The Greyhound Lines are running an announcement this issue, and we repeat the phone number here to help travelers. Shirlie's is HI5-3742.

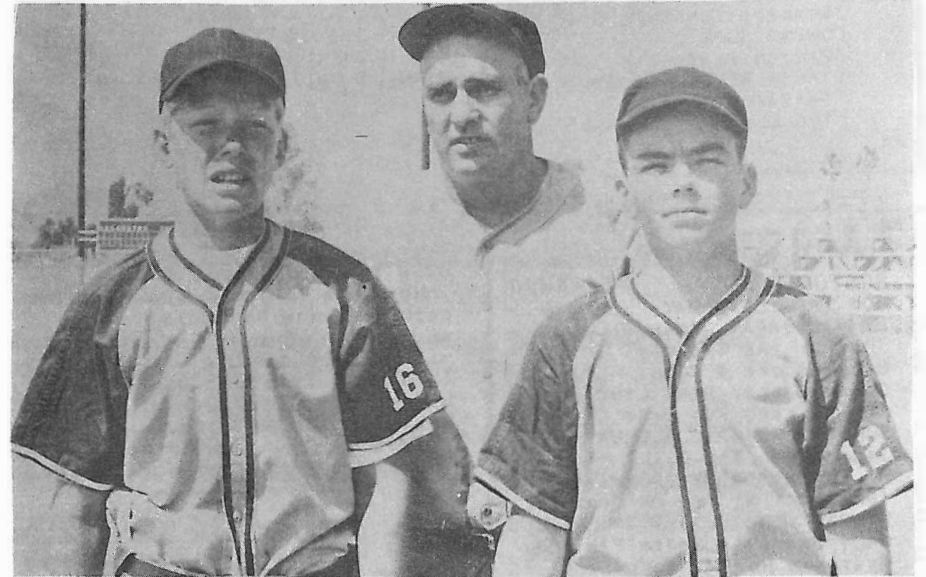
REGISTRAR FINDS PETITION

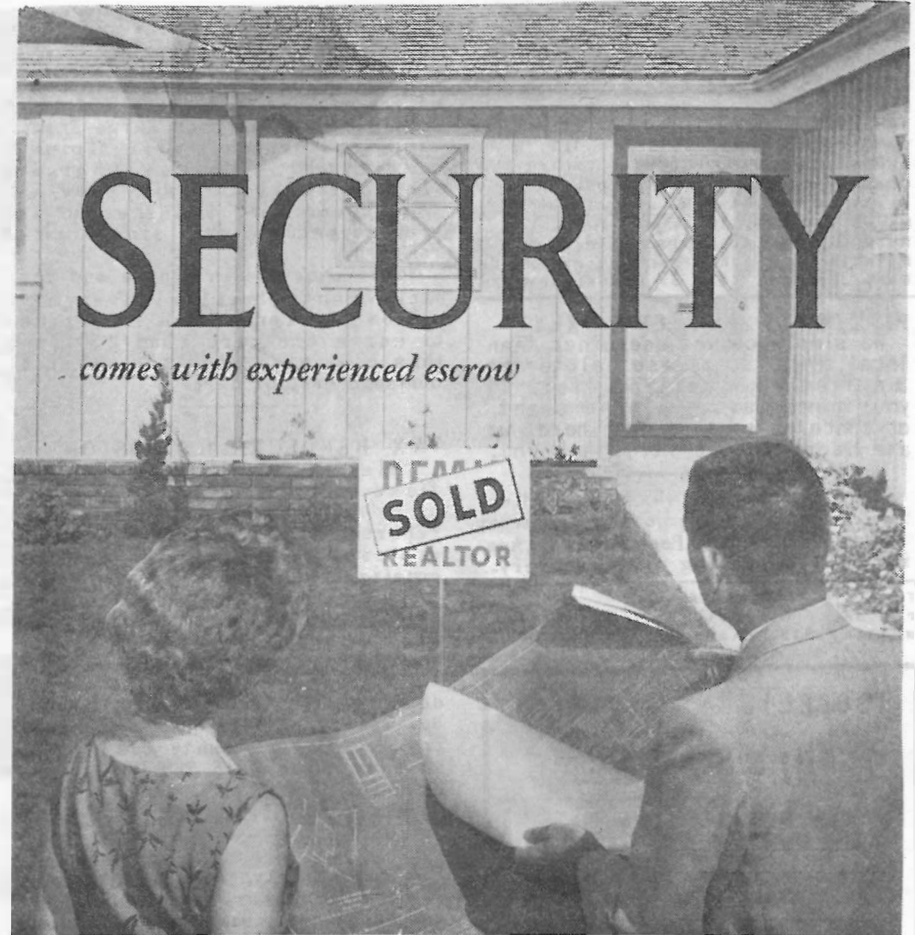

TAX REFLECTS RECESSION

Sales tax in the state for the first quarter fell to the lowest since the initial quarter of 1955, reports Robt. E. McDavid, fourth district member of the board of equalization.

