Storm on Fwy Prices

When 26 perturbed property owners along Hwy 80 where the freeway is to buy their land, signed an objection letter to Gov. Brown, he put John Erreca, director of public works on the job to explain.

He told them in a letter to Mrs. Geo. Fordney that the state tries "to assure a property owner that he shall receive the total payment to which he is legally entitled... that the staff of appraisers are thoroughly trained.... and their reports are carefully checked by supervisors". He said he was requesting rights-of-way men to call upon Alpiners who objected to the low prices offered.

Assemblyman Hale Ashcraft of this district said he would "do everything in my power to assist in accomplishing an equitable dispersion of all properties needed". An attorney for the people is working on the matter, promises early reports on what happens.

Collard Hits County

A claim of \$10,000 general damages and \$2,574 in past and future medical expenses, has been filed by Donald Collard, 31, owner of Shadyrock Ranch So. Marshall Road. He charges that he was "assaulted, beaten and battered" by sheriff's deputies when they arrested him at 11 pm on Aug. 3.

He was charged, and later given four years' probation when he pleaded guilty to conspiring to produce pornographic films and to possession of marijuana. He says he was arrested by Deputies Lawrence Narron, Beverly Oldham, John Gault and Wm. Robbins. The claim must be made before a lawsuit can be filed.

The Alpine area was rejoicing this week over the first real rain of the season, a steady soaker that registered rather uniformly around here.

Weatherman Robt. Fey at the fire station reported 1.69 inches Tuesday night.

Over at Lake Loveland, C.L. Phelps told the Sun that his gauge showed 1.64 inches to 8 pm Monday and the lake had risen 2" from the small trickling creek coming to life after the long dry summer. Phelps is caretaker with his wife. He has been with the water company for 25 years, was at Dehesa before taking this post four years ago.

Out on Japatul Rd. at Deer Hollow Ranch, Col. John Hood said his gauge showed 1.75 inches to Monday night, while up at the forestry station in Descanso their gauge stood at 1.65.

While Big Oak Ranch on Harbison Canyon Rd., has no gauge, Mrs. Stephens, wife of the owner, said they had a nice rainfall.

Anyhow, things are looking pretty and fresh with the dust all washed off and the fire hazard vanished.

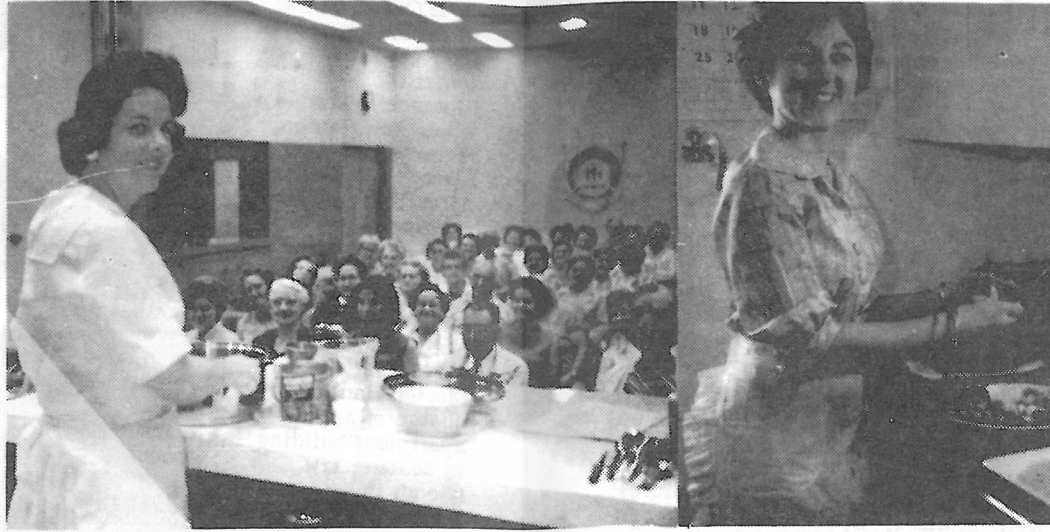

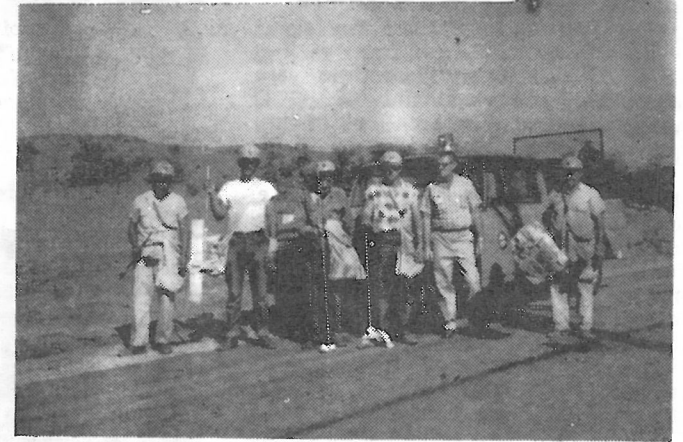

Linda and Libby Wake drove over to Brawley last weekend, attended the Cattle Call Rodeo. They both has a super time.

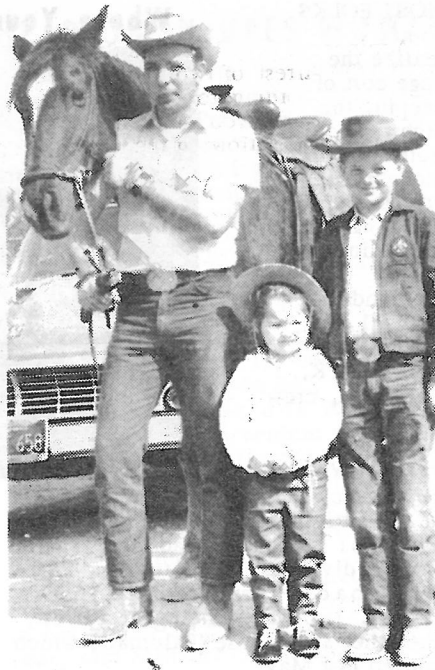
