One of America's earliest fliers came into the limelight yesterday when he made the maiden flight of a 1911 type biplane he built in SD. He is Waldo Waterman, who holds the honor of having jumped in a Chanute type glider from Laurel and Albatross hill where a monument marks the spot. He suffered two broken ankles. Every July 1 he observes the anniversary with a flight. In SD he worked with Curtiss on the first flying boat, holds one of the oldest pilot tickets in the world. 
