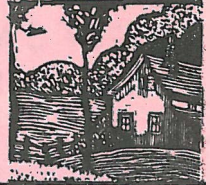

A pair of last-minute candidates popped up for the school trustee election on Tuesday, May 19.

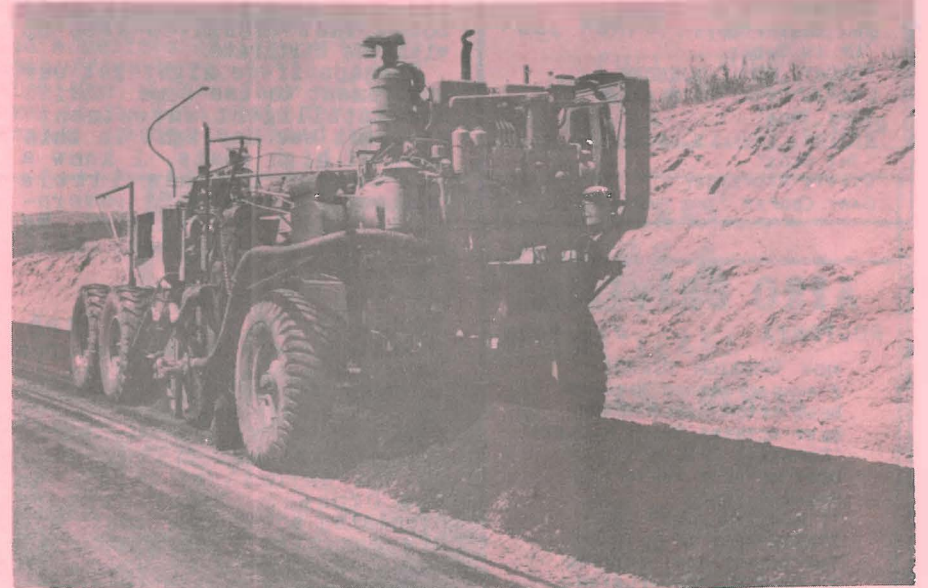
They are Louis Landt, businessman and Kenneth Jerney, retired navyman. They filed at noon of Friday, deadline day.

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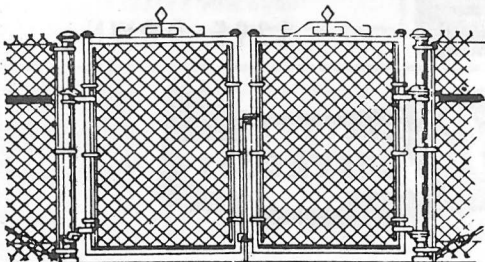
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CORRECT POSTURE WEEK

