



decade, the rising population makes the problem worse, even though more outside water becomes available, so that, to keep California green, growing and prosperous, the Feather River plan should be adopted.-CI



Specific information on taking care of your horse (continued from last issue)

By using a little common sense you will find the sense you will find the best ration for your animal Keep him well covered with flesh but avoid having him overly fat. Excessive weight is a detriment in his performing ability and will often lead to other complications. Saddle sores can be the result of a horse being too fat, thus causing your equipment to fit incorrectly.

Good feed is of prime inportance in producing a fine disposition, glossy coat and a wonderful pleasure horse.

Avoid musty, moldy or dusty feeds. Use only clean, bright feeds. Moldy hay can produce heaves (loss of wind) and makes a horse useless forever. Salt is essential and should

be kept before them at all times.

Of course they thrive on good pasture and this simplifies some of the problems involved with good management. If horses cannot be worked daily, they can gain much exercise by being in pasture.

Roughage consists of all kinds of hay. Locally, oat and alfalfa are the more common varieties available. In giving alfalfa care must be taken not to overfeed, for they will eat more than they should. If more than one-half to three-quarters pound of hay is needed per one hundred pounds of live weight, feed

pounds of live weight, feed another variety as oats.
Corn, barley, wheat and other grains are concentrates. The amount fed must be adjusted to the need of the animal, the amount of use he is getting and how easy he is to keep.






