Leave Your Vengeance to the Lord

Jack Ruby died Tuesday of cancer in Dallas. He was awaiting trial for the shooting of Lee Oswald, President Kennedy's assassin (alleged), which event appeared to be the result of a sudden fit of vengeance. Ruby, a product of the slums, and a purveyor of not too high class entertainment, languished in jail since the tragic days in that fair Texas city.

His death brings to mind the Biblical admonition regarding vengeance, which belongeth to the Lord. Also that you cannot break the Ten Commandments, they will break you, as my old friend Cecil B. DeMille, that master of the cinema brought out so well in his great picture of that name.

Ruby killed, and the Command-

ment killed him! Many years ago I spent some months living in the mountain cabin of a retired Episcopal minister in whose choir I sang as a lad. Many an evening was spent in profound conversation about Life, the Universe, and God. At that time I learned much about the great truths of the Sacred Writings.

One important point was that "Vengeance is mine, saith the Lord", is very true and very real, even in the small things of today. Since that time I have never held anything against anyone because I believe that it hurts the person who holds that idea much more than the one he may have something against, or not-like, or whatever petty thing it could be.

Many get sick, even die, because they fail to live up to the teachings of the Book of Life. If you harbor a grudge, or a dislike for someone, get it off of your mind, and get right with yourself by going directly to that person and confessing your position-- in short- get right with the world and you will sleep better and maybe not get sick, mentally or physically.

Jack Ruby was a sick man, who in a flash of vengeance, broke one of the great laws of the cosmos; thus killing himself. !-CI

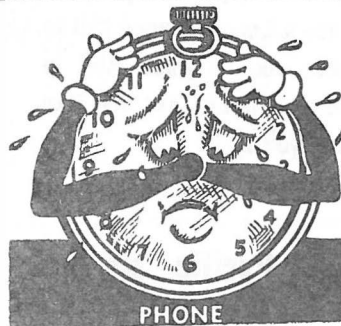

In the December 28th Daily Californian we clipped a story about dogs facing the pen or rope and were a little disturbed about it. We have a German shepherd and a poodle and try to keep them in the fenced yard. When we go riding we like to take Chris along, as as it is good exercise for him, and we usually cross the street into the open country where he is never in danger of being hit by a car or causing any trouble.

This article says "if you live in SD County and have a dog, he must be penned in or tied up beginning Jan. 1. This order was issued by Dr. J. B. Askew and supported by county supervisors because of the rabies increase in wild animals."

Our dogs have had their rabies shots, are perfectly healthy and are not allowed to roam and we think it is a harsh measure for the health department to put such restrictions on people who do look after their animals. We have other friends that like to take their dogs on rides and feel that since they are not carriers of rabies and are not likely to come in contact with wild animals, that some other arrangements can be made.

Also if your dog is caught running loose he can be caught in one of the 2,400 traps being used and held for 30 days at the owner's expense or longer, if he hasn't proper identification.

CARE OF THE BODY

The Common Carrot

The least expensive and most available of protective vegetables is the carrot, an excellent source of vitamins A, B and G. The carotene in the carrot becomes vitamin A which is necessary for healthy, normal skin, good for the eyes and it builds resistance to infection. The B1 promotes well-being of nerves, helps constipation and the G vitamin is vital to cell life and general tone.

The high water content in the carrot makes a good balance for heavy starch or protein foods.

In choosing carrots, avoid the split or pithy roots as sometimes these are very old and almost tasteless. The young carrots have less sugar and carotene than the mature ones. It has been found that the shredded carrot makes the carotene more easily absorbed in the system than the sliced or diced carrot.
