Heavy School Tax Vote Seen Jan. 16

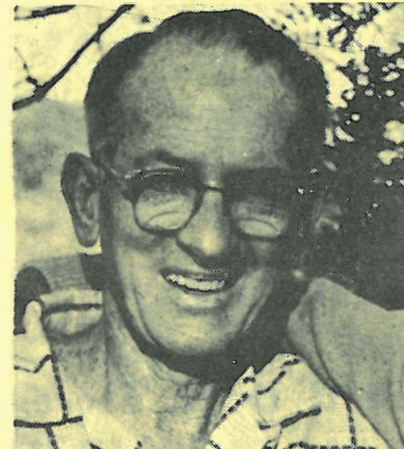
A heavy turnout is expected when Alpine Union School District voters go to the polls Tuesday, Jan. 16, to approve or reject a proposed increase in the maximum tax rates from \$1.51 to \$1.86.

The rate would be effective for the school years 1962-63 to 1964-65 inclusive.

All the areas within the exterior boundaries embracing the county general election precincts 2, 3, 4 and 5 in Alpine, portions of Alpine 1 and Descanso are included in the vote. (Polls will be open from 7 to 7)

The assessor's office estimates the new rate,

Disposal Site Lease

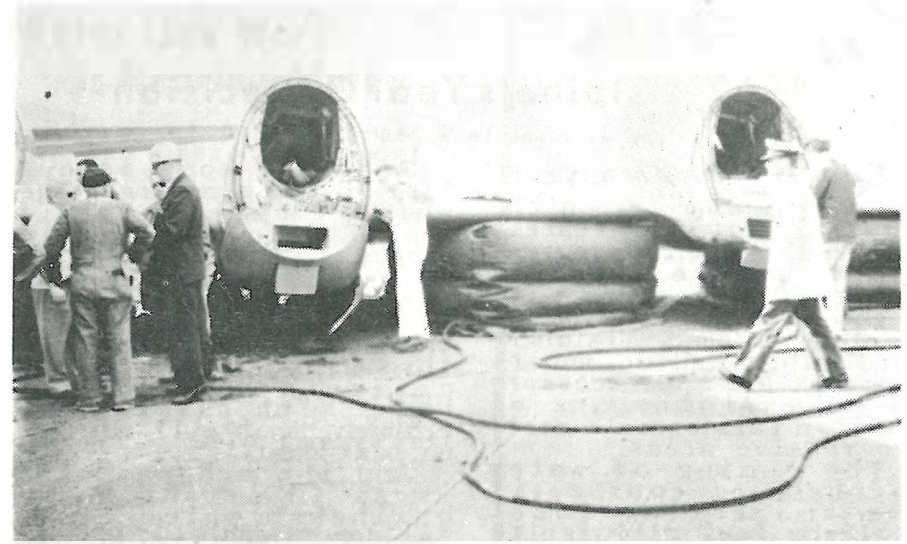
(CNS)- A new five-year lease on the area used for the Alpine refuse disposal site was approved by the County Board of Supervisors.

A zoning code is one item in the planning stage which is essential if Alpine is to make orderly progress. The County Planning Commission is now working such a program.

It is well that this is under study because only through such a plan can citizens build their homes with assurance a chicken ranch will not go up next door.

And the program also is as important for a business, which could easily find itself surrounded by homes if no planning code were enacted.

Zoning does not stifle construction. It offers both homeowners and businessmen the opportunity to build in confidence.

A bank for Alpine will most certainly come with the water. Such a bank will mean more than a convenient place where residents can open savings and checking accounts and where businessmen can obtain change.

It will mean that a financial institution is prepared to offer FHA and banking loans for new homes and ventures, as well as provide means for remodeling.

Thus a bank will open vast new possibilities for a growing Alpine.

Water Line Work Is Nearing Alpine

Laying of pipe for the Rio San Diego Municipal Water District was started Tuesday on West Oak Creek Road and Hawley Road, it was announced by Charles Price, general manager.

Hamm Bros., which has the contract, is expected to complete work along those roads within five days. Al Adams, chairman of the Alpine Heights District, said the first load of pipe has arrived here and work has started on Rock Terrace Road.

