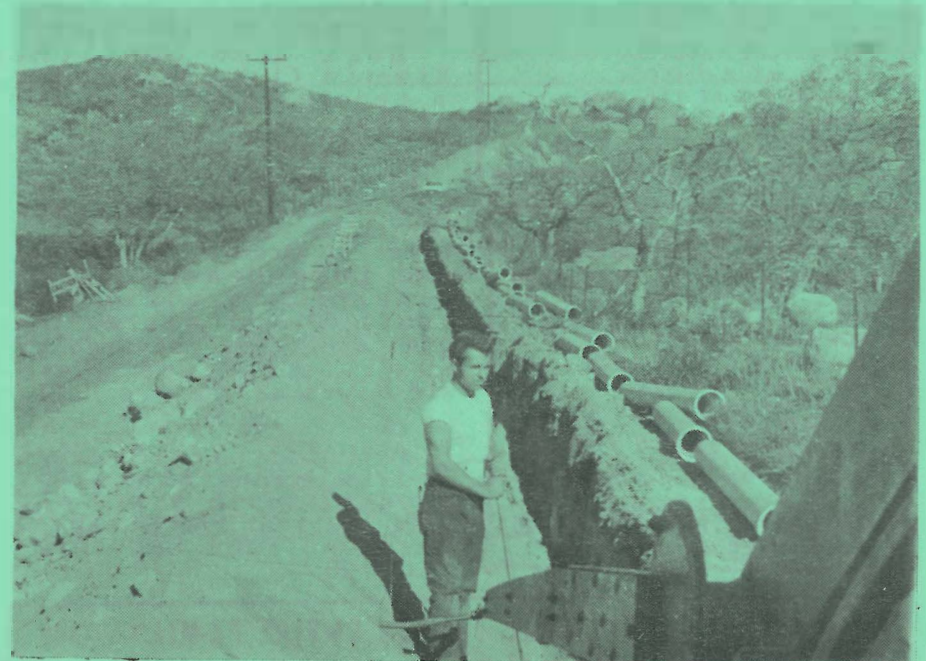
The Alpine School District's bid for a \$1.86 tax rate was defeated at the polls Tuesday 376-122.

Gerlt To Expand Alpine Cleaners

Gerry Gerlt, operator of Alpine Cleaners, will move his complete laundry plant from El Cajon and consolidate it with his Alpine operation by March 1.

The entire business, both dry cleaning and laundry, will be located in the old fire barn at 2435 Hwy 80, which is now being remodeled. The structure will provide double the space of Gerlt's present location at 2223 Hwy 80.

'This is going to be the prettiest and most modern plant of its kind in San Diego County,' Gerlt said.

Plans provide for a call office, private office, and modern production facilities to assure the most efficient service possible, he added.

Gerlt said his call office and counter will be moved to the new location about Feb. 1, but he will continue production at his present location until March 1, when the changeover will be completed. He said the same services as now being provided will continue.

Gerlt opened his business two years ago as a pressing shop operated by one man. Now he operates four trucks, covering all of San Diego County, and has 11 employees.

He recently installed two-way radio systems in his trucks to keep in constant contact with the drivers in order to provide faster service.

Mrs. Sachse Shows Asian Jewelry

Mrs. Emil Sachse presented her collection of hand made silver jewelry and cloth for muslin batiks, all popular in the Mediterranean and Middle East areas, at the Women's Club January meeting.

The batiks are a form of wax painting and is an art of Indonesia, particularly Java, she said. They are used for sarongs and are worn with native skirts.

Bracelets, ear rings, necklaces and rings were in the jewelry display.

Mrs. Sachse, who lives with her husband at 2751 Hwy 80, retired from the US government foreign service in 1958 and came to Alpine two and a half years ago.

She entered foreign service as a secretary at the American Legation

in Peiping, China, in 1927, and since then her work has taken her to Barranquilla, Colombia, South America, where she served with the consulate general, at Sidney, Australia, with the consulate and with the embassy at Canberra, Australia; with the consulate at Tia Juana, and at Munich, Germany; Djakarta, Java, Indonesia, and Beirut, Lebanon, in which position she retired.

