EDITORIAL



Is State Subverting America's Freedoms?

Wednesday this nation celebrated its birthday. Its independence, protection and freedom are being slowly ravaged and few are doing anything about it. We battle for freedom, but we must fight to keep it!

A glaring example of this happened last week in SD when Adolph Hohensee, 55, a health lecturer, was arrested like a criminal while delivering a series of lectures at Hotel San Diego.

This citizen is doing something about it. He has filed a \$173,000 suit in US District Court, naming state health officials, a policewoman and the hotel, alleging fraud, conspiracy, theft of personal property and false arrest. He is out

on \$10,000 bond, continues his talks. He claims they took \$43,000 in personal property from his hotel room without a search warrant. That is where protection of the bill of rights is being suppressed.

This is no new event, for dozens of chiropractors, health lecturers and others have been subjected to the same invasion of personal freedom. As Si Casady says in his EC Valley News column Along Main Street: 'We don't arrest people for claiming a certain brand of cigarette is 'refreshing', or that a certain brand of beer is the 'finest', or that some carbonated beverage will give you a 'lift' or that bufferin works 'twice as fast as aspirin'.

It seems that if you try to sell something for health that might-- and mostly does-- knock out a costly medical call, or a profitable pill sale, you are promptly ridiculed as a food faddist, a health nut or a looney! But a lot of natural healing cranks are still enjoying life while their ignorant or prejudiced critics are safely underground or on their way there! -CI

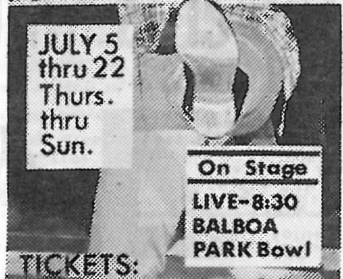
PICNIC SEASON IS ON

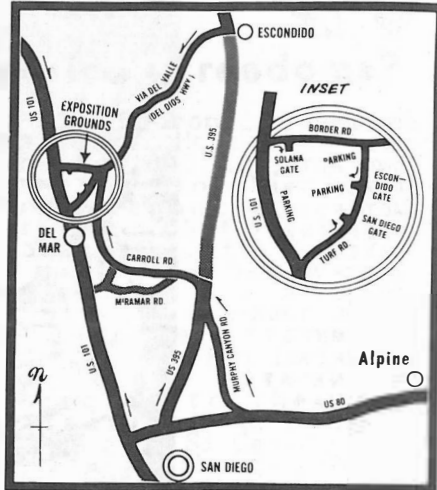

Cut School Budget

Reversion to the 90¢ school tax rate caused the board at its last session to balance the budget with curtailments or eliminations, including no summer school, shop classes or salary increases except automatic annual increments. One bus cut off, causing certain children to walk and no money for new transportation equipment.

Lunches will be upped from 25 to 35, 35 to 45 for adults. Curtailment of already neglected maintenance and capital outlay by 45% with reduction of instructional supplies by 40% and no money for added teachers in case of rising enrollment. The approved preliminary budget is \$268,692.

Witnesses of the fiery crash of a jet from Miramar on Wednesday last week below town are being quizzed by a 4-man board. The pilot, killed instantly, was Lt. Wm. Tarpley, 32, whose body was forwarded to his home, Rowden, Ga.

Officers said three aircraft were on air-to-air training-- dog fighting-- and Tarpley failed to pull up. Many saw the accident, complained that they were too low over populated areas. Had it fallen a few seconds later it could have hit the Fairview settlement. A brush fire started by the explosion, was quickly contained by state forestry firemen.

fire was unknown. It destroyed the 6-room frame house. The husband is away in the hospital.

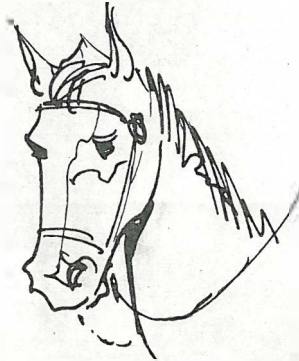
