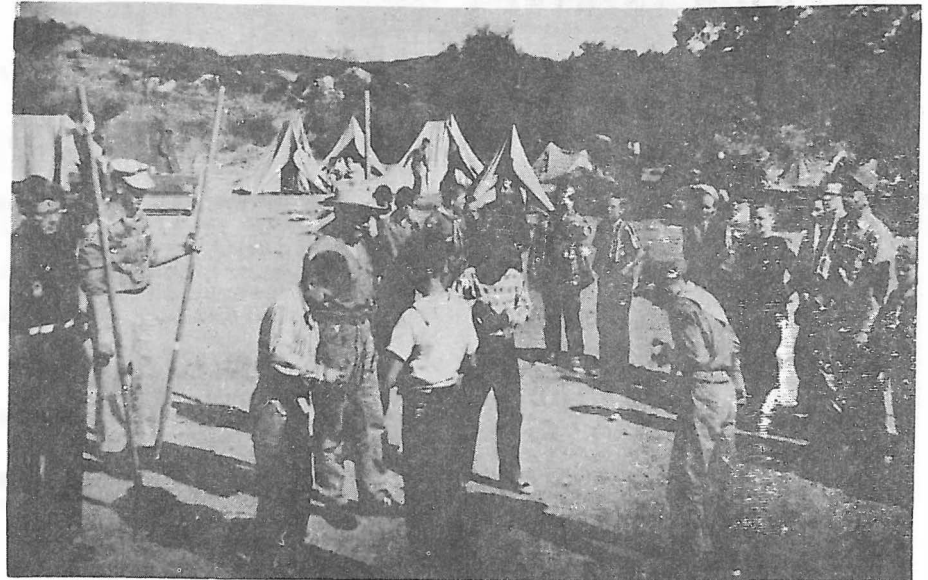

STATE ALLOWS POWER RATES

Due to steadily rising costs of production and operation the S.D. Gas & Electric Co., was granted a rise in rates by the Public Utilities Commission of the state. It affects city and rural areas.

The new rate for Alpine, the firm points out, will make a typical monthly bill for 150 kilowatts go from \$5.63 to \$6.35. About 53% of the total new revenue will go for federal and state taxes, the company says.