It was 7.3% below on \$4,250,067,000. taxables, or \$127,508,010. Most lines were down, but sporting goods went up 9.1%. Hardest hit were cars, down 24.1%, used cars, 22.3%, appliances 12.3% and home furnishings, 8.3%. The county was bright, however, with \$225,288,000. for a drop of but 1.2%, while some counties went 34% lower.

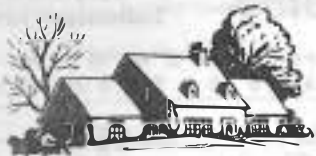

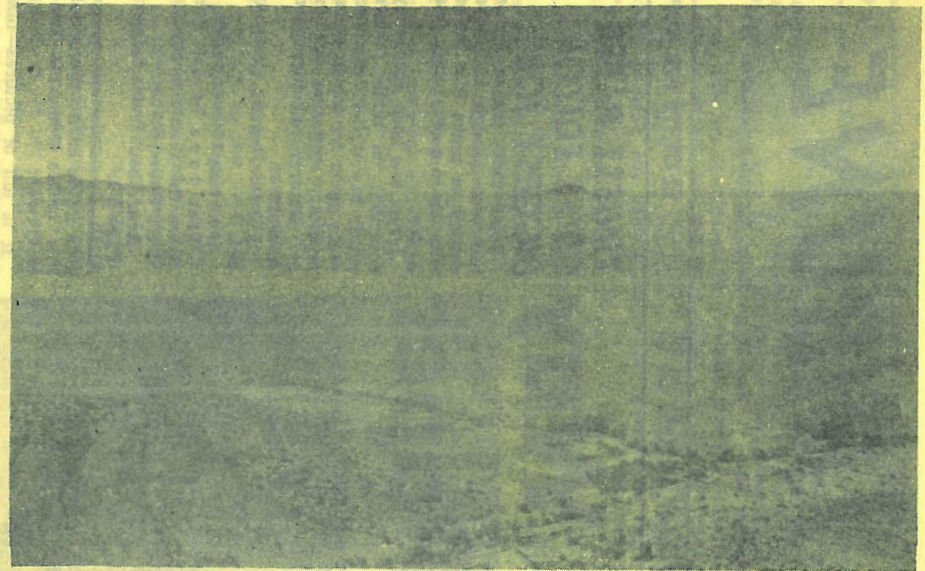

TINIEST PAPER GIVES EDITOR BIGGEST JOB

You'd think Clarke Irvine had seen enough and done enough to make him bored with life in a quiet town like Alpine.

Irvine has been accurately described on those posters which say writer, explorer, press agent for movie stars, reporter, magazine publisher, lecturer, photographer, adventurer.

Is Irvine bored? Certainly not.

Is he busy? Never busier. What does he do? Publishes the tiniest newspaper in the United States.

good grade bond paper 8½ by 11½ inches which is folded lengthwise.

It is full of pictures—taken by the publisher.

It is printed by the offset method. Its equipment ranges from a multigraph, which cost hundreds of dollars, to a negative dryer, built by the publisher. The hot air is supplied by a hair drier the like of which are hanging by the thousands in bathrooms all over the country.

The Sun's style—the way a newspaper does things — is tiny. Nothing is five feet long. It is 5'.

The postmaster of Alpine is Phil Hall and in the Sun he is not the postmaster but the P.M.

Irvine's wife Alice is in charge of news and composition. On a larger paper she would be receptionist, linotype operator, mail room foreman, circulation manager, associate publisher, associate editor, and so forth.

She also is cook and housekeeper for Irvine, their twin daughters Cecile and Celeste, 6, and daughter Cynthia, 8, who is a tiny columnist for the paper.

In her column called Small Talk everything is seen through the eyes of Alpine's small fry. When Cynthia reports an anticipated blessed event the mother is not the principal in the item. It is reported like this:

"Barbara Butterworth's sister Joan is going to have a baby this month. They live in S.D. now."

