

A Letter to Ivan

DEAR IVAN

There is remote possibility that this letter may reach you, since communication channels are so rigidly controlled, both in your country and mine. Still, I write this, on the off-chance that it will come to your attention, and we might somehow reach an un-

de rs tanding.

Most of the reports of your activities over there, those that appear in our public press, and from the occasional traveler to your country, indicate that you are not living it up so well, and all agree that you are more or less a slave of your own particular brand of madmen, those obsessed with the idea of total control of a populace through the use of force. Over here, the identification-tag assigned to your form of government is "Communism", a word implying that people share alike, for the common good. On this basis, I don't believe you are a Communist, since I am sure you would immediately gather to yourself the fruits of your own efforts, if given the opportunity, and I am positive your leaders are not Communists either - all you have to do is compare their standards of living with your own.

We are told here that our form of government is "Democracy'. Actually, it is a Republic. The people do not legislate, they merely vote for candidates chosen by either of two political parties, both of whom have the same major goals. Thus, we are, to a considerable degree, in the same political mess that you are in you with one party, we with two, but these two are nearly identical. Your leaders, and ours, erect artificial barriers to free

travel and communication.

The excuse for this is "It's very bad over there, and we cannot guarantee your safety if you were to go there, thus, for your own good, we insist you stay here, we will tell you from time to time, what is going on over there; the people over there have some very bad ideas, and you are not clever enough to differentiate between our good ideas, and their bad ones, and we fear lest you become tainted with those unworkable ideas; we know that the

leaders on the other side are plotting to blow us all up, and the only way we can prevent this is to ensure that they too, will be blown up, if they attempt this".

Now, Ivan, I do not believe you are plotting to blow me up. As a matter of fact, I don't think you are plotting much of anything, except how to survive. But I am quite sure that your leaders and mine, are contriving new ways to control you, and control me.

Now, how does one person or group, manage to gain control of another person or group? Well, it is basically simple, here is how

it is done.

FIRST: You convince him somehow, that he is an animal, who lives only once. He will then cling desperately to any state of existence, rather than risk death to better his condition.

SECOND: You say: "Things are very bad over there, but I am willing to protect you, do not attempt to go there, or you will surely die. Give me the weapons, and I will stand between you and

that horrible threat".

If the person, or group, believes this, Ivan, and agrees to this arrangement, he then comes under the control of the self-appointed protector. To questions such as "How are things going over there now?" he can simply be told, "It is getting worse and worse, he has bigger and better weapons, he is plotting furiously against you, and therefore, I must have bigger and better weapons, or all is lost; as a matter of fact, if you are not willing to keep busy making these weapons for me, I shall be forced, for your own good, to force you to make them; you must sacrifice your comfort and a good life, obey me implicitly, or die".

Well, Ivan, the end result of all this, both of us know, is that these weapons will be used, sooner or later, and this is a bum deal for you and me and all our friends. It is even a bum deal for your misguided leaders and mine, as this time, there may be no populace left to lead, they would have frenzied themselves right out of the game - no slaves left to play with. They think of us as just pawns or small units of a vast machine, to be moved here or there, or destroyed at will. But we are living units, Ivan, with



From time to time, I hear that wou or your friends have made efforts to cross over your artificial barrier, which we call "The Iron Curtain", only to be shot down. Believe it or not, some from our side have also made efforts to cross that barrier. but are prevented from doing so by refusal to issue travel permits. or threats of punishment for disobeving our State Department. (This is controlled by one old man, who does not like anyone else to communicate with peoples of other nations.) He simply says that we are all too stupid, and only he is wise and learned enough to know how to communicate with you and your friends. He has a lot of people sold on this idea, including many of our high government leaders. He likes to hand out his versions of "What is going on over there", and is greatly reluctant to let our press correspondents or businessmen cross your border to find out for themselves. This wouldn't be so bad, except that he himself says "It's no use" — he has just about given up the idea of trying to communicate to you. We are told that you have censorship of news over there, and I can believe this, as many of our bureaucrats hold closed door meetings, and refuse to tell the press or public what went on. We pay these people, and they are supposed to be "public servants", but it doesn't seem to work out that way. I quess it is about the same over there; I hear that they train your police and soldiers into unthinking obedience to orders.

Listening to Radio Moscow, hear that I am a slave. Listening to my local radio station, I hear that you are a slave. How about that, Ivan? Are we? If I could somehow communicate with you, I'm sure we could find some answers. Nothing is stopping us, except some artificial barriers put up to "protect" us from each other. It is up to you and me to tear these down. I am not afraid of you, Ivan, and would be glad to talk to you any time, either here or there. Believe me, I don't want anything of yours except an understanding.

We both know what war is like. This business of missiles and H-Bombs could mean the end of all we have striven for. Our leaders

FEB. 21, 1958 have set the precedent of hanging the leaders of a losing side, thus, there could be no thought of

surrender, even in a "little" war. Ivan, it looks as though it is up to you and me and those of our friends who still remain relatively sane, to get together, that is, to communicate at our own level. and straighten things out, so that you can have your country, and I can have mine, and we can get back to the business (and pleasure) of living.

If we don't, who will?




