

Urge Less Child Watching TV Brutality

In the past few weeks there has been considerable lamentable discussion in the press about the sadism and mayhem seen on most TV and cinema screens, and heard on radios, especially gang and western topics.

Abraham A. Ribicoff, secretary of health, education and welfare, a few days ago chided parents about allowing children to sit with their eyes fastened to the flickering square. He says they must "get tough with the kids, themselves, as well as the TV industry" (And Radio; also movies).

Ribicoff discussed this vexing problem before the Senate juvenile delinquency subcommittee where chairman T.J. Dodd charged that broadcasters and producers have not tried to stop TV sadism

and brutality.

"If he is permitted to sit like a vegetable, pursuing moronic murders and ceaseless crimes, he suffers, and his parents do too -- in the end."

He urged the industry to show the good as well as the seamy side of life. He said that at Stanford Dr. Albert Bandura found that children who watch such violence display twice as much aggression as those not exposed.

This week J. Edgar Hoover, FBI chief, dis-closed facts that could well tie in with this lowering influence: Crime in 1960 rose 12% over 1959, and "in the first quarter of 1961 our country appears headed for a new all time high annual record... an increase of 10% in crime in American cities, with a 9% jump in murders, a 2% rise in forcible rapes, and a 3% increase in aggressive assaults".

Producers are beefing up their shows to make them sell more. There are scientists who believe that malnutrition is a factor in making young-sters, and others, exhibit more imbalance in emotions, as witness the juvenilé gang wars, vandalism, robbery and such crimes.
