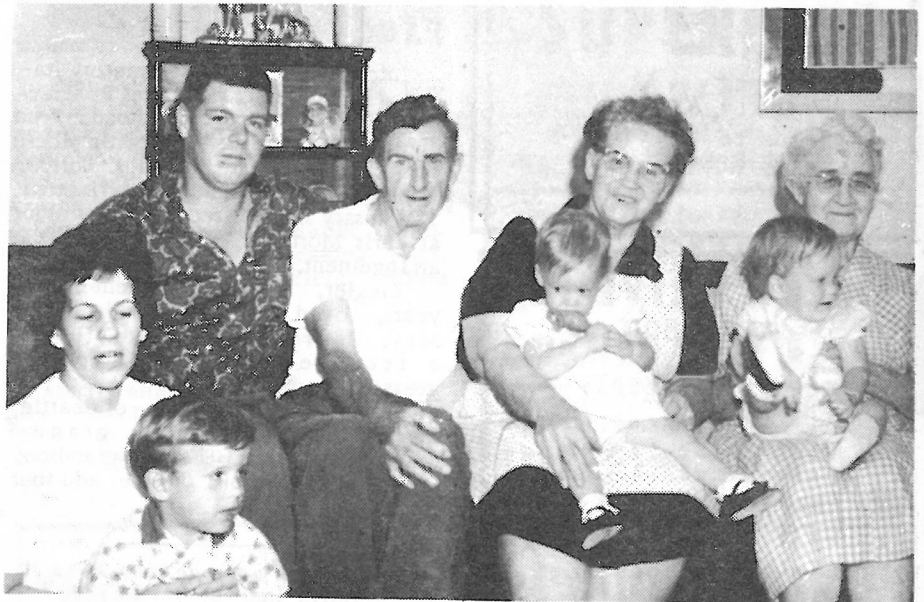

During the excitement Carol Sue slipped and threw her sacroiliac out. She was expecting her third child momentarily and had to be rushed to Sharp Memorial Hospital after the ordeal. She gave birth to a 9 lb. 3 oz. boy and named him Michael Ross.

The blaze did considerable damage to the car and interior of the garage. After the fire department had gone, they inspected the extent of damage. Tennis rackets in the back has been left intact but the nylon strings had completely disintegrated. Her mother, Mrs. Larry Wilcox, Tavern Road, said "we all don't know how lucky those kids were, it could have ended in tragedy". She took care of the two grandchildren while Carol Sue was in the hospital.

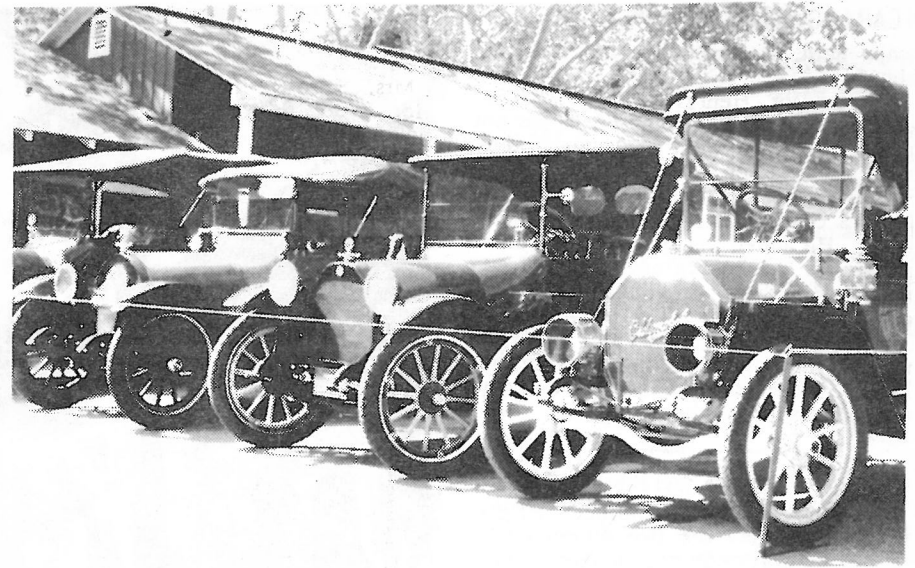

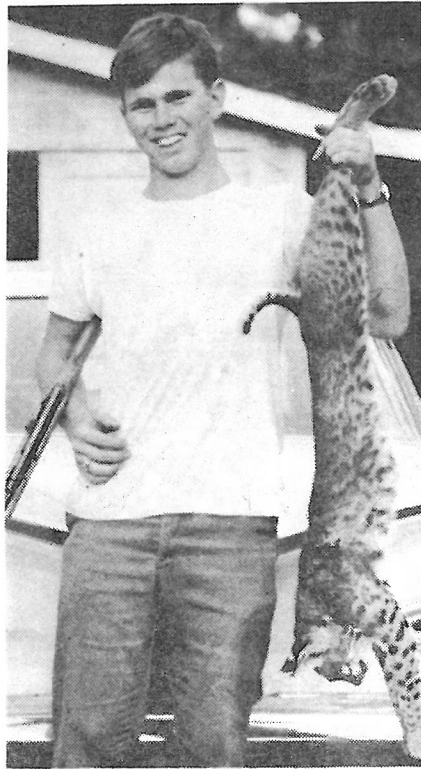

bie, 4, are taking swimming lessons from June Sortino these past weeks and having a good time doing it. Their mother, Carol Dodd, has been working at McCall's School.

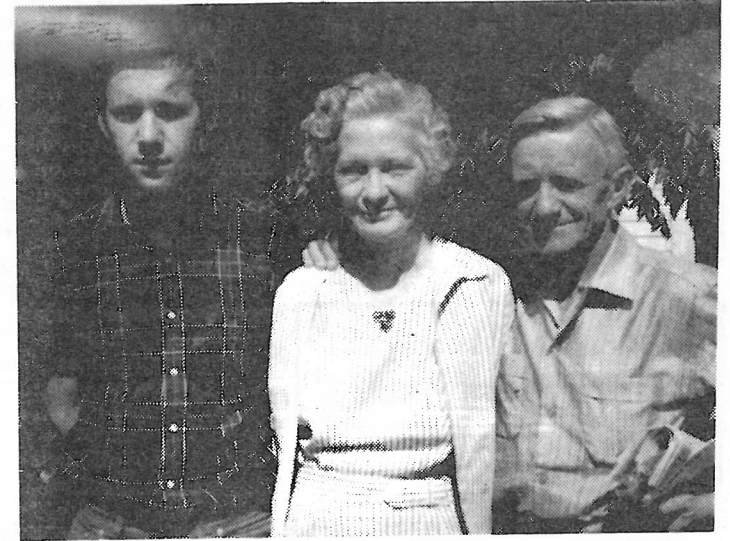
Eddie Schwenck shot a huge bobcat Friday and Cynthia went over and took some pictures. The animal was bothering some of his 4-H projects and he had to get it.
