It is a state law that when a dog has been hurt or killed the offender should either see that the owner is notified or take the animal to a vet's for treatment. This is just common courtesy and should be practiced.

Champ was beyond help but the two vehicles involved could have notified Mrs. McKaskle and avoided the unpleasantness of her finding their pet lying dead

in the road.

This was at

first reported negative.
Committeemen of the East County MWD who have been working for many months on the formation of the district, are skeptical of the election carrying enough to let the heights board take over. One member said 'we believe the concensus is that the people want their own district with their own representation -and not be controlled by outside districts'.
