## NEED WATER?

### Full House Greet Engineers at Initial Meeting

WATER HERE IN 2 YEARS

Perhaps the most important meeting ever held in Alpine was Monday night in the school auditorium when a throng listened intently to an explanation of the proposed East County Municipal Water District by Byrl Phelps chairman and other engineers.

In an interesting sketch of how the district finally arrived at the threshold of getting Colorado water, Phelps told of the 'six years of hard work,

### School Bond Vote Next

At Harbison Canyon Community hall Thursday night Supt. Clyde Gilley detailed the setup for the proposed school to be built with funds from the bonds and state loan. Classes will be from kindergarten thru Six, plus the mentally retarded program, now going to Santee, but ending this year due to overcrowding. In small districts the county pays the teacher, and for use of classroom at \$100. a month.

Bus costs will be cut as half-day sessions relieve that, plus the shorter haul. More rooms cannot be built on the present site due to limiting state laws. The site has been tested for sewer and water, there being enough for 4320 pupils. Tax increase for both bond and state loan would be up only 6½¢ per \$100. valuation. This year the tax is a bit over 38¢, the legal limit being 45¢.

This is a national problem, self-inflicted by man upon himself and his offspring by an ever-increasing refined cooked diet, and an ever-abundance of eating and drinking of sugary things.

Fluoridation, tooth brushing, mouthwashing and other medical things will not allay this creeping menace that demands 13% of all money spent for health care-- more than goes for any single disease.

A recent survey by the So. Calif. Dental Assn., based on a Hooper (San Francisco) report, shows conclusively that candy, sodas, and foods rich in sugar and starches, are the offenders. Many scientific studies have proved this.

The survey shows that in a decade, 1542 patients were checked, each being observed for a year, during which such intake was cut down, and protein and non-refined carbohydrates were increased.

Of the 90% who responded, nearly 86% were free of tooth decay the following year! One to two cavities showed up in 14% and only 1% suffered 6 to 9 cavities.

A far different, and sad story, was revealed in the control group of 347 who had bad dental trouble-- none were free from decay; 91% had from 1 to 2 cavities; 8% had from 3 to 5, and three developed a high of 6 to 9.

The study revealed that good nutrition alone prevents tooth

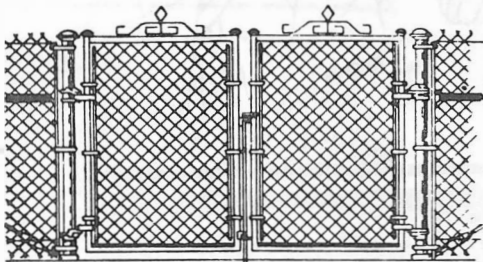

## Finishing Ballfield

Heavy grading is finished on the baseball diamond for the Alpine Junior Baseball Association at the Youth Center. It lies back of the buildings, runs to the embankment adjoining the school playground.

The big grading task was done by Temple B. Smith, former Alpiner, now of Santee. Over 20,000 yards of earth had to be moved, taking over a week.

"Smith undertook this job knowing that he would be lucky to break even" states Harry Jennings, president of the association. "The citizens

of Alpine owe him an eternal debt for his fine work'.

It is the goal of the organization to equip the field with permanent dugouts, fences, backstop, bleachers, and not in the too distant future, lights. Ultimately grass will be planted on the infield and outfield, and the grounds otherwise landscaped.

The association is trying to raise \$4,000. which will cover part of the project. 'A house-to-house campaign will be conducted shortly to raise additional funds for this worthwhile project,' says Jennings.

trouble and that the main offenders are, chewing gum with ½ tsp. of sugar, cookies with 2 small candy sucker 4, doughnut 4, soft drink 4½, ice cream 5 to 6, chocolate bar 7, slice frosted cake 7½, pie per serving 11 tsp. of sugar.

One strange part of this grewsome situation is that for several years the sale of decay producing sweet items in our schools has been condemned by dentists, doctors, the PTA, the Schools Food Service Assn., the American Dietetic Assn.; and many other bodies interested in the health of our school children.

This is no trivial matter when it is remembered that official records show that America pays over \$1½ billion yearly to repair teeth-- and make false ones- and it is on the increase. They estimate that the present rate of dental caries is six times greater than the rate of repairs!

Some years ago while on a lecture tour of the orient, Borneo, Samoa and the South Pacific, I made side trips to study native life in this regard, found invariably that where civilized diet of soft, cooked, oversweet foods had not reached to any great extent, nearly the entire populace enjoyed excellent teeth, even the aged, had full sets.

many, many meetings and negotiations.

He carefully told how district boundaries must be finally fixed, meetings held, elections, legal and engineering steps taken, so it may be annexed to the S.D. County water Authority; then provide transmission lines to bring the supply to a 1400 feet level within this district. From there it will flow to lower districts, be pumped to upper ones, as Alpine. (See the Sun, Jan. 23 for details).

The main reservoir must hold at least 39 million gallons for this district, as provision is being made for a heavy increase in population. 'San Diego is growing explosively', said Phelps, 'and it, along with El Cajon, must come east; there is no other way it can go. They can't build fine homes here till they get loans which can only come when the water does. Thus progress, better homes, more population, cuts the cost of water'.

The engineers are preparing a set of facts and figures for the next issue so all may know latest details. The one high note of this lively meeting; Alpine can have water in two years!
