Dunbar Lane, "El Cajon", which is really unincorporated county, not in the corporate city of EC.

All of Dunbar Lane and Harbison Canyon, including the lower part of Arnold Way, are served by the EC postoffice, thus they are in "El Cajon", but some 12 miles away!

When I first came to Alpine in 1937 that postoffice served South Grade Road also, so while we actually lived in Alpine, our mail had to be addressed to "El Cajon".

In the same manner, because Alpine phones are out of the EC exchange, when you make a long distance call, the operator must say that the call is from "El Cajon". Someday when Alpine grows up a bit more they will perhaps have a small exchange here.

We will not fare much better when the freeway is opened to the Willows in about two years, for signs will merely say "Alpine Blvd." It is not big enough to rate its name as a town being on the freeway. You will then have only four chances to leave Interstate 8 for Alpine as: Dunbar Lane, Tavern Road, Willows Road and later, the upper end of that street where an interchange will be built. -CI

Councilmen in La Mesa stood firm against fluoride in their drinking water when they voted to file a letter from County Health suggesting it.

Councilman Robert Helland said it was the prerogative of Helix Irrigation District, which supplies LM, EC, Spring Valley and Lemon Grove. Helix directors have turned down the idea, on the grounds that it is each person's own business as to medication. Councilmen in EC did likewise.

MASSAGE AND ITS BENEFITS

The endocrine or glandular system is composed of the pineal and pituitary glands which are found in the head- the thyroid, parathyroid and thymus glands in the neck-- the pancreas which is located behind the stomach-- two adrenal glands situated on the kidneys and lastly, the reproductive glands. All of these glands should be kept in condition because they act as chemical factories, having the ability to remove certain constituents from the blood and to connect them into new compounds. We know them as hormones. Massage accelerates the performance of these glands.

The skeletal (bone) structure receives its nourishment thru the blood vessels which make their way through the membraneous bone covering into the bone interior. This is a vital portion of the body because inside the bones we have what we call bone marrow whose function is largely concerned with formation of the red corpuscles. Massage increases this red blood formation under normal conditions.
