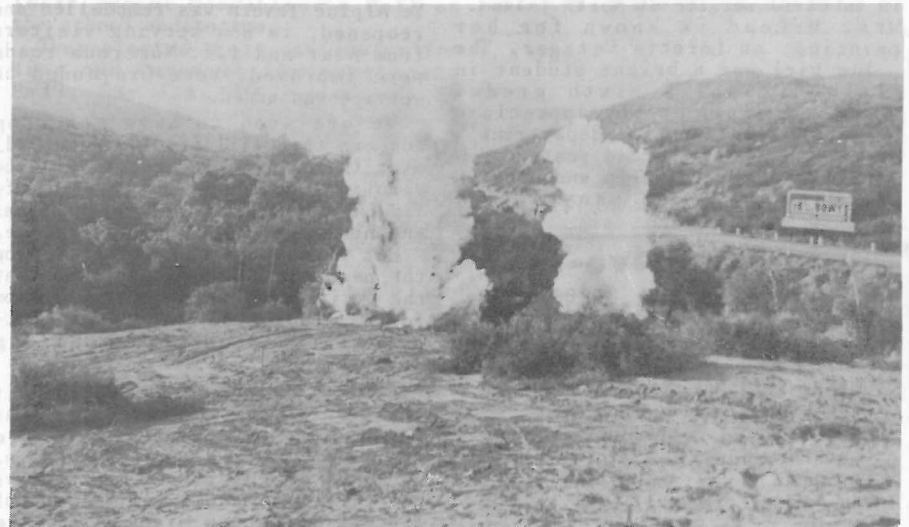

ALPINE STRAIGHT AHEAD

As the Sun enters its third year, we can see much improvement accomplished in the year just closed and more due for 1954.

Like the squirming grub within the cocoon, Alpine is about to burst forth into a lovely butterfly, a suburban community that will attract visitors from the world over, and residents from many parts of America.

Last year we dedicated the fine new school, the community church, and many splendid new homes were built. The sanitary district was voted in and work commenced. Bethel Temple was being built, the Baptists converted a beer parlor into a church while the old beer barn became our spacious firehouse. Ye Alpine Tavern was remodelled and reopened, is now serving visitors from near and far. Numerous roads were improved. More Greyhound bus service was added.

We are soon to have new phone numbers that will allow dialing all over the nation. The county will be allotting house numbers to simplify finding homes and places of business, and numerous other things are due.

The Youth Center and Community Park building will be completed soon, but more cash and labor are needed. The sewers will be in operation, then business building can proceed. All this means development and more prosperity for Alpine.

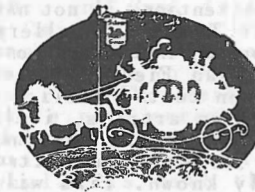

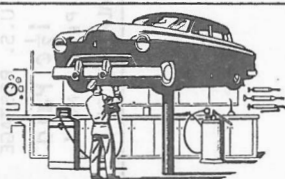

The Lethbridges and Ramsays, have left no stone unturned to make this famous old house show a real come-back. Last week they added luncheons to the dinner hour, now being open from noon to 8 p.m. Lunch is a la carte, so that the light eater may partake, or the hungry tourist get a full meal. Dinners are from \$1.65, which scotches the rumor that the place caters only to \$4. diners. 'We wish to serve everyone in Alpine,' says Mine Host Bill Lethbridge, 'and we hope to make this a gathering place for county events'.
