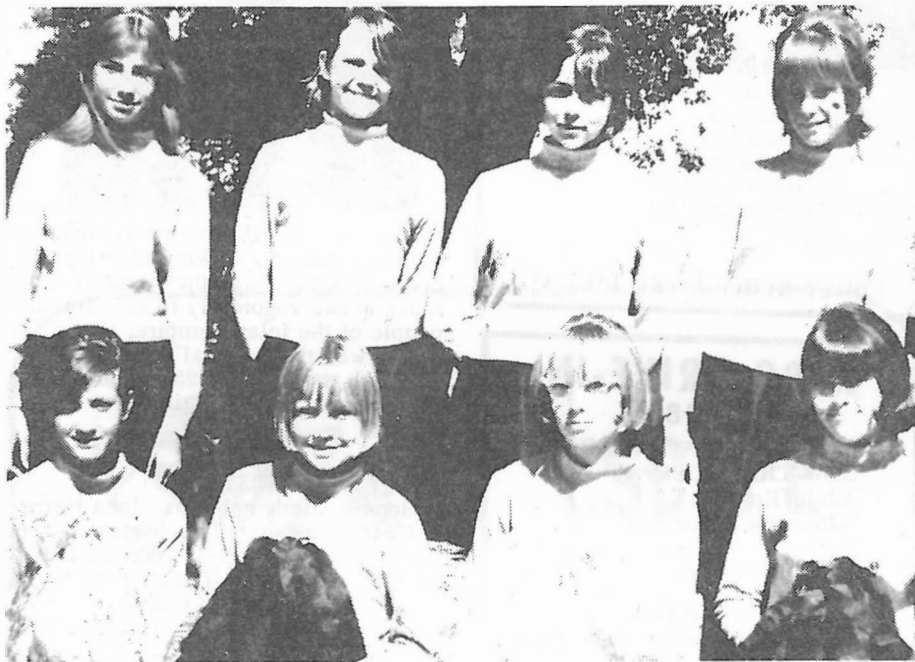

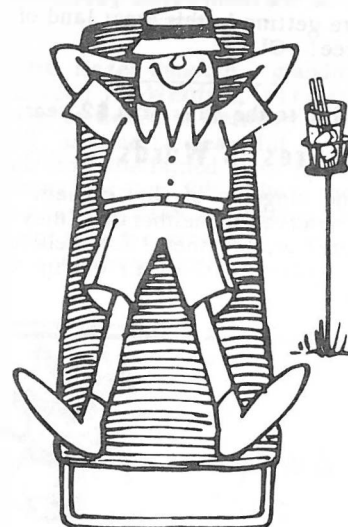

## U.S. Women Whacking High Food Prices!

While grocery men and the food industry have been trying to alibi the terribly high prices in supermarkets, women across the nation have fallen in step with those militant Denverites who started boycotting in an endeavor to bring down eating costs.

Several chains have lowered mark-ups, but one man says it will soon blow over and prices will rise again-- and

again. We all have noted the recent steady rise in prices for staples: butter from 69¢ to 89¢ or more, bread, coffee and other items climbing like a thermometer in Death Valley!

One sure way to lower family costs for eating is to use less costly foods: get more bulk items rather than the expensive processed ones, which have had a lot of nutrients taken out anyhow drop meat from the menu for half the week; stop drinking coffee-- it's very harmful recent discoveries show-- buy whole grain and serve some tasty, old-fashioned porridge, instead of the packaged stuff that costs a lot more.

Another way is to serve more vegetables and salads and use dried fruit as figs, prunes and so on. All that is far more healthful, and will build stronger bodies in your children. Drop commercial ice cream, which is loaded with sugar-- bad for the teeth-- and has stabilizers, fillers, and so forth.

But our hats are off to those gals up in Denver who stopped complaining about high prices and did something about it. That's just what the men of America are going to have to do about some of the burdensome government we are getting in this great land of the (?) free! -CI

## Prop. 2 Means Prosperity

"We have a chance to be the leader in the US if we can only keep up our school facilities with the population growth", Dr. Ernest B. O'Byrne, vice president of administration SD State College, told a score of newsmen at a luncheon in Quails Inn, Lake San Marcos Monday. It was hosted by the SD County Citizen's Committee for "Yes" on Prop. 2. He urged the public to support the \$230 million bond measure on Nov. 8, \$40 million of which would come to this area to benefit UCSD and SD State.

He pointed out that the upsurge in population puts them close to the edge of present facilities and that the new buildings this money would build, during which period the county can become the center of technological science. State College now has 18,200 students, and more are on the way. "We simply cannot afford to delay", he said.

Norman Foster, vice-president in marketing for US National Bank, chairman of the citizen's committee, was emcee.

Dr. John S. Galbraith, chancellor, UCSD, said that "higher education is essential to the welfare of this area for it will bring more students, staff members and residents as growth expands". This development will bring twice as much federal as state money, which means a richer economy, he mentioned, and said that the maximum projected enrollment is 27,500, and already for 1966 they have 2250 students, which will rise some 900 a year.

"It isn't that people are against the measure" he concluded, "but apathy and a negative attitude delays eventual passing of such bonds".
