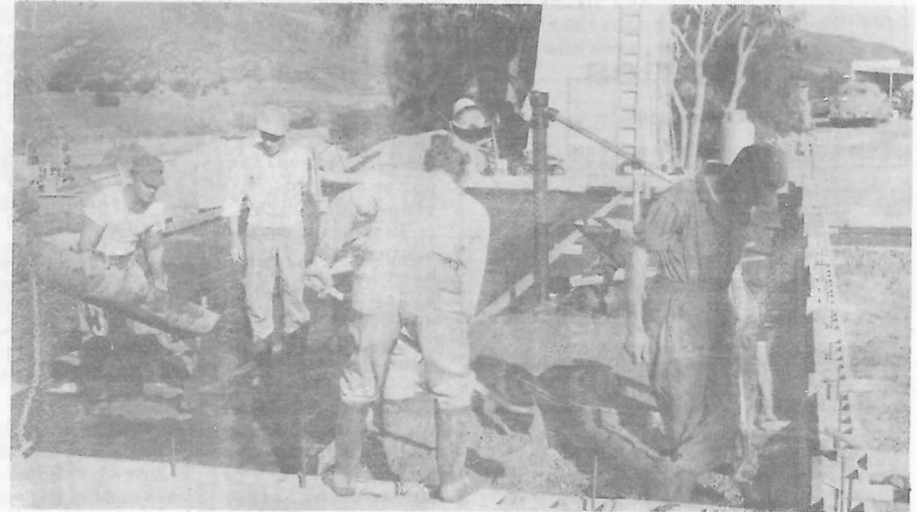

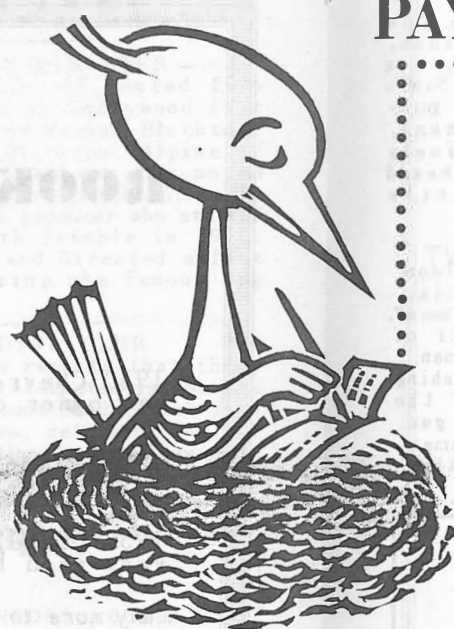
TORREY HUEY TO BIKE ABROAD

ARTISTS ENJOY MRS. LARSON

Yesterday was an outstanding one in county art circles when the Alpine Artists & Writers met in their new studio at Ye Alpine Tavern for a sack luncheon and talk by Maree B. Larson (Mrs. Lief).



She is one of this community's talented painters, a native Californian, though she grew up in Venezuela, went to finishing school in Trinidad, B.W.I. As a girl she studied fashion design, but did not become interested in painting until 1948, nearly three years after she first came to Alpine. Since then she has studied with Oren Loudon, La Jolla, Millford Ellison, San Diego, and Monty Lewis, Coronado. She is a charter member of the local group, also a member of the Art Student League, Coronado.

She has exhibited in Furnace Creek Inn, Stovepipe Wells Hotel, China Lake, New York City, Miami, National Orange show, San Bernardino, in Coronado and Alpine. She has won three second awards, two thirds, and one popular vote.

As a result of her two years spent near Death Valley in the Mojave, Maree has done many desert paintings. California history and 'rockhounding' are her special hobbies, and the Larsons made many exploration trips into the valley.

The Larsons recently returned from a year in Adak, Alaska, during which Maree painted mostly seascapes. Contrary to popular belief, she reports, the northern seas are not misty grey but the most vivid deep blue imaginable. 'In fact,' she says, ultramarine fails to convey its depth and I used Prussian blues almost entirely'.

The results are a particularly sparkling and exciting set of canvases which were reviewed with enthusiasm.

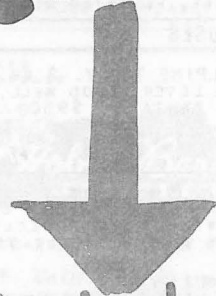
