Widow of Jesse Crawford, Organist, Living Here

Recently Mrs. Jesse Crawford bought a nice home here and moved in because of Alpine's fine climate and quiet, also as she has relatives in the area. She moved here from LA, is a native of NY.

Shortly after The Sun welcomed her to Alpine, interviewed her and it was a pleasant surprise to learn that she is the widow of the world famed organist and composer, Jesse Crawford. He became the highest paid and most popular theatre recording artist.

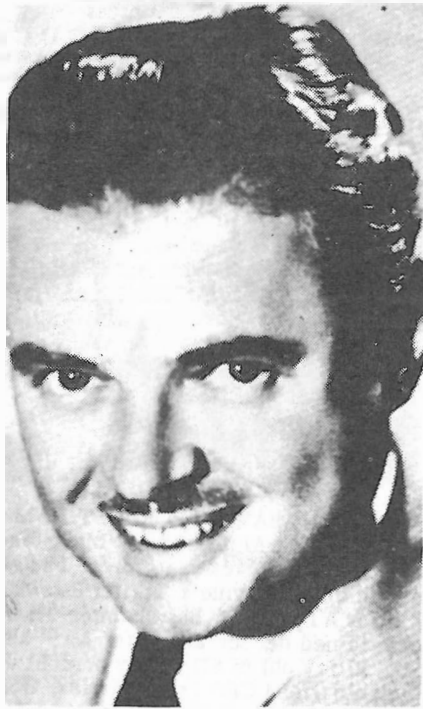
He held two signal honors; the first artist to sell a million records for Victor, and first organist to record a theatre organ electrically. Everyone remembers the piece, "Valencia". Previously all recordings had been made mechanically by sound, and this new departure affected the industry for all time. In 1938 he played England, became immensely popular.

This musical genius made an humble beginning in Spokane, went to Seattle, then Sid Grauman secured him for his San Francisco movie palace, and when the noted Impresario opened his Million Dollar Theatre in LA, at the organ was Jesse Crawford.

In 1927 Grauman featured "Seventh Heaven" made by Frank Borzage, with Janet Gaynor and Chas. Farrell. That was the Academy's first year, and the film won the Oscar, as did Miss Gaynor.

Later he was engaged by Balaban & Katz, where in their great new Chicago Theatre he played the biggest organ, later became world famous as the "Poet of the Organ" at the Mighty Wurlitzer in the big paramount Theatre, NY City. At one time he had his own dance band, toured America.

Rare collector's items today are two of his early recordings on Autograph label, in which he was interested, pro-

duced by W.B. Marsh, inventor of the electrical system. If you ever see one at a swap-meet, don't miss buying it.

Two popular pieces he then recorded were "Old Virginia Moon" and "A Kiss in the Dark".

For awhile he taught the pipeorgan and became quite a popular teacher. Finally he returned to the west coast, died in LA in 1962 at age 66. Many folks today well remember his profoundly beautiful music at the theatres mentioned, and also treasure some of his notable recordings.

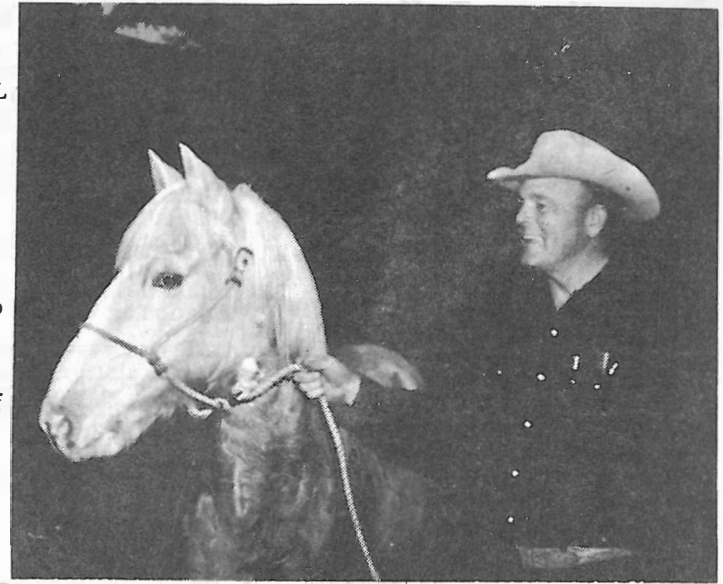

To sum it up any animal with teeth is apt to bite, and if rabid, could cause death if not treated at once. Rabies is always fatal. The talk was concluded with a film, then questions answered.

The next meeting, Friday, July 1 will have a speaker from County Planning to talk on what it means to Alpine and its future growth.

