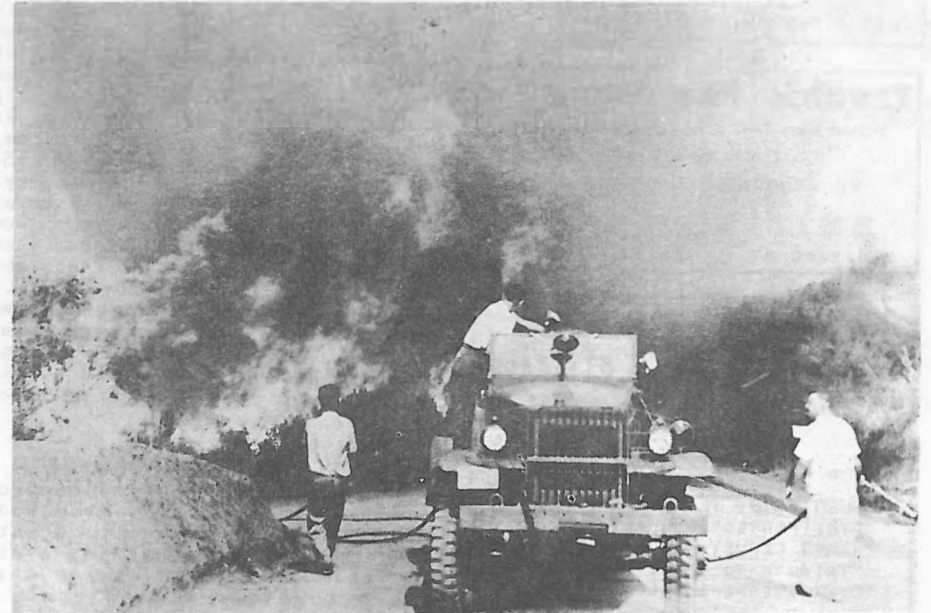

It took 75 fighters to quell the blaze, assisted by the burn of 1955, between Midway Dr. and Arnold Way.

Mrs. Pope has returned home from Hope General Hospital. She is doing fine.

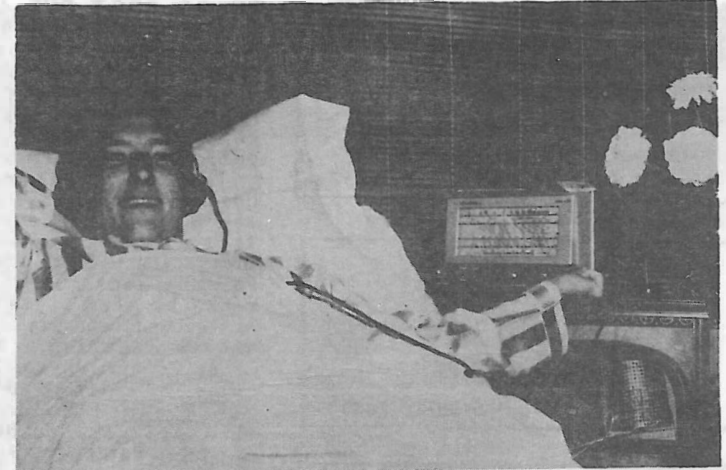
The Harbison Canyon Teenage Club wishes to thank Mr. and Mrs. Ski Langowski for donating their barn as a clubhouse for the club.

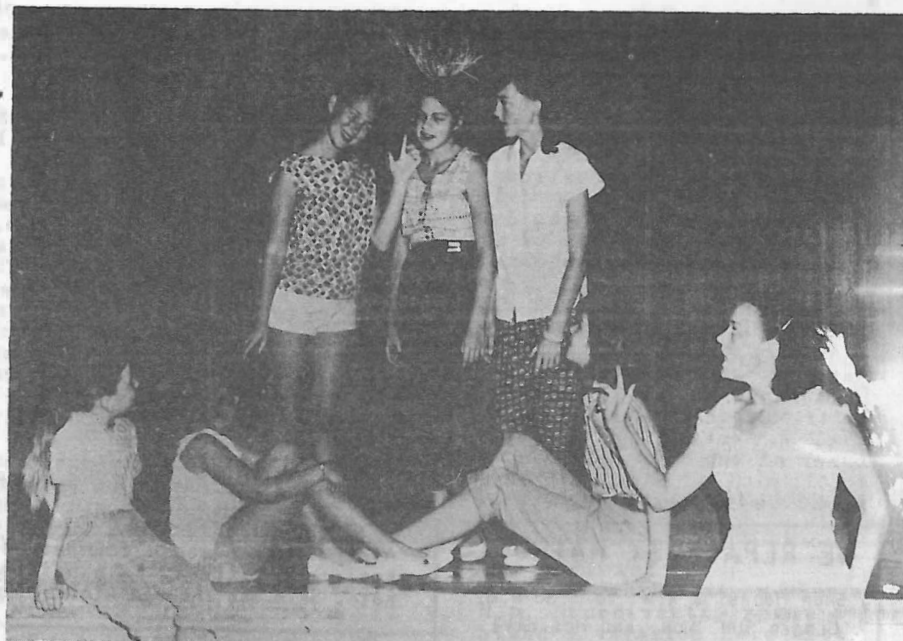
The big event will be at the Hollenbeck place, corner Tavern and So. Grade Roads, where it was first held in 1949 when the Coordinating Council started operations for the Youth Center. It was then owned by Alex Clitsome, who loaned his grounds and ring. Wm. Hollenbeck, who is starting a riding academy here, is show manager.

