Lutherans Came Long Way in 400Years.

The worldwide popularity and strength of the Lutheran Church today did not come about merely by one man's efforts; it has taken over 400 years to achieve this position. Martin Luther, its founder, and the man who triggered the Protestant Reformation in the fifteenth century, shows what early training does for one.

At only 7 he was a Latin student. His father raised him under strict dis-

cipline. Later he had to sing in the streets for his bread. He stood out in poetry, rhetoric, music, and at 22 he was second in a list of 17 for the MA. He studied law, but entered a monastery in Germany, became a

priest, later gave that up.

He translated the New from the Greek, became famous for his "95 Theses" which he nailed to the church doors in Wittenberg. In 1858 the old doors were replaced by bronze ones with his 95 Theses thereon.

He wrote a total of 400 works, many famous hymns, 37 in all, introduced singing by the congregation, advocated marriage for the clergy, took unto himself a wife, a former nun, raised six children. He lectured on Aristotle. Motto for his doctrine was the sentence from the New Testament: "The just shall live by faith".

He denied the supreme power of the pope, refused to recant when threatened with excommunication, burned the accusing paper in public. It was said of Luther that he never feared anyone, great or mighty. He said the service should be in a language all could

Martin Luther died at only 63 on Feb. 15, 1546, but the spirit of a great and a good man came to Alpine Sunday with the installation of a resident pastor for that congregation. Luther is buried in the church at Wittenberg, but he lives in part in Alpine. -CI

Harold Lutz's attorney, Geo. Hurst, who maintained at the recent SD hearing on motorcycle racing here, that use of the two-wheelers was legal. County Planning denied Lutz variance for track enlargement and special use permit to race the cycles.

A surprise ruling on the second part of the action today seems to point out that Lutz can continue to race motorcycles as well as micromidgets. The ruling came from Deputy County Council Frederic G. Dunn. He said the county could prevent Lutz from using the enlarged track.
