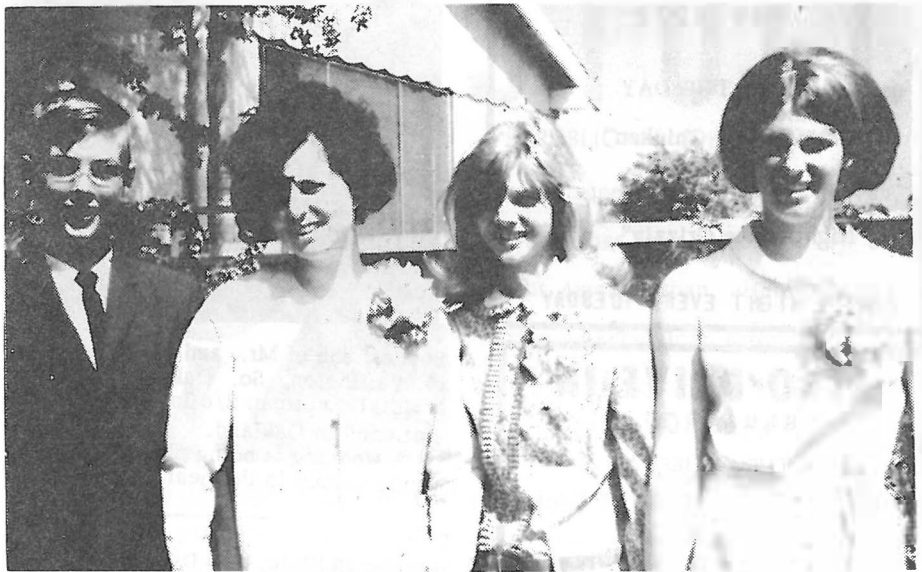

Only One Way to Vote on Water-- YES!

Way back in 1950, before the Sun was started (Jan. 1952), your editor, coming here for the second time from Hollywood in 1949, (first time in 1937) was well aware of the national trend of water table decline.

He then got out the first petitions to start a water committee to study the bringing of water to Alpine, which was served by ample wells. But none would buy the idea.

Then in the 50's, when wells were drying up and much concern was felt, the campaign for water became hot, resulting in realization of the Rio SD MWD, serving this and nearby areas.

Now we face population growth, expansion of ranches, and more need for this precious liquid. In a few brief years this area, put into proximity of towns and cities below, will house more than one can realize today. We will need more and more water.

That is why there is really only one way to vote on V & W at Tuesday's election--- Vote Yes! Yes, for vital water. Only six years ago the people, spearheaded by SD County, voted for the plan to bring Feather River water to thirsty Southern California. That plan is progressing, but the Southland must be ready for all that water when it gets here.

That is why the two bond issues, V & W, for \$30 and \$850 millions for those facilities are urgently required, and they are promised at no increase in tax rates. Remember, no SD County Water Authority has ever failed to pass a water bond issue. -CI

Veterans in Memorial

Monday at 11 Alpine veterans conducted their annual service at the Veteran's Memorial plot with a group of former servicemen and the public on hand.

Cdr. Bert Fuller, USN ret., was emcee. Cdr. Perry Welch of Mt. Barracks, 2617, Veterans of WW1, was chairman. Red, white and blue flowers were laid on the grave of Mr. Harrel-

son, the veteran who lies in the lone grave on the plot. Photo shows, from left; and those who placed flowers, Mrs. Ellen Schiek, president, WW1 Auxiliary; Jim Radford, representing the Fleet Reserve; and Welch. (See editorial last issue).

Fuller paid sincere tribute to the thousands who have died "to preserve the freedom of our country through eternity, just as those boys are doing in Viet Nam today, and as they did in WW1 and WW2. Our nation was founded under God and I think He is guiding us today, and if I were not too old, I'd go out there and help them win today-but we all can fight for them here at home".

Fuller wore the Army's Distinguished Service Cross for service he rendered on Bataan when he was a POW, escaped, headed the guerillas which helped MacArthur return. This is the next award to the Congressional Medal of Honor.

During the siege he skippered a converted PT boat, the last one ever to fight in the Islands. He lost four of his crew to bombers, two Marines and two Navy men, eight surviving

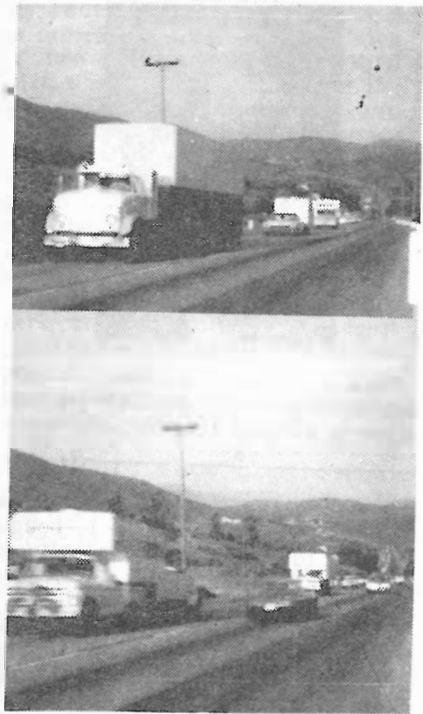