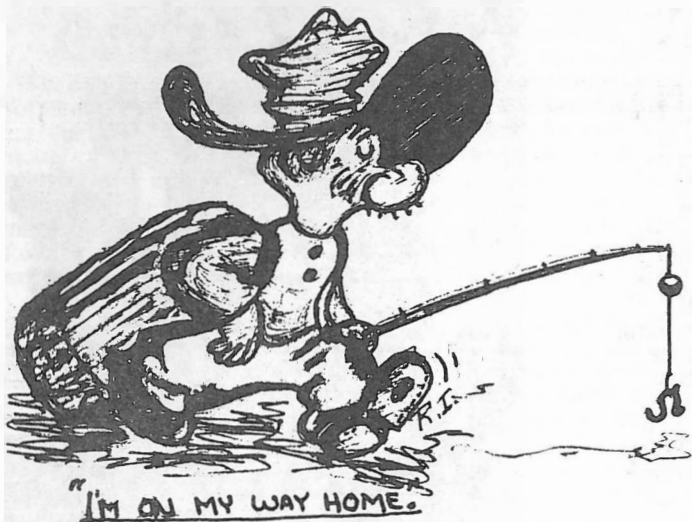

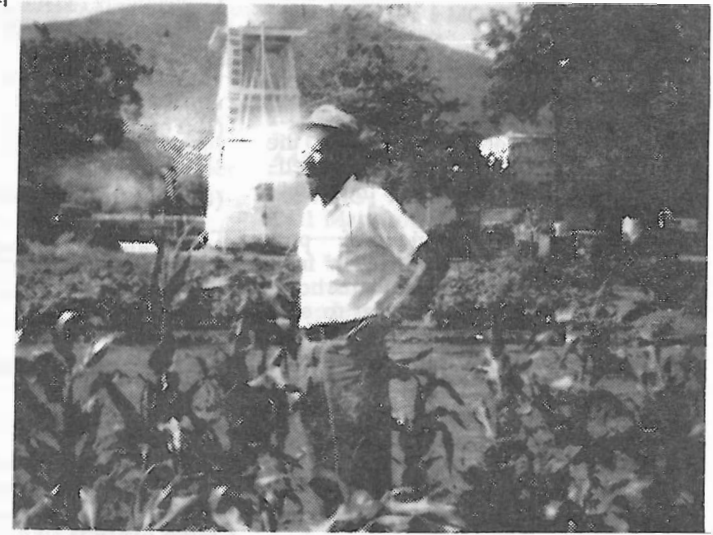

Who Wants School Unification and Why?

Most small districts do not want unification for some very good reasons:

- (1) The loss of local control.
- (2) Higher cost which means higher taxes.
- (3) An extra large district like the proposed Grossmont Distric would not mean better education since anything over 25,000 pupils, the quality of education diminishes. Grossmont would be about 52,000 pupils.
- (4) Last, but not least, the taxpayer doesn't like to be forced into anything by means of a mandated election.

Now we know who doesn't want unification and why. Who does want unification and why? Could it be the already large districts like Grossmont? Could it be the teachers who see a chance to get higher pay? Could it be the administrators of large districts who see a chance to build an empire at the expense of small districts?

A few more questions that taxpayers should have the answers to: How much money was each teacher asked to contribute for the passage of unification? What have these teachers been promised in return? Will the merit system that has been voted by the classified employees in some school districts such as Cajon Valley, be honored under unification? "County Counsel opinion dated 5-27-66 clarifies that there is no merit system in existence in the Grossmont Union High School District Area which will be mandated for adoption by the new unified school district if it is formed by a vote of the people on June 14, 1966."

All self-thinking people should analyze these questions and vote NO on unification June 14th.

OUR DAILY BREAD

By Frances McTaggart

Denatured foods are foods that have been altered and impaired in the process of milling, manufacturing, bleaching, canning and preserving so that they are no longer as well fitted to meet the needs of the body as they were in the state that Nature intended them to be.

Let's take wheat, for example----
Whole wheat is almost a complete food because it contains so many valuable nutrients. The outer part of the wheat

kernal is the Bran layer in which are found large amounts of vitamins and minerals (iron to make good red blood and phosphorus for nerves and bones). The proteins found also in this area are of very good quality. The inner part of wheat kernal called the Endosperm consists of starch and a small amount of protein known as "gluten". The Endosperm contains almost no vitamins and minerals. White flour is made from this part of the kernal, which is low in those nutrients upon which we depend for our health. The bottom of the kernal is the home of the Embryo or "wheat germ". This is the tiny living part of the wheat which is responsible for the sprouting of the grain and it is one of the richest known sources of the B vitamins (approx. 14 of them), and Vitamin E. (cont. next week.)
