When the news flew around that Ray and Theresa Ford, owners of Flinn Springs Cafe had escaped only with their lives in a night fire that wiped out their business, friends rallied around, raised cash, clothing and furniture, showing that the pioneer spirit of helpfulness is not dead in the back country.

First to help was Mart & Jackie Hazell, Alpine Cafe, who handed over a gallon jar filled with cash--\$62.68. Then Vic & Joe Ellis staged a dance at their place, when 75 tossed cash into two jars, along with many useful items which required a truck to tote it over to the Gady Braker ranch where they are guests. Then Barney & Agnes Ratliff of Twin Oaks Cafe turned over over proceeds from a chowmein dinner, while Bradley's Fairview followed with a benefit, also the VFW boys and Cootiettes of Harbison Canyon. If any feel like swelling the sum, send your check to the Sun for the Fords.

Loss was about \$6,000, with only \$3,000 insurance on business equipment; none on personal effects. Nothing was saved, not even \$200. cash; her diamond ring, glasses and valuables.

The building was a landmark here for many years, built by the original owners, the Flinn family. The Fords had been here since Feb. 1954, have no plans yet. It is not known whether the county will rebuild, although the place is needed for the county park there.

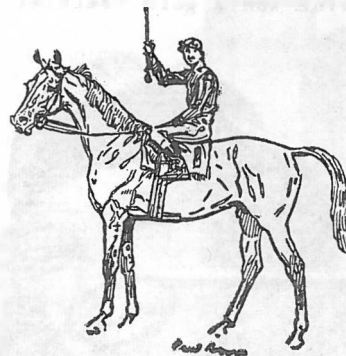

collected \$131. for repairs, is returning it to the donors.

It was decided to sell the two rooms after appraisal is made, said Supt. David B. Everett. Some years ago they had been fixed at \$200. but building costs have risen since then, so taxpayers may realize more today. It is understood that several local people are anxious to get the structures.

Should the rooms be repaired and used, it would jeopardize the chance of getting federal and state aid for new buildings, they said.

The two new rooms, paid for by U.S. funds of \$22,050. are now in use, Everett told the Sun yesterday. This has freed the auditorium of two classes. It will now be used for all-school activities including orchestra, dramatics, saure dancing and related cultural activities.

Monies received by the Sun amounted to \$121. with a \$10. check from Wm. F. Cain, CWO, USA, from San Antonio, Tex. making \$131. Supt. Everett and the Sun warmly thank each donor for fine cooperation which shows splendid community spirit.

Note- We believe that every resident will appreciate reading Cain's warm letter which came with his check: 'A friend gave me a subscription to your paper, which is most interesting and informative. Having bought property a couple of years ago, I'd like to be considered a member of your fine community for any future civic enterprises. My attention is to live in Alpine after retirement. In the army you get around quite a bit. If any place can equal Alpine for climate, casual living, nearness to everything worth while, I surely haven't found it!'
