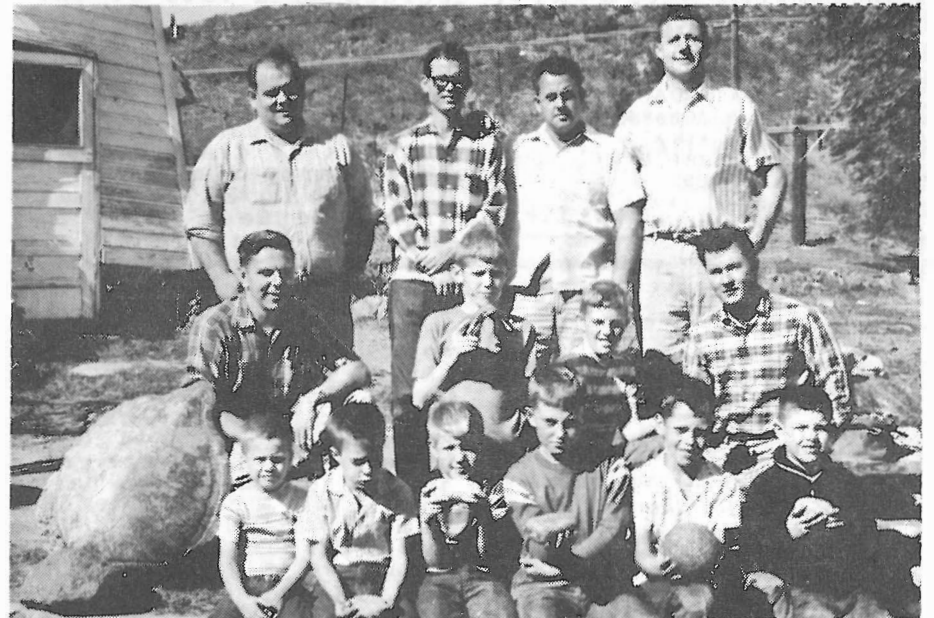

EDITORIAL

Litter War Opens but Should have Begun in Home!

A county-wide campaign against the filthy habit of littering streets and highways was opened this week with a rally at the civic center and a downtown SD parade. Supervisor Dave Bird and Mayor Dail proclaimed the period

"War Against Litter Week", even included the whole year for cleaning up. Harry J. LaDou, chairman of the committee, presided over the rally.

He told how the county spends half a million yearly to pick up trash, but nationally taxpayers are chipped \$50 million to cleanup America. We have poems and songs about beautiful America and have been taught that this is such a great country in every way, but travelers abroad often come home complaining about the US being the dirtiest place compared with many small, thrifty, cleanly nations.

Perhaps this land needs a higher ethical and moral tone in the home where children should be taught to keep things clean and in order. One cannot drive to SD without seeing ill-bred drivers toss lighted cigarettes onto the road, sometimes causing fires that may cost lives and millions in losses.

Or could it be that the nation is slipping. Perhaps all should read the Bible more, go to church, bring home the teachings, one of which would solve this slovenly problem: "Cleanliness is next to Godliness".-CI

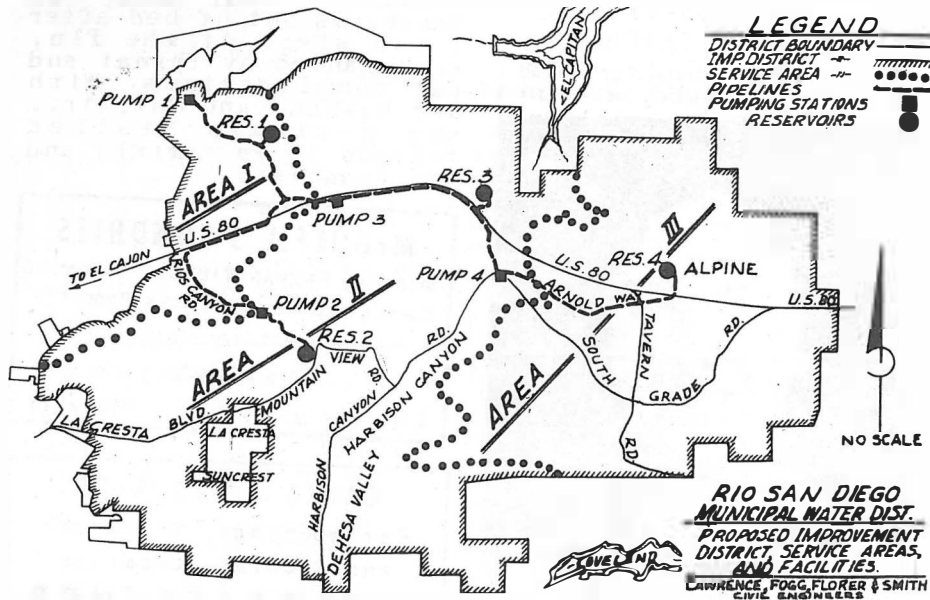

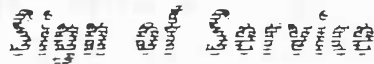

as Improvement District No. 1. "This is the only bond issue that we should ever have to ask the people to vote" Chas. C. Price, board president told the Sun. "The connection fee is so arranged that normal growth will provide funds for future development".

These fees are geared to pumping areas and distances: below 1000 feet, it is \$435. all others to 1400 ft is \$455. Alpine, between 1400 and 2000 feet is \$465. Fee includes meter and copper leads to property line.

In some districts they charge more, Helix for example now gets \$322 per acre! Lakeside is \$400 an acre. Elsewhere is a map showing the entire district with transmission lines. Although \$3 million will be requested, only \$2,200,000 will be needed for initial lines, reservoirs and pumping stations.

Price has named a campaign committee of 30 civic leaders to inform voters on this important proposition.

Literature will be presented all residents and information meetings held prior to the voting so all may know details.

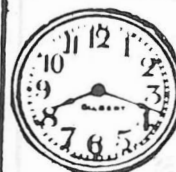