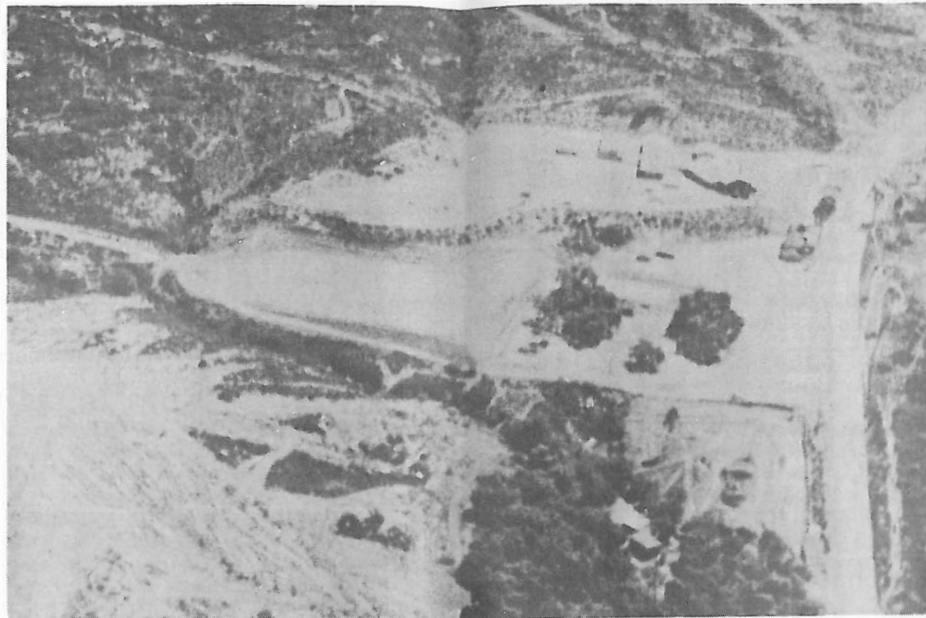

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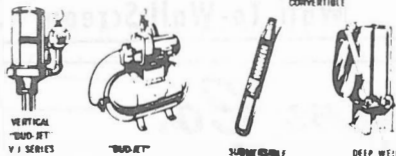

