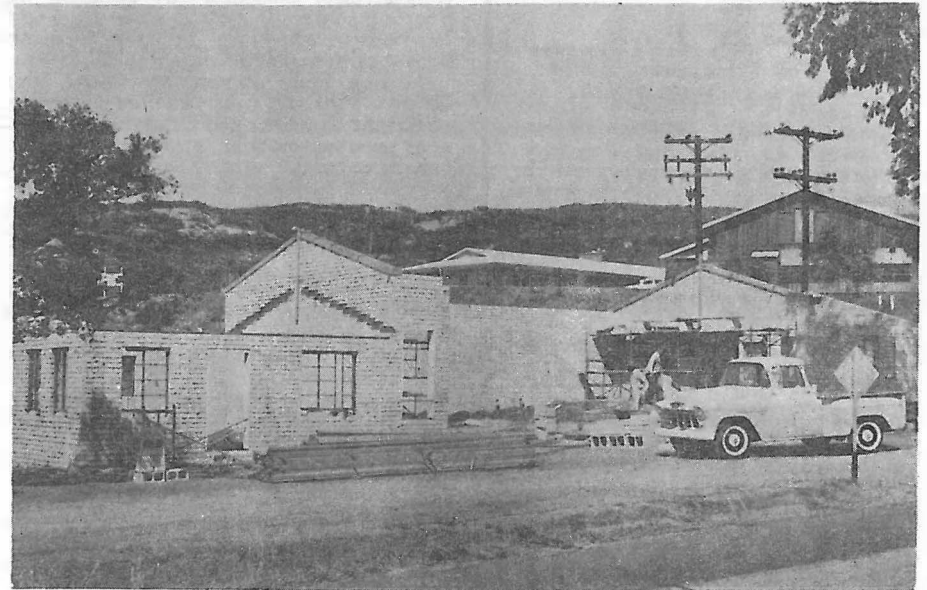

Editorial...

MORE LIVING IN TRAILERS!

A few years ago Roger Babson predicted that soon half America would be living in trailers.

The industry's report for 1956, just released, seems to bear out this statement, for annual sales of mobilhomes passed the \$½ billion mark for the first time, according to the national association.

Sales totalled 121,470 of these compact, modern, fully equipped homes on wheels, most of which will travel but little, as the big new ones are being used in lieu of houses. This is an increase of 19% over 1955.

Myron C. Poole, president of the association says his industry's best customers are newlyweds who cannot afford the outrageous price of a conventional home. Thousands also are living this convenient, compact way because of professional requirements of travel or moving from place to place periodically.

It has been argued by those who do not like to see trailers taking inroads on certain incomes, as apartments, motels and realty that trailerites do not pay taxes. That is quite a mistake as many economists have pointed out. This state assesses trailers at a high rate for personal property and for use of highways, even when a trailer is old and stays put. Minimum is \$9. a year, even when off the roads.

Others claim that children are not manageable in such housing, but records show less trouble, delinquency and higher school grades and deportment.

If you have any doubts, just inspect one of those big new '10-wide', 50-footers with everything, and more than a modern house boasts, as air conditioning, all-electric, every appliance and so forth. You might learn a lot--and become a trailerite yourself!—

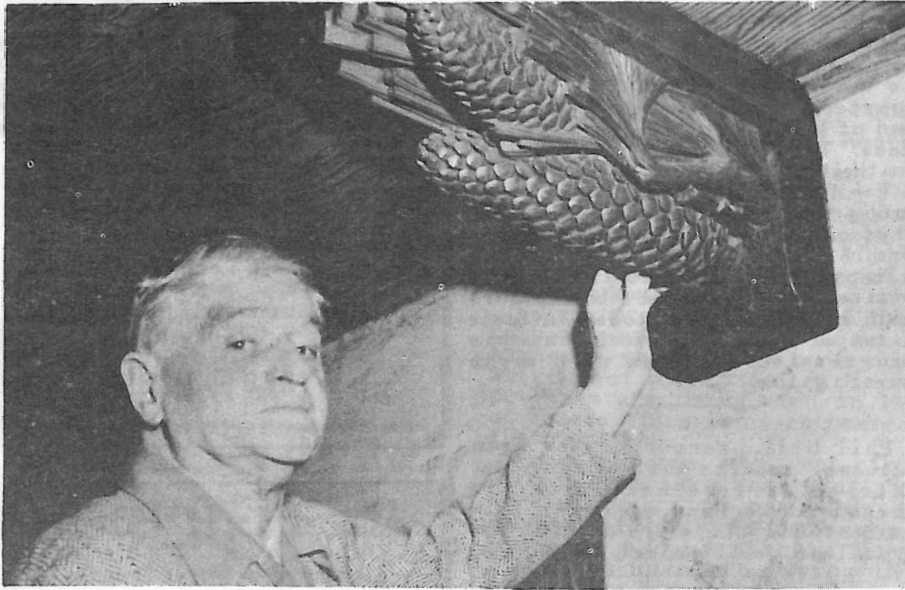

overlooking peaceful valleys to the blue Pacific. With his wife, who passed away last winter, he moved here from Descanso, coming there from Alhambra and Riverside.

It was Barrelle, while a student of St. Gaudens in N.Y., revived a medieval art, hammered bronze, used then for shields in a crude bas-relief. A famous example of his work is at Riverside's Mission Inn where Frank Miller, noted hotelman, commissioned Barrelle to produce a

pair of bronze doors for the dining room with 12 scenes from the life of St. Francis of Assisi, founder of the monastic order bearing his name.

The godlike soul of the friar has been caught in the hammered metal which holds one's gaze until each lifelike picture is absorbed. It was St. Francis who started his prayer; 'Lord make me a channel of thy peace that where there is hatred- I may bring love', a copy of which hangs in my study. The scenes show his life from youth to patriarch, and so perfectly executed that casts from the originals are so true that they deceive connoisseurs!

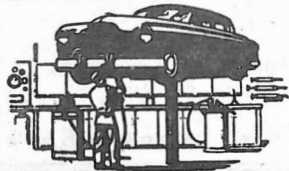

America's tiniest newspaper was there with the great city dailies and other county newspapers and found that the second annual 'Good Egg' Breakfast was worthwhile.

It was at the Lafayette Hotel given by the Poultry Industry of S.D. county with some 300 guests who enjoyed the double-yolk meal, jolly emceeing, and a top level talk by Homer Huntington, founder of the Poultry & Egg National Board.

The Sun staff (both of us), were surrounded by leaders, including Mayor Chas. C. Dail, Joe Miller of KMB, Hap Holliday, head of the S.D. Grocers Association, Seymour Rabin of M & S Foods and others. Also met Howard Keddie.

Huntington related many experiences; travels of 65,000 miles while promoting egg sales abroad; how he swims daily at La Jolla; why the U.S. should develop surplus markets because 'You are not going to have it so good--- but increasing business will continue around here, the best spot in the nation'. He told how the country is spending \$1 million daily on storage of surplus stocks. 'You must produce less or get busy on added markets'.

The program showed that S.D. County in 1956 produced 42½ million dozen eggs valued at \$16½ million, or \$10 million worth of feed by 2½ million hens for the 1000 producers! We met two of them, Jim Kutzner of E.C. and W.W. Macricder and wife, Lakeside.
