Even with plentiful rainfall, it still descends because so much more demand is being made. When your well goes dry, you quickly call the driller. Maybe you get water and maybe you don't. At any rate you pay plenty.

In our own case we had one well go out at 57 feet. We dug to 61 and it lasted only a short time. Then we drilled
