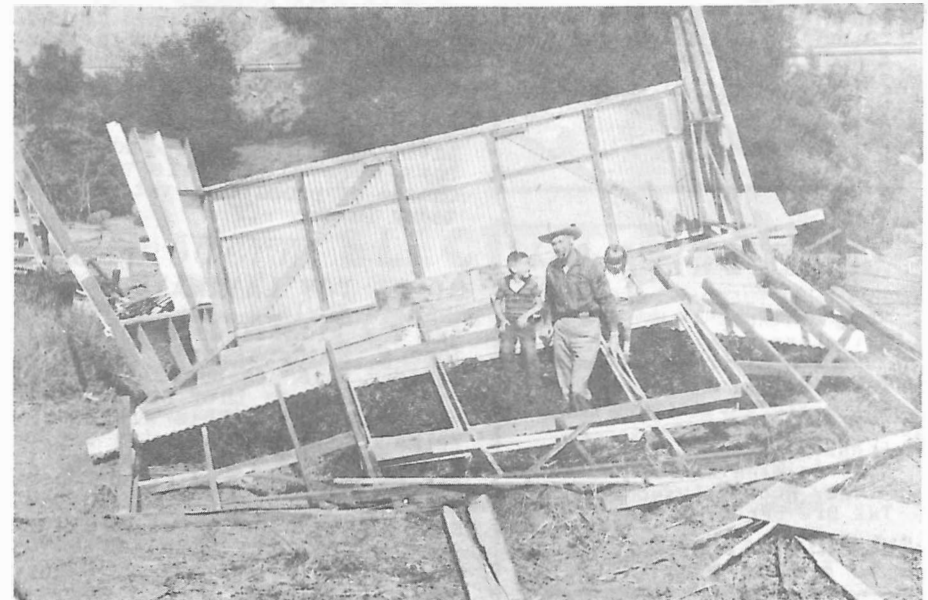

EDITORIAL.

Can Society Pay Its Debt to Chessman?

After a man is hung, or shocked in the electric chair or strangled in the fiendish gas chamber, they say 'he has paid his debt to society.'

But what about the many innocents that have 'paid' society with their precious lives, but society later discovers, with anguish that someone else did the murder for which they paid.

Has anyone asked Chessman what made him do the things he is supposed to have done? Society seems to blandly okay the con-

tinuous mahem, murder, crime, sin and sex that are shown to youngsters on TV, radio, movies, and in many newspapers and magazines.

We believe that a living Chessman is worth more to this country even if it is in prison for life, than as a rotting corpse in the cemetery. If he owed society, nearly 12 years in that hole known as death row, has more than paid it back--if he did do the things he is accused and 'found guilty' of.

If there is any shadow of doubt about his guilt, then society has only one debt to think of--his life. Society can never return it if he dies in that 'Roman holiday' show at San Quentin.

If this man is guilty, then why has he, a self-taught lawyer, been able to hold up execution for 11½ years? There must certainly be some quirk in this case, or why have the courts been dilly-dallying with his fate?

The nation was shocked at the Loeb-Leopold murder, and those boys were given life with no chance of probation, yet Leopold today is out. -CI

This was done at the board's last session, when it also authorized procurement and expenditure of funds for the election. It was reported that eligible voters total 805; 119 had signed the petition requesting this election to annex to the heights area which in turn proposes to connect to Rio San Diego MWD, whose board has approved the deal. This was at first reported negative.

Committeemen of the East County MWD who have been working for many months on the formation of the district, are skeptical of the election carrying enough to let the heights board take over. One member said 'we believe the concensus is that the people want their own district with their own representation-- and not be controlled by outside districts'.

In a sheet sent to voters last week, annexation sponsors claimed the heights deal is the 'first and only legal formed district' but they neglected to mention that the Highlands subdivision happens to be a legal district serving water from deep wells for about 2½ years!

'If voters say yes to annexing to the heights,' says an East county supporter, 'they will be giving people a blank check on their future tax bills, for no figures have been revealed as to annexation, costs or water rates. The East County people have at least stated their figures, though they seem to be mighty high'.

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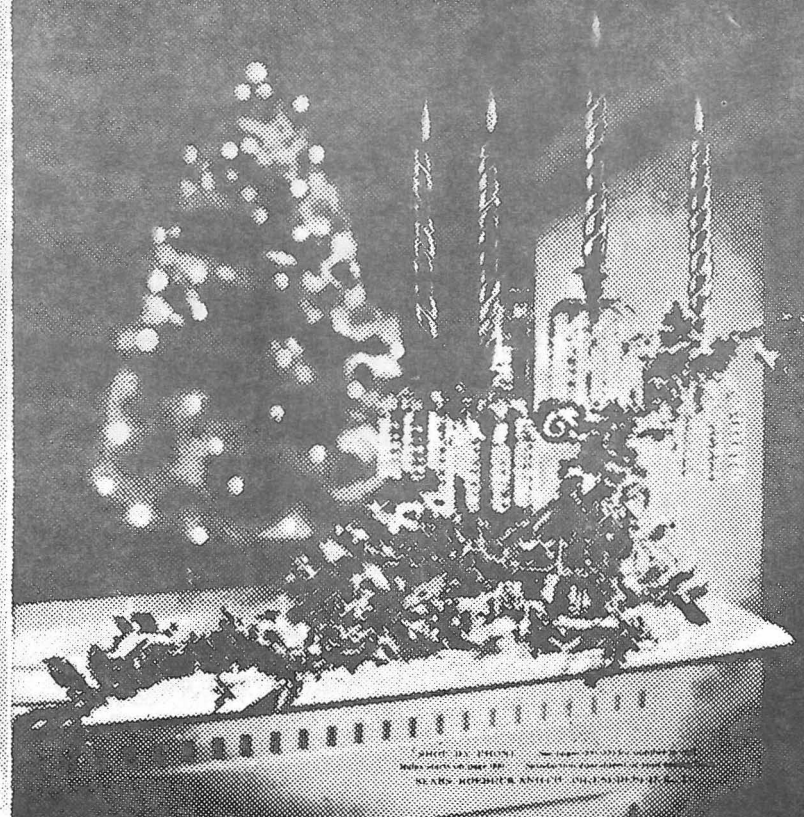


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
