EDITORIAL

Bus Killing May Reveal Other Lax Laws

The shocking church bus tragedy Monday which took eight lives, injured 60 on Hwy 101 is already sparking tighter laws for operating private buses.

Dist. Atty. Don Keller says that a bill will be before the next Legislature to stiffen inspection of vehicles used by churches as a result of this bad accident. In LA supervisors called for annual safety checks on all Sunday school and church buses. They also told their counsel to

prepare legislation for the next session.

The CHP completed its investigation, impounded the bus tires. But nothing was revealed as to whether the tires were badly worn, or were retreads. Good tires just do not blow very often.

There were many factors that produced this horrible wreck. The party left LA at 6:15 am, went to Tiajuana on a mission of Mercy, lunched in SD on the way home, and was making 60 or 70 miles an hour when the tire blew on a slight curve. The 48-year old driver was a preacher, not a licensed chauffeur bus driver. He was passing a car, moving into the left lane which action would cause extra strain on tires. It was a warm day and heat makes more pressure. The bus was 21 years old, designed to carry 53, but carried 66. The overload might have placed extra strain on the rubber. Anyone driving that many miles would be tired and in a hurry to get home at 5 pm on a hot day.

At Oceanside the CHP said it would start inspecting private church buses on March 1, following a session in San Francisco of safety and transportation agencies. Why not start on Sept. 1? Why wait six months?

Everyone is sorrowing with Roy Rogers and his wife who lost their little girl in the sad accident, the latest in a number of tragedies that have hit the fine couple.

We believe in prayer, but at the same time we do not expect the Creator to maintain safety for us if we try to drive without good tires! -CI

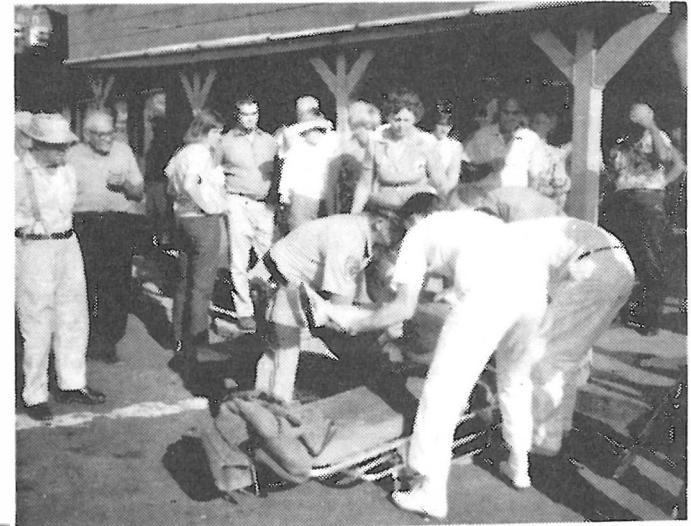

Refrigerator-Freezer

No-Frost-Ever Type

The refrigerator-freezer which most families want is actually two-appliances-in-one. It has a refrigerator section and a true freezer compartment which maintains zero temperature.

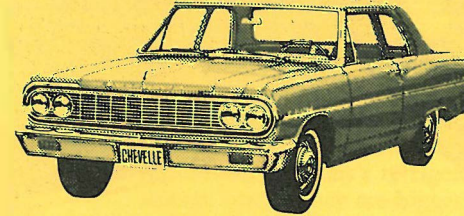
A big new feature of this refrigerator-freezer is the absence of frost in the freezer as well as in the refrigerator section. If frozen food packages don't stick together, frost-free, the labels can be read easily. A distinct advantage is the fact that you defrost *either* the refrigerator or freezer.

Types That Frost

Next to the no-frost-ever type of refrigerator, the most desirable type is one in which no frost forms in the refrigerator but does form in the freezer. The freezer defrosts automatically. A variation of this type which calls for manual defrosting of the freezer, you do the defrosting when necessary. An old-fashioned refrigerator-freezer which must be *completely* defrosted by hand. With either of these types, you have the messy defrosting job.

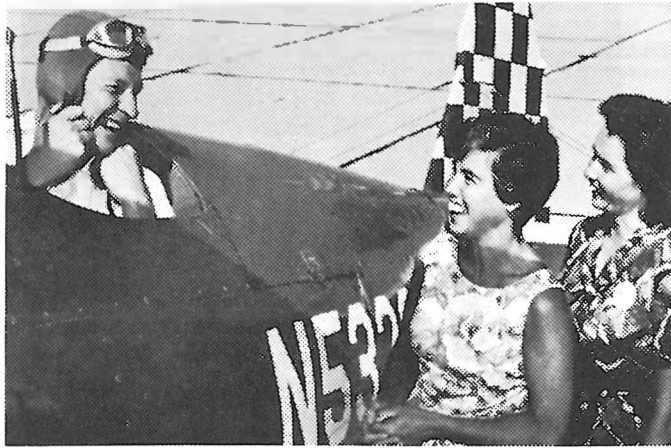