Her most trying experience in foreign service was in 1941 in the embassy at Peiping, where she was held for eight months by the Japanese during World War II.

Mrs. Sachse said she and other members in the legation had sufficient food and were well treated, but there was the constant fear of what would happen to them should the Japanese win or lose the war.

In July, 1942, she with 17 others of the legation, was repatriated, leaving Shanghai on the Italian ship Conteverde and being taken to the neutral exchange port of Lorenzo Marques in Portuguese East Africa. There the group boarded the Swedish ship Gripsholm for America.

Then followed the series of foreign assignments.

She was in Guatemala during the uprising there in the 1950s, shooting being so intense she was forced to crawl from her home to the US embassy across the street to avoid the bullets.

While in Beirut, which

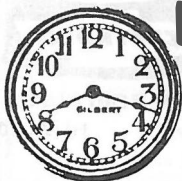

60-Foot Road Sought For Victoria Drive

A move to clarify road boundaries and seek a 60-foot wide road for Victoria Drive where possible was launched by the Victoria Drive Assn. at last week's meeting.

It also was decided to ask the county to paint a white line around the drive, at least in the dangerous areas. Bruce McKie, manager of the Alpine Chamber of Commerce, offered his organization's help in obtaining the line.

Members of the association also brought up their principal aim-- keeping home plots to a minimum of one acre.

Auren Pierce, a local developer, said it is a nice concept to say let's have one, two or three acres, and explained he wasn't arguing against it, but added various factors must be considered.

Among these, he asserted, are costs of improvements where there are no dedicated roads, and the topography of the land which could result in limitations.

As to the 60-foot road, it was brought out that in many instances land owners would have to provide easements on each side of the thoroughfare to make it possible. Since such procedure likely would cut right through some homes, association president Orville Palmer

expressed concern the county might institute condemnation proceedings in those cases.

Pierce, however, said it was his understanding that it would be possible to obtain right-of-way where possible and leave

Palmer reported the Rio SD Water District told him the prohibitive cost would make it impossible to bury the water tank on Anderson Road.

As an alternative, Palmer said, the water district will put the tank in the side of a hill and should it appear unsightly, trees would be planted. At any rate the district promised to protect the beauty of the area. Cost would be \$20,000 as compared to several times that amount if the tank were buried.

Marge Cooper was granted a contract as school secretary by the Alpine district board of education at its January meeting. She succeeds Mrs. Virginia Spires who resigned.

George White was named custodian at Harbison Canyon school and Mrs. Vera Bachiero was granted a contract for No. 17 bus.

The board announced that under a new state law effective as of Jan. 15, every school child must be innoculated for polio, unless the family has religious objections. In that case a written report must be turned in to school authorities.

Children coming in from other districts must show they have been innoculated.

The board authorized home tutoring for 60 days for a child unable to attend school, following a request by the parents. It was believed the child would be able to return to school at the close of that period. The district is partially reimbursed by the state.

PTA HEARS IRVINE

Alpine Zoning Code Procedure Is Set Up

The procedure for setting up a zoning code for the Alpine area has been outlined by a number of the SD County planning department.

Roy W. Griffin, associate planner, said before any such code becomes law, planners will confer with community leaders, call an informal public hearing, conduct a formal hearing, then turn their findings over to the county commission for final mapping. This in turn will be presented to the board of supervisors for final action.

'We want to be sure everyone has an opportunity to be heard,' Griffin said.

Plans call for setting up a Citizens Advisory group of perhaps eight

persons representing key organizations in the community.

This group will then be shown maps showing locations of all homes, stores and agricultural areas.

At that time the advisory group can give its views on zoning and after several meetings a specific zoning plan will be mapped.

The informal public hearing will follow, possibly at the school auditorium, where all persons will be given an opportunity to inspect the program, and make comments or criticisms.

If changes are found necessary, the plan can be revised. When the planning commission receives the finished proposal, revisions are still possible if interested parties show good reason.

The proposal will then be turned over to the board of supervisors, and even this group can make revisions and return it to the commission.

Meanwhile offices of both groups will be open to hear arguments for or against.

Final approval of the ordinance is up to the supervisors.

Griffin said a lot of controversy would naturally slow the program as any major disagreement would increase the number of hearings.
