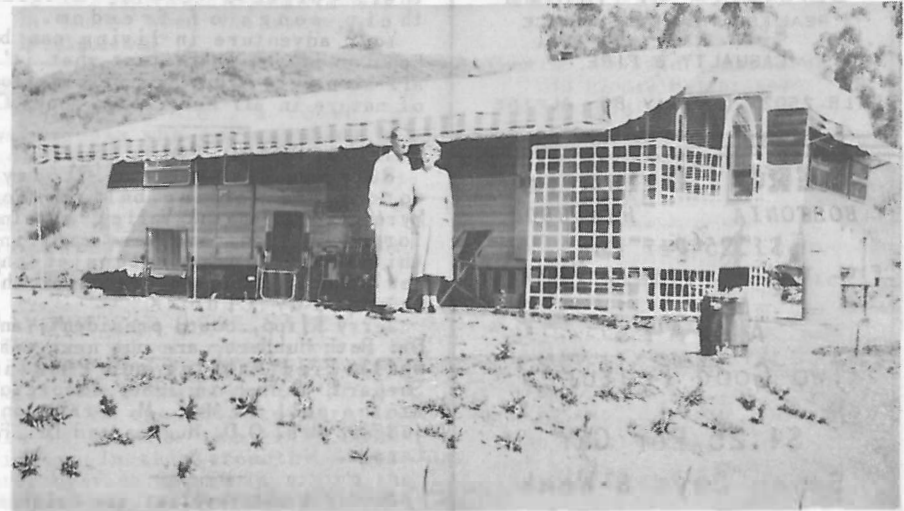
DEATH TAKES DR. KISTLER

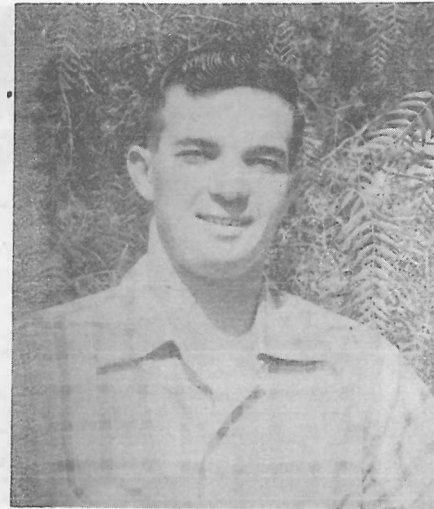

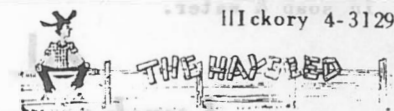
