EDITORIAL.

SEVEN YEARS OF SERVICE TO ALPINE

The big 60-page Christmas issue of the Sun, in red and green, with many illustrations, closed the seventh year of publication.

It has been seven seasons of fun and hard work, investment, improvement, and little profit-like most small newspapers the nation over. But we have enjoyed the job. Moreover, the readers have approved by subscribing and buying copies over the counter in Alpine

shops-- nearly 200 are sold each issue!

A few objectives have been achieved. Two years the Sun worked to get house numbers and street name posts. It worked for the sewer, but desired water first. Your editor was founder of the chamber of commerce, now inactive. Much has been done to get better sheriff service here; also

highway patrolmen.
Zoning and water have been worked on steadily. It was the Sun that alerted residents about a trailer park going in on Victoria Dr., so they went after interim zoning. One winter a drive was promoted to have a housewarming for the old firehouse, and money was raised to buy unifo ms for the volunteers. Continuous work for better phone and light service has been carried on. Without criticism, the Sun has helped to get better roads and appropriations for the area.

Considerable time was spent on conferences with banks regarding one for Alpine, but none will come till water is: in. we worked for the original Youth Center and the horse shows, and have helped bring many families into the area. Daily the Sun performs the duty of a chamber of commerce and information bureau, for which we are not subsidized. We give 14 county library subscriptions

The Sun is a local industry. We live and work here; are raising a family, spend all we can in Alpine, pay taxes. And we do all the work ourselves right on our ranch, do not take money out of town. Our investment in the Sun alone is considerable.