ALPINE—If Clarke Irvine's parents hadn't suspected Hamilton Hassinger was going to break his big toe, Irvine would never have become publisher of America's tiniest newspaper.

It takes 48 years and some tenuous tracing to arrive at this conclusion, but the publisher himself can't escape it.

In 1909, he and Ham Hassinger built an airplane. As it neared completion, Irvine's parents became convinced it was going to fly just high enough to break Ham's toe—or Clarke's neck.

So they took young Clarke down to the Los Angeles post office and showed him some U.S. Navy recruiting posters.

Clarke Joined Navy

Ham got the airplane off the ground, but it came down without his consent and broke a big toe.

Irvine joined the Navy and saw the world, became a Hollywood press agent in the days of Fatty Arbuckle and Ruth Roland, went into a trailer rental business catering to movie stars, saw the business deteriorate when the stars began buying their own trailers, lost his health, traveled the Orient and the Pacific, regained his health, published a health magazine, moved to Alpine in 1949 and became publisher of America's tiniest newspaper.

Staff Airplane Claimed

"If I had been in that flying machine instead of Ham," said Irvine, "I'd probably still be driving flying machines for a living."

"I love to fly."

He claims his is the only newspaper in the county with an airplane on the staff. The trail to this claim is even more broken than the one to Ham Hassinger's broken toe.

It develops that Al Howe, El Cajon pilot, plane owner, and photographer, is raring to go anytime publisher Irvine wants to get an aerial shot.

Paper 5 Year's Old

The paper's staff car is a jeep which has a sticker bearing the word "PRESS" in letters the size newspapers usually use when war is declared.

At 64, Irvine still gets a kick out of roaring off to cover a fire or traffic accident or even, as small town publishers must, to sell a small ad.

"Gee whillikers I'm busy," hereabouts. . ."

he said. "I have never had so much fun in my life."

The Alpine Sun was born on St. Valentine's Day, 1952. Its first editorial declared the paper would be published each two weeks on Friday and would ". . . promote the general welfare of all who live

The first issue was eight pages. The issue last April 19 was three times that big. Last Christmas the Sun came out in pretty red and green — 60 pages.

The tiniest claim comes from its dimensions. It is 5½ inches wide, 8½ inches long. Inspection shows it is printed on a

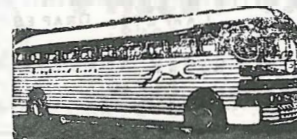

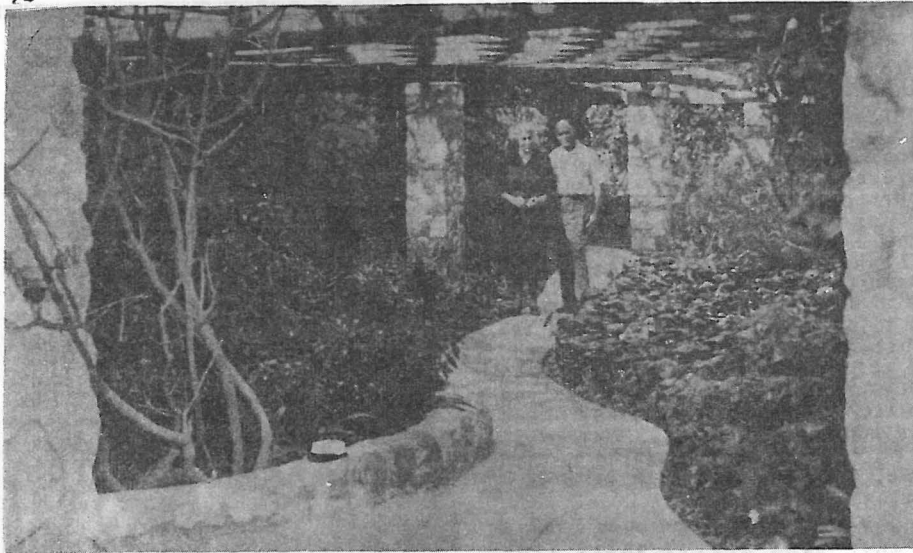

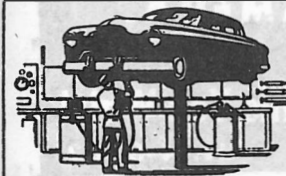