The So. Calif. Gymkhana Association has cleared Sunday Nov. 4, for this program, to be known as the Alpine Western Horse Show and Gymkhana. 'It will be county-wide and all horse enthusiasts are invited to enter' says Mrs. Young. 'There will be food and refreshments and proceeds will be held by the chamber for one cause, the promotion of riding and the show, to pay for transportation to other shows, parades and so on'.

In the second, and final show, June 25, 1950, Carl McCall was chairman; Bob Hoffman, judge; Bud Winsby, ringmaster, and Clark Batchelder, announcer. It was heavily attended. Taking part in the work was Dr. Ruth Hubbert, Ida Laughlin, Paul Nichols, Mrs. Frank Doerr, Al Hamann, Clarke Irvine and others!

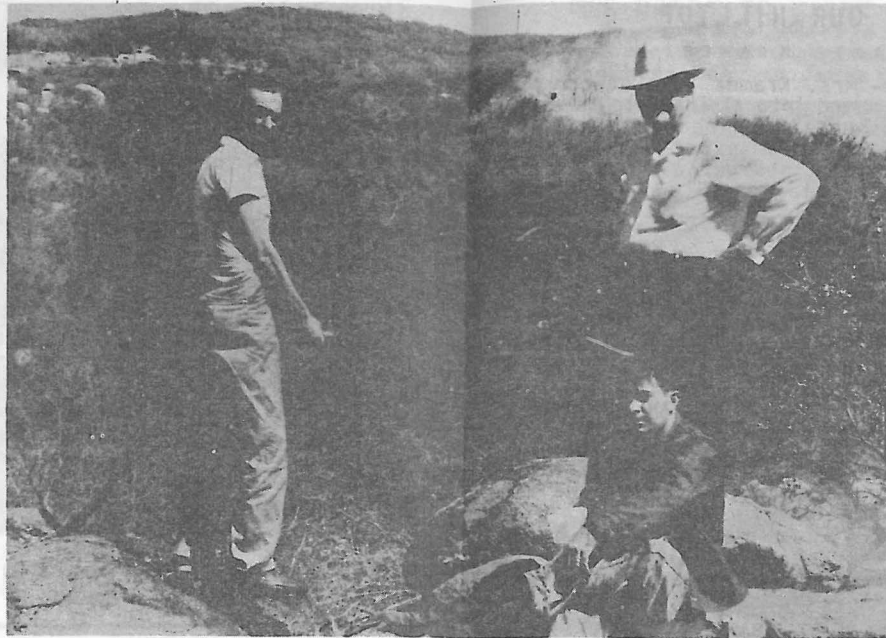

The important point is that, according to Everett who has thoroughly investigated and conferred with officials, the old structure was never 'condemned' but only inspected and reported to

be not in condition for use. "The new 2-room building, out of federal funds", says Everett, "is speeding to completion, will be ready by Nov. 15, possibly by the first. This will take the eighth grade out of the cafeteria". enrollment today is at an all time high, 527.

Forrest Hohanshelt and Jerry Heinrich, builders, are making a detailed examination of the old school and will recommend repairs to bring it to full safety demands, cash for which can be had from school funds. When decision is made to go ahead, this work will be speeded so as to relieve all double sessions.

Everett pointed out that in 1949 surveys only recommended certain work should be done, added that they were used till last spring. As to fire, certain deficiencies existed, could be easily remedied. No effort had been made to bring the structure up to recommendations and classes were moved out.

The old oil heaters would be replaced by modern equipment or possibly electric. Also doors will be changed to open outward with automatic hinges. A new floor will be laid and steel straps placed as sway braces on studs and cross beams to withstand quakes. A sand-proof ceiling, new wall covering and modern lighting fixtures will be added.

"We have enough parents now engaged in defense plants' he adds, 'to secure federal money for added rooms, and we can qualify for more when we count next month as largest increase is then'".