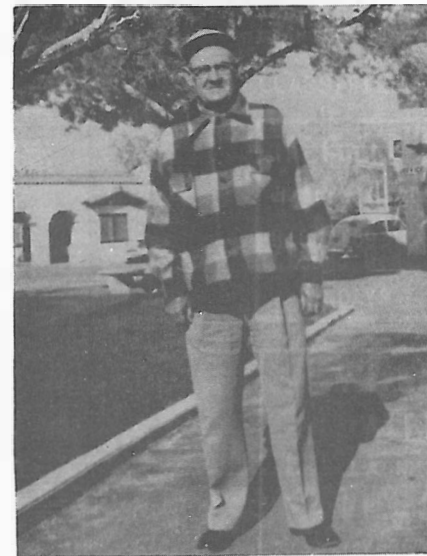
STATE SESSION OF POW'S

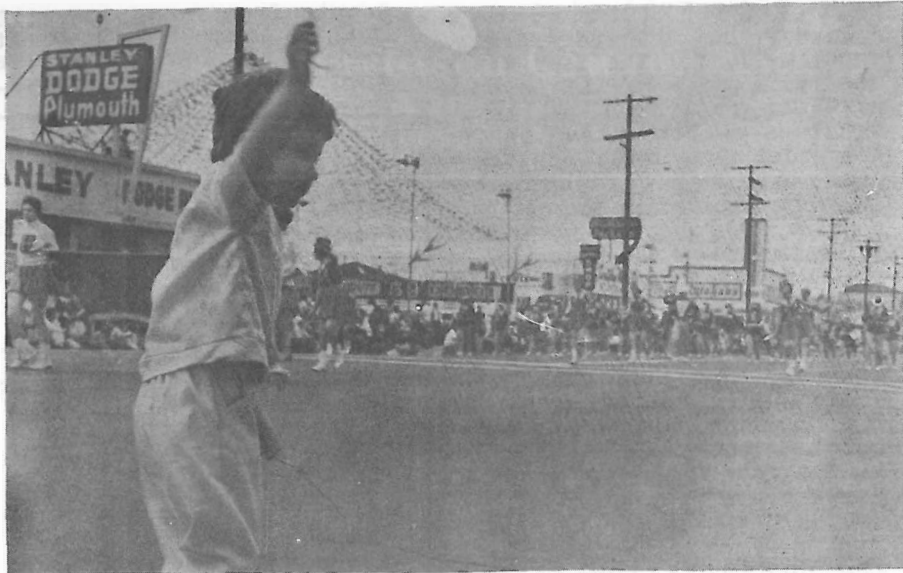

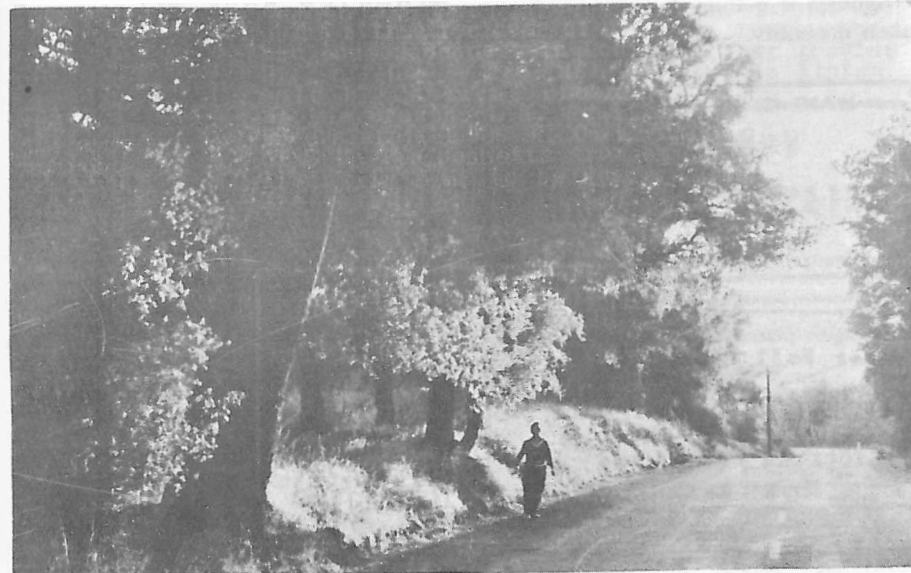

Start Enrollment Survey

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Know Your TEACHER

No stranger to Alpine is our next teacher, Mrs. Hazel Hohanshelt, who was born in Oakes, North Dakota. Her grandparents were some of the first pioneers to homestead in the Dakota territory. She went to school from first grade through high school in the same school her mother had attended.

In 1923 she came to Alpine with her mother, father and three brothers. Her teaching career began after her graduation from S.D. State in 1926. Her first job was in John Muir where she taught 47 first and second graders.

Married to Forrest Hohanshelt in 1927, the year 1928 found her teaching her first year in Alpine which was a one-teacher, one-room school with 18 pupils in all 8 grades. The graduation class of 29 consisted of 3 girls. Says Mrs. Hohanshelt, 'if it hadn't been for them, my teaching career might have been short lived. I was young and inexperienced and no course in college had prepared me for a 3-ring circus. I put a girl in each ring and we all went to work. By the end of the year those girls had not only earned a diploma but some of the most valuable experience of their lives, and my undying gratitude.

I was fortunate the 2nd year to have boys who not only taught me something about baseball (I had to play, or we wouldn't have had enough for two teams), but could take a group of youngsters through a game of (go in and out the window) and never bat an eye. By the end of the 3rd year, I felt as if I had the business pretty well in hand, and haven't had much trouble since, thanks to all my young helpers.'

Mrs. Hohanshelt took a leave of absence in 1946, and she and her husband traveled. They went North to Quebec, south to Cuba, took over 2000 feet of 16mm colored movies.

In 1950 she studied writing with Paul Perry of Coronado, in anticipation of editing her father's story of his life on the prairie. She had read the story to 1000 children and had been urged to have it published.



She took another leave in 52, when she substituted in 14 different schools throughout the county, taught all subjects from kindergarten through 8th. 'This I did to broaden my outlook and satisfy myself by viewing firsthand what others of my profession were accomplishing so that I might take a more objective view of my own work. It proved an invaluable experience.'

In 1956, she had the unique experience of working with Esther K. Meeks, children's book editor of Wilcox and Follett, Chicago publishers, on the editing, format and final publication of 'Old Sam, Thoroughbred Trotter', her father's book. It is now in schools and libraries all over the U.S. 'And I know of at least two copies in foreign countries, for I left them there myself, while traveling in Europe during the summer of 56. One I left in a children's hospital at a U.S. Army base in Luxembourg and one I gave to the Westminster Library in London'.

'And so', concludes Mrs. Hohanshelt, 'the years roll on, a lifetime gone, a lifetime ahead, a bridge of years which spans the joy and sometimes tears of working and playing with the world's most amazing people - children! Some day when I'm retired, I'm going to sit down and write a book about the wonderful education I've received from children in the last 30 years. Right now, I'm too busy enjoying them, my home, my husband and the smartest cat in the world - 'Shadow'.

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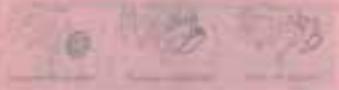
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
