

**FIRE RAZES GEROY HOME**

A hot blaze at 1 a.m. Wednesday burned the Lt. F.O. Geroy frame home, 1042 Midway Dr., to the ground. Mrs. Geroy and the twins Laura and Larry, escaped with their lives. Lt. Geroy, USN is in S. Carolina. Loss was \$8,000. insured.

The fire was believed to have started in the wiring. Alpine Fire Dept., responded, but the flames had a head start, so the boys protected other property and patrolled till 4 a.m.

When interviewed by the Sun, Mrs. Geroy said 'Oh yes, we will stay in Alpine, we lost everything but we are building a new home and love it here.'

**\$45,000 PHONE ADDITION**

This spring Alpine's Hickory 5 exchange will be enlarged with a \$22,000. addition to the present building on w. Victoria above Highway 80, reveals Wm. E. Rank, manager, El Cajon office of Pacific Tel & Tel Co. which administers this area.

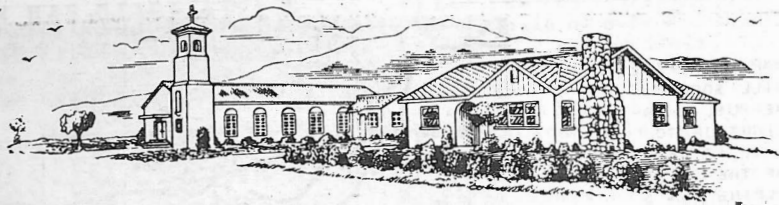

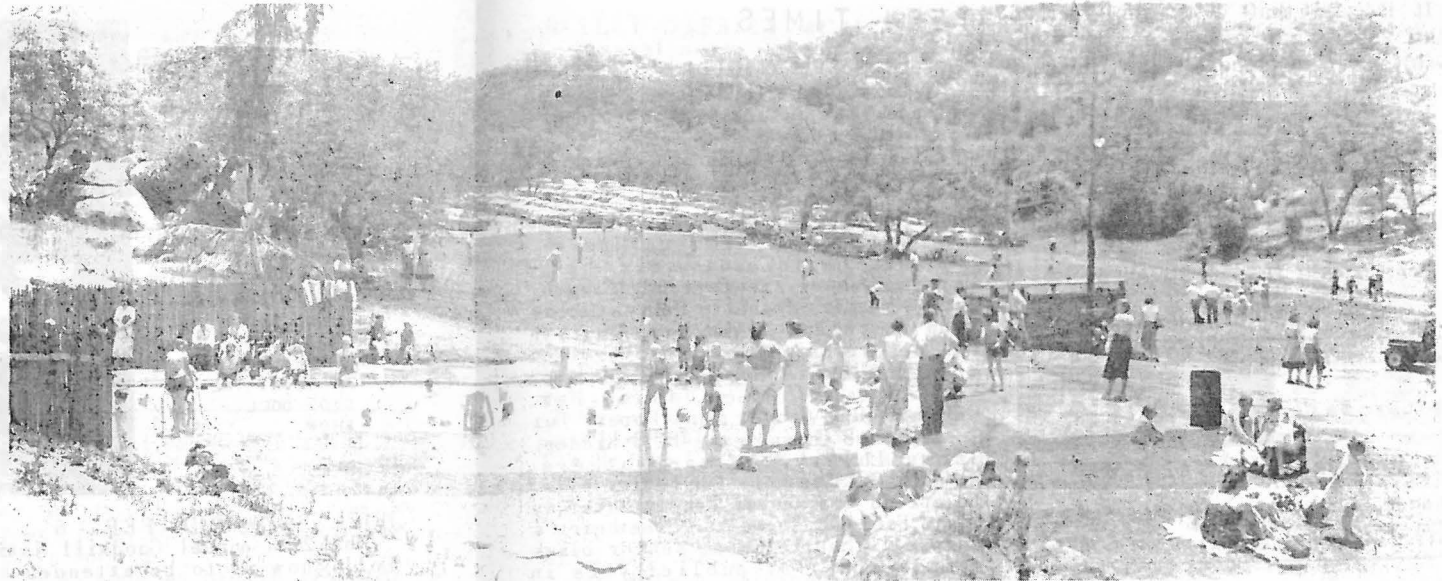