Under the present contract, which includes the first phase of the district project, Hamm Bros. has the following roads in the Alpine area:

Alpine Terrace, Tavern Road, South Grade Road between Tavern and Alpine Heights Roads, and Alpine Heights Road.

It also has the contract on Hwy 80 from the post-office to Victoria Drive, up Victoria Drive as far as Dr. Charles O. Tanner's place and south on Rock Terrace and south Grade Road as far as Viejas Ranch.

All of this work is in the present contract.

The second contract, for which bids will be called Jan. 9, will cover the balance of Victoria Drive, Midway Drive, Marshall Road and Olive-wood Lane. There also is a possibility that Louise Drive will be included, but Price said this is uncertain.

The present contractors are committed to completing the first phase of the project within 30 working days, laying 1,000 feet of pipe daily.

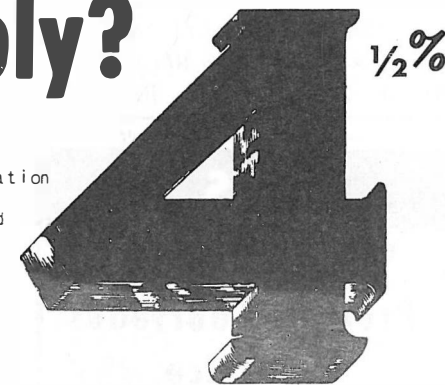

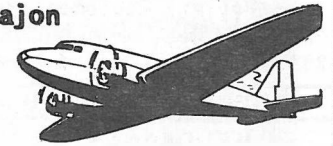

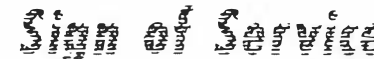

Plan Atomic Power

An automated, nuclear-fueled, steam-electric generating plant midway between LA and SD load centers will be built, the SD Gas & Electric Co., announces. It will supply steam for a 375,000 kw Westinghouse turbo generator. Total cost will be about \$78 million, to be shared by the SD firm and the Southern California Edison Co., of LA. First the many engineering, realty, technical and US atomic office details must be completed. Target date for operation is July 1, 1965. This is one of 129 plants being developed with total cost of over \$700 million.

they do not see how an increase would be warranted.

They point to figures which show a 1.2% drop in attendance in 1959-60 from the estimate and a 6.06% drop in 1960-61.

Gilley, however, estimates an increase of 10% for the 1961-62 school year.

Mrs. Robert Webb, president of Alpine PTA, said she as an individual is in favor of the increase, although she said the PTA has taken a neutral stand in line with its policy on controversial issues.

'I personally believe we will have a population increase, and if we are to keep good teachers we must pay salaries in line with the state average and we must have better equipment,' she said. 'One thing is certain. We must not be caught short once additional children begin arriving.' But Mrs. Webb said the PTA's chief aim is to try to get out the vote.

Gilley explained his position on the issue at a general PTA meeting at Harbison Canyon and to the Alpine PTA board.

The average statewide pay for teachers is \$5,652 as compared to the Alpine average of \$5,414, Gilley said. Last year's budget for the school district was \$277,000, but revenue

A general discussion about distribution lines was held. Al Adams, chairman, told the group the board would continue in existence until water is a going operation.

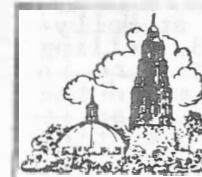

Hunt has always worked closely with businessmen and civic organizations with the goal of promoting community progress.

He firmly believes that Alpine will continue to thrive and grow and has extreme faith in the future of the community.

Hunt plans no immediate changes in The Sun, but said his aim is to have it grow with Alpine.

Irvine has spent his life in writing, was with the LA Times, Honolulu Advertiser, and a few years in film publicity at Hollywood where he also wrote scenarios, started the first screen weekly just before joining the navy in WWI.

For 16 years he edited and published Let's LIVE! which he started at Hollywood in Jan. 1933, selling in 1948, coming here in 1949 where he started the Sun in Jan. 1952, ran it with his wife Alice, till this issue.

In 1927 Irvine bought an educational film 'The Birth of a Flower', which he took on a world tour, lecturing with it and giving health talks at odd times, covering
