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New De Angelis Restaurant

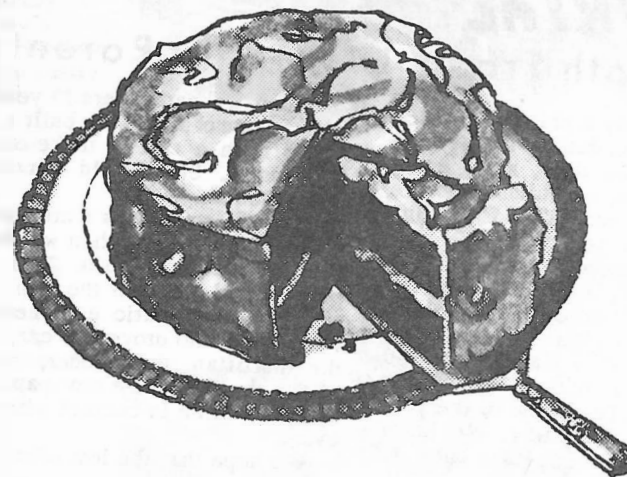
Next Friday, the 24th, another fine eating place will be added to the many in San Diego County, the De Angelis authentic Italian Restaurant.

Girl's Death Tragic Lesson for Parents

A week ago today a child was struck by a car when she dashed across the road. Next day she died, an unnecessary loss of one life, of which there are thousands every year. This is an anguishing lesson for parents.

Every day we drive on country roads where little tykes play, ride bikes, run scooters, or just dawdle, often dashing in front of oncoming cars.

A road where they travel up to 60 miles an hour is no playground for little people. The home or the yard should be; not the highway. We know how difficult it is to get little ones to obey rules.

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When we came here 17 years ago with a mite of a girl, we built a fence. It has been a task to make our three stay inside. Every child wants to go out of bounds.

Friday's tragedy is a cruel example of the price we pay when we do not enforce safety measures. This is a personal calamity for the family, and a sorrowful dramatic experience for the person who drove the car, also for the mortician, the coroner, the hospital, the CHP, the newspapers, and all who come in contact with the sad event.

We hope that the loss of this pretty little girl will help prevent a similar fate for other youngsters in this community. -CI

More sad news in Alpine. Thursday morning Barbara Peterson got up and found their 3 weeks old stud colt on the ground unable to stand up. She tried to get a vet but they were busy so called Doris and Frank Scully, who went over immediately. They got the baby up but it was so weak they put it in a sling to help it stand. They finally took it down to Dr. Davis with the help of Mr. Vickers and Geo. Palmer. They put the baby in the wagon and when the vet saw it he said there wasn't any hope. It had gotten lock-jaw from an infection and couldn't possibly live. He put it to sleep and they brought it back to Alpine and buried him on their hill. After waiting 12 months for a colt it is too bad to have something happen like this.

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If you are expecting to have a young horse in your possession, be sure to have an adequate place to keep it for the first few months. Barbed wire is not the thing, as they don't understand and can get cut badly in it.

Mama and Alice Villa worked for days to put up a 6 foot fence for ours so it couldn't possibly get hurt and then it cut its mouth on the gate latch. It just shows you how necessary it is to have everything fixed so they can't possibly get their legs or head caught. They are playful and inquisitive and just naturally will get hurt if you don't prevent it.

Bob Smith came over Saturday to see our colt and also said he saw the Shetland pony belonging to Woods up on Lilac Lane. If they want to go and see if it is their horse they can drive by and talk to the people who have it.

Jennings Interchange, also the one at Dunbar Lane, as shown in Editor Irvine's air photo. This will leave but 2½ miles to drive into Alpine! You will depart the new stretch just east of the Dunbar Lane Interchange, going onto US 80.

Construction of this long-needed road is a beautiful piece of work. The Sun, with Al Smith, Alpine real estate, and co-pilot Irvine, made a test run up and down the freeway, as shown in photos. Two area firms did the job. The first four miles from Harrit Road, was by Daley Co. and the remaining 1½ miles by C.W. McGrath.

Resident Engineer H.R. Hecht welcomed the Sun, explained much about the project. While the opening is Monday, McGrath told the Sun there is a lot of detail work to be completed later.

No ceremony has been planned for the informal opening Monday. This will relieve old 80 from the heavy burden of traffic on the long July 4 week-end. Alpine drivers are jubilant over the prospects of a clear freeway all the way to SD.

Extension of the work to the Willows 2.7 miles east of Alpine, is expected to start late this year or early in 1967, as bids will be called for in November on the \$7 million contract, Dekema told the Sun Tuesday. He said it might take 18 months as it is hilly and full of granite, which could delay opening to mid-1968.

OKAY NEW SCHOOL BUDGET

A tentative 1966-67 budget of \$420,000 was adopted Monday night by school trustees. It is about \$16,000 over the fiscal year. They set a hearing for the final budget on Aug. 1