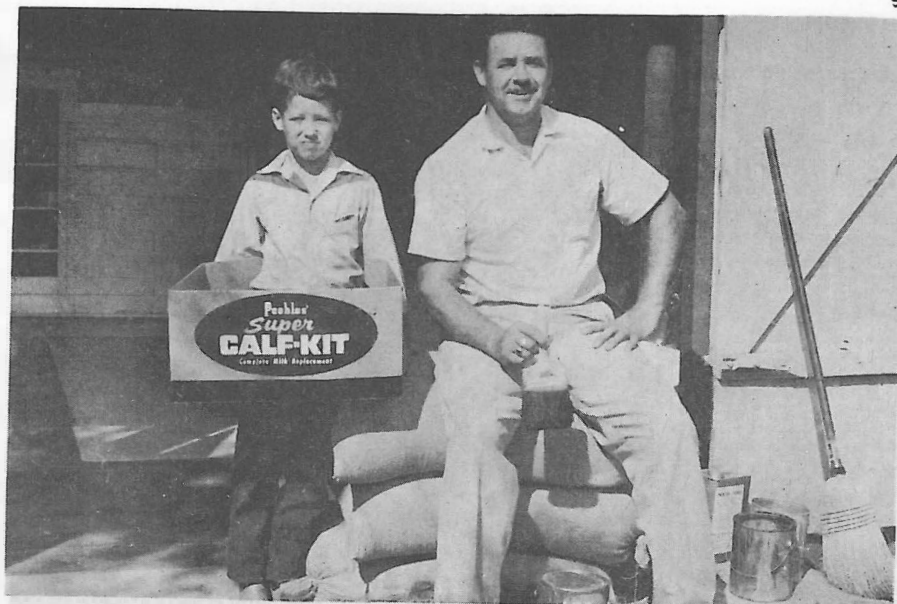

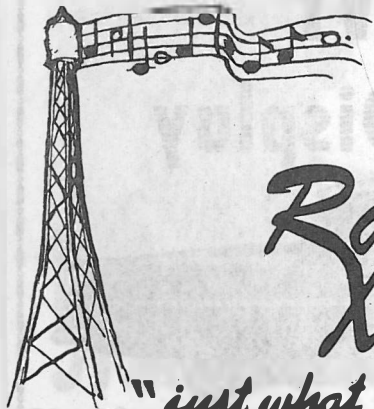

The county has widened the road, blasted out the bridge and filled it over a huge new culvert making ready for the new road.

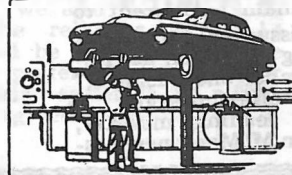

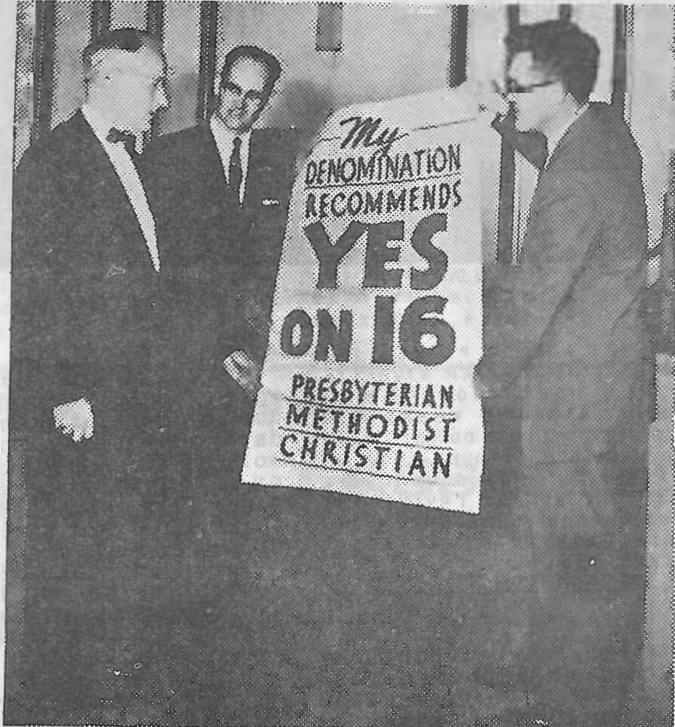

Prominent Ministers Urge 'Yes' Vote on Proposition 16

Prominent pastors, representing three denominations—the Christian, Presbyterian and Methodist churches—today spoke out emphatically in favor of Proposition No. 16 on the Nov. 4th ballot, and gave clear cut statements of their

at the annual convention at Long Beach in July, went on record overwhelmingly favoring Proposition 16. The very breath and sweep of education in America today with its staggering dimensions and attendance figures enrolled at

denominations' stand on the separation of church and state.

The Rev. Earl Christofferson, pastor of the East San Diego Christian church, said, in part: "The Christian church has always stood for separation of church and state, and,

all levels, means that the American people certainly cannot remain indifferent to the great issues and problems confronting education as America's number one business," Rev. Christofferson said.

Another leading minister, Dr. William M. MacInnes, pas-

tor of the College Park Presbyterian church, not only voiced his opinion in favor of Proposition 16, but pointed to the action of his denomination in California, through the Synod, as well as the official statement approved by the 169th General Assembly of the Presbyterian church of the United States of America.

Referring to the Presbyterian booklet, "The Church and Public Schools," the Rev. MacInnes quoted the following: "We, therefore, are unalterably opposed to the support of independent or parochial schools through the use of public funds, since such use virtually favors establishment of religion by government."

The Rev. Kenneth Miller, pastor of the La Mesa Methodist church, indicated that he felt it is important to get the principles involved straight in our minds, in reference to separation of state and church, which is the major issue in Proposition 16.

