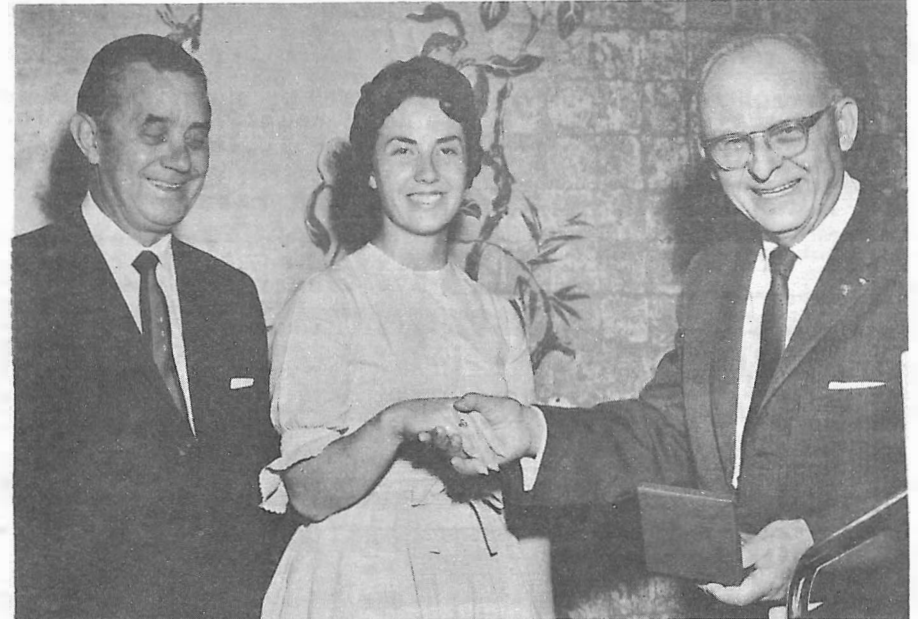

HIGHLANDS ROADS OKAYED

(CNS) Acceptance into the county road system of streets in Alpine Highlands, a 200-acre subdivision on South Grade near Hwy 80, was approved Friday by County Planning.

The commission's action was on condition that the subdivider first has to improve the roads to county standards and grant the county 10 feet of right-of-way along South Grade Road.

Application for the acceptance was filed by Frank W. O'Neill, president of Alpine Highlands Corp., owners.

The commission was told that the roads have at present the required 60 feet of right-of-way, but are improved for only a width of 36 feet, with the surfacing not installed under county supervision.

EDITORIAL

Teddy Would Have Raised Hell!

One everlasting good thing in President Theodore Roosevelt's dynamic administration was the anti-trust law, an endeavor to prevent monopolies. But it seems that America is still saddled.

Jack Schrade, our assemblyman from the 80th, gave some data on the recent horrifying stunt of burning surplus school books when 185,000 were cast into the funeral pyre, allegedly, in the interests of economy. A

million more might have met the same fate if legislators and press had not been alerted, causing a hurricane of protest and anger, not only here but nationally, even abroad.

It seems that state educators lease plates from eastern publishers, then print the books in the state printery. If surpluses occur, they formerly were sold for junk paper pulp, but price has slumped. Storage would cost \$1600 a year on this huge quantity of unused books.

But here's the rub, a state legislative analyst says a major factor in causing surpluses is overprinting: 520,000 were ordered, but 577,000 were printed, a 10% overage.

Schrade says one means to avoid this would be legislation to forbid publishers to demand a provision in their contracts preventing resale of surplus volumes to anyone including foreign governments.

Book burning has been going on for ages, but there is no reason why California taxpayers should have to pay for millions of perfectly good books being cast into the fire. -CI

SET FUNDS FOR FWY EAST

The much needed freeway from east EC to Alpine last week became nearer reality when Jacob Dekema, district engineer, said that \$1 1/2 million has been included in an allocation of \$2 1/2 million for freeway extensions. This will be used for rights-of-way from the end of present Hwy 80 Fwy construction in East EC to three miles east of Flinn Springs.

He adds that no funds have been earmarked for construction, although routes have been adopted and final design is underway.

Quite a bit of fame is coming to Alpine for its couple, the Ted Kellers, of Highlands, who have won many trophies in bowling, their latest being shown in photo.

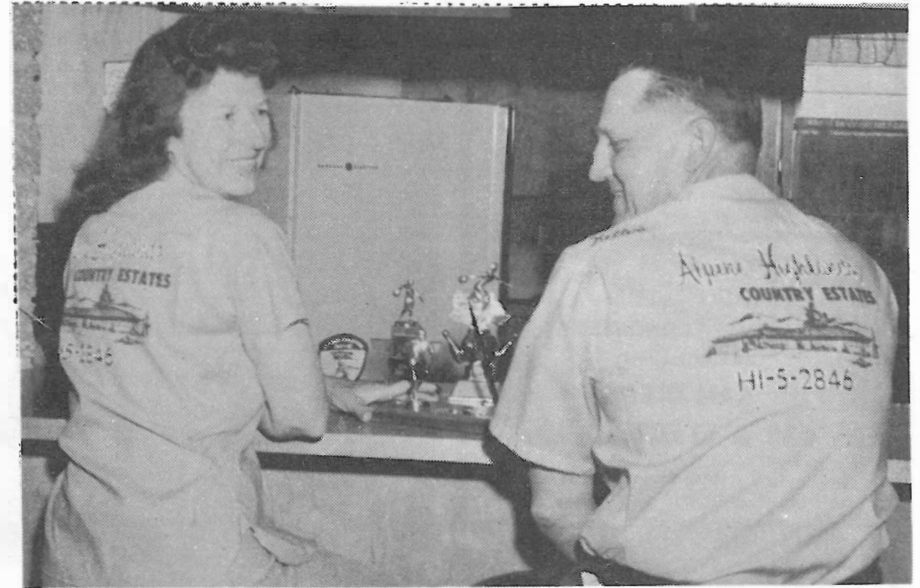
Ted, an Eagle, won the

Over 150 nutritionists, educators, newsmen and civic VIP's enjoyed the kickoff luncheon yesterday for Dairy Month, at Town & Country Hotel. "New Frontiers in Nutrition" was discussed by Dr. G.P. Whitlock, UC at Berkeley. It is part of the nationwide observance of the month of special dairy promotions, advertising and consumer education. Hostesses for the big affair were Mrs. Joanne Hill, Calif. Dairy Council, and Miss Sue Barton, SD Milk Council.

Dairy Month Data: Largest source of income in the state for agriculture is milk and cattle. The state leads the nation in production-per-cow, third in farm income from milk, and sixth in number of cows on farms. SD county has 24,000 cows worth \$7 1/2 million, processes 75,000 gallons of milk daily. It runs 104 dairies, averaging 225 cows each. One animal drinks 25-30 gallons of water daily, eats her own weight in hay each month, (1200 pounds). Milk and milk products are the chief source of calcium in the American diet.