Rev. Miller quoted from a statement from the General Conference of the Methodist church which said: "We are unalterably opposed to the diversion of tax funds to the support of private and sectarian schools. In a short time, this scattering process can destroy our American school system, and weaken the foundations of national unity."

"We believe thoroughly in the principles of freedom of religion, and any religion has the right to develop religious schools to foster and advance its own particular and preferred religious faith; however, we also feel that such private religious schools should be paid for by those who prefer their particular sectarian system," the ministers agreed.

The newlyweds will live in Anaheim.

After waving our youngsters off to school every morning, most of us mothers have the privilege of having a solitary cup of coffee and making plans for the day, without the confusion of the children.

I wonder if we give much more than a fleeting thought to the man or woman who greets our kiddies at school with 30 odd others, whom they have to discipline and teach, all at the same time. When we go to school for parent-teacher conferences, the conversation centers mostly around our own child. The teacher talks little about herself.

FISHER IS FOR SCHOOLS

The young Democrat Hugo Fisher has gone on record strongly for schools and water, two top problems in S.D. County, in his campaign for state senator.

'Education is a serious matter and we are 'in the red' as far as classrooms and teachers are concerned', pointing out that 'we need 4500 new instructors each year'. He is also for a new means of attracting industry through lighter taxes at the start, water and other means.

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NEW WATER MAP SUBMITTED

The revision of the 3-area water district-- El Cajon, Dehesa and Alpine-- which was turned down by the Helix group, has been completed by Engineer C.R. Crull of the Byrl Phelps office, and has been sent to the county water authority. It includes some 30,000 acres.

Alpine's district is about the same as originally drawn, for 11,000 acres. Pump for this area will be located probably near Peutz Valley road north of Hwy 80. A main reservoir will have to go in the center of Alpine, with smaller outlying ones.

Richard Holmgren, head of the water office, says it will take at least two years, 'providing the people up there work together' before water can be here. After the 3-area district is formed, the Alpine one must then be voted. That all takes time.

The Water Problems Committee meets on Nov. 13, will review the new proposition, and likely it will be given the routine that will make it come up again in December before action is taken toward actual formation of the district.

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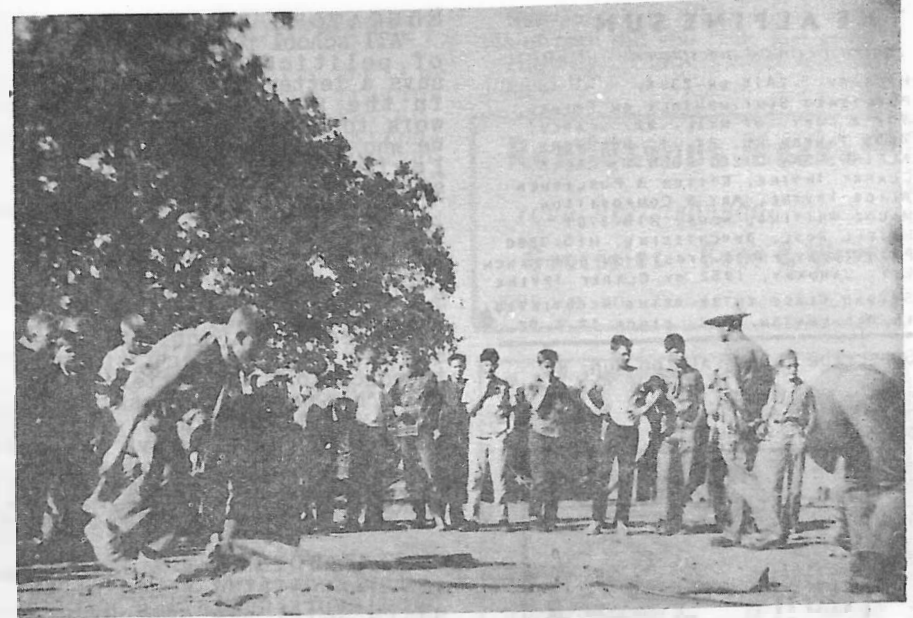
